## Pipe Cemented In Stephenson Test

The area south of Cisco was providing considerable interest for oil men today as three wells were in completion stages, another had set pipe, and several others were drilling, according to a survey of operations.

A mile southwest of town, the J. E. Connally No. 1 Mrs. Peal McMurray was given the hydrafrac treatment over the weekend and testing began Tuesday: It was flowing back the oil used in the treatment, and the outcome was expected to be known late today or Thursday. Earlier Lake sand tests had indicated that it would be a big gas well if no il is present.

In the Mississippi lime area six miles southwest of town, the Ownby Drilling Company No. 1 J. W. Brown Estate was treated with acid Tuesday and the flow was considerably increased in tests. Only 14 feet of a potential 40 feet of lime pay horizon were perforated for initial tests. It is expected to be a good well.

The D. W. Henke No. 1 Brown Estate in the same area was drilling at 2,555 feet early today. It s located in the northeast quarter of Section 118, Block 3, H&TC



## Birdsfoot Trefoil Valuable To Bluegrass Pastures

orous, nutritious, palatable legume so compatible with bluegrass that each is better because of the other's presence. Broadleaf birdsfoot trefoil fills this place over a large part of the area adapted to bluegrass.

It has a wide soil tolerance both as to fertility and acidity, a high nutritive value approximating alfalfa, and is highly winter hardy. It has a high drought tolerance equal to alfalfa, so is able to carry animals thru dry midsummer periods when other pastures fail. It is a le-gume on which animals have never een known to bloat. In New York, Oregon, California, and the Corn Belt States, its value is now becoming fully recognized for use in per-

manent pastures.

BREATHING, known as respiration, is the taking of air into the body, getting all the body needs from the air, and shoving back into the atmosphere the parts you don't need.

The "gases" you inhale are about 21 percent oxygen, 78 percent nitrogen, and smidgeons of ammonia, organic matter and one or two other stuffs.

The oxygen goes into the bloodstream from the lungs. Pure nitrogen does not belong in the ploodstream, causing bubbles in the blood when it does get there by mistake, in such accidents as 'the bends.'

When you exhale the air, you end out a breath that is about 7 percent oxygen, 78 percent nitrogen, and 4 percent carbon di-That makes the exhaling breath somewhat less than the innaling breath in oxygen and more in carbon dioxide, with the nitrogen content about the same.

You give and take about a pint of air with each inhale and exhale. When you breath in and out real deep, you shove about 3 pints of air around with each movement, but there's still about another three pints which you can't get at, the so-called residual air in the lungs. Your breathing can be measured for health purposes is to how much air you give and take with every breath, how much you can give and take, and how many breaths you take a minute. Most men have a capacity of about 7 pints of air and most women have a lung capacity of about 5

Your breathing rate changes, slows down ,as you get older. Newborn babies breathe about once every second, but soon slow down to 40 times a minute. By the time the babe is about 15 years old, he's probably hitting it up about 20 times a minute during normal activity, slower when he's asleep and faster when he's exer-


