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You and Your Congress

What can you expect from Congress this year? There are a number of definite indications of things to come, although it is too early to answer the question completely. What must be kept in mind is that Congress is meeting a Presidential and Congressional election year. Congressional leaders will work with one eye on election day and few legislative issues will escape the political touch.

That means legislative experimentation, with the political uncertainties it involves, will be unpopular. Congress will deal mainly with legislation that must be handled because certain laws expire this year or because political expediency forbids ignoring them.

Here, against that background, is a run-down of major items:

Taxes — No major increases likely. The President may ask for as much as a \$5 billion boost. But those Congressional leaders who have most to say about taxes have virtually ruled out another increase. There will be efforts to close so-called "loopholes" in the present law.

Spending — There will be a harder drive than last year to cut it. Voters are complaining more about it because their taxes are up. Bills newly introduced would put a \$71 billion limit on spending (\$20 billion less than last year) and lower the present legal limit on the national debt by \$10 billion to \$265 billion. The debt now is \$260 billion.

However, Congress will go slow on domestic spending cuts that might pinch voters. And it will hesitate to chop military budgets, which will carry well over half of total spending, because of the

Liberty Gardens Now Vital To Home Defense Program

A national Liberty Garden campaign for 1952 was formally launched with government sanction in a statement by Acting Secretary of Agriculture Clarence J. McCormick, following a meeting of the National Garden and Food Preservation Committee in Washington, D. C.

Mr. McCormick called on all Department of Agriculture agencies to take all feasible steps to carry out a program recommended by the committee, which had met at the call of Secretary Charles F. Brannan. Civilian groups were urged to give full cooperation to the program. While total farm output this year is at a high level, he said food requirements were so high it is essential that the nation make the best use of all sources of food.

The name "Liberty Garden Program" was unanimously recommended by the committee and approved by Secretary Brannan, who addressed the committee, and declared the program to be important in the present emergency.

"We do not all understand exactly what kind of an emergency this is," he said. "Nevertheless it is an emergency about which we cannot be complacent. There must be many forms of preparation which are comparable to almost full wartime operations. And though the scope and magnitude and total volume of this operation may not be equal to a full wartime program, nevertheless I am personally convinced that the program is exceedingly important and has already made contributions both in the nutritional field and certainly in the food supply field."

On the local level the all-out program provides for using all available land areas, as insurance against shortages, to relieve transportation facilities, enlist voluntary labor in food production, and maintain health and morale values.

Foreign Aid — As noted earlier, the economic portion of this aid (now about \$1 billion) will be politically vulnerable this year. Chairman Richards (D-S. C.) of the House Foreign Affairs Committee predicts Administration foreign aid requests will be cut "to the bone" this year. That looks like a safe prediction.

Meanwhile, the Administration will soft-pedal civil rights legislation in an effort to soften the anti-administration rebellion in the South.

The administration will take a lukewarm approach to most Fair Deal measures in an effort to gain bipartisan support for foreign policy.

As for scandal, Republicans will be trying to dig it up and Democrats will be trying to clean it up. So, this year as last there will be many investigations. — U. S. Chamber of Commerce.

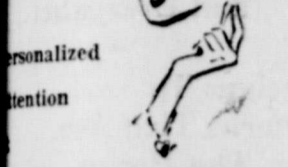

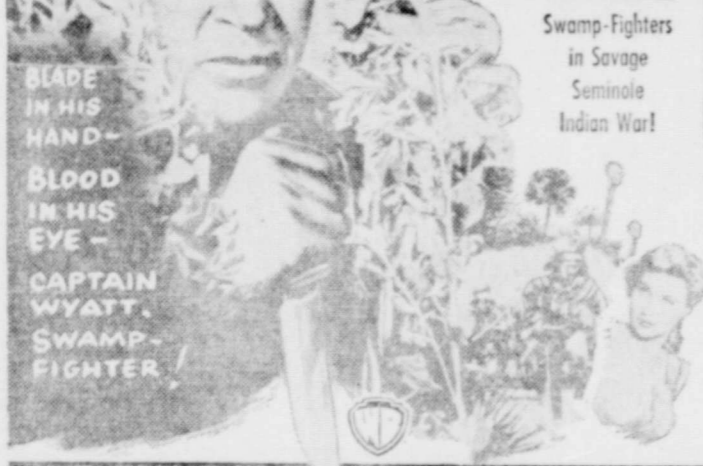

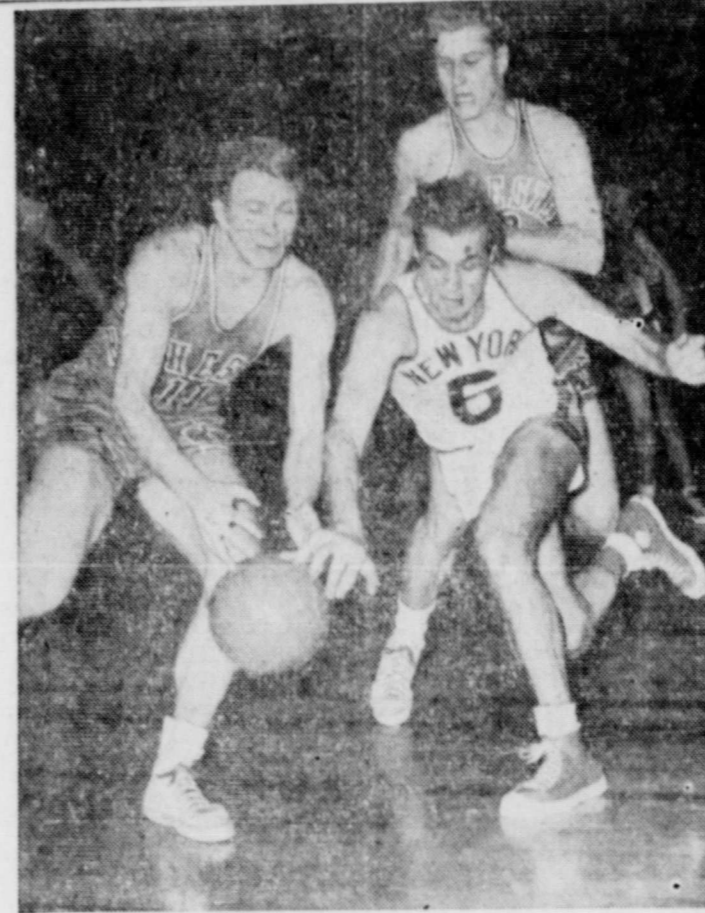
