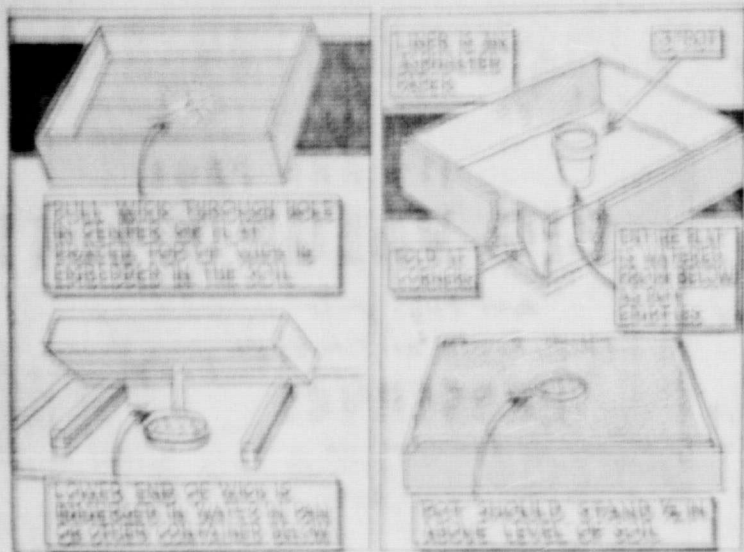

HEALTH TALKS

BRECH PRESENTATION and breech delivery refer to the birth of an infant buttocks or feet first instead of the normal delivery, top of the head first, which is called vertex presentation. About three percent of deliveries are breech presentations, which are important medically because of the possibility of asphyxiation of the infant unless delivery is completed within a specified length of time. Historically, Nero was one of the famous breech presentation babies.

BRONCHITIS is inflammation of the wet linings (mucous membranes) of the bronchial tubes, the branches that lead from the windpipe to the lungs. Acute bronchitis is an attack of fever, coughing, and chest pain with rales, musical sounds, when you breathe; it may be caused by an infection in the nose and throat, by inhaling irritating substances in the air, or by infectious substances.

Asthmatic bronchitis usually results in actual changes in the bronchial tubes with the membrane getting thicker than normal, a breakdown of the lining behind the mucous membrane and an overdevelopment of the muscles of the bronchial tubes.

Chronic bronchitis, usually developing in middle or later life, has a cough and the musical sounds in the chest when you breathe. It is often caused by repeated attacks of acute bronchitis, by gout, by rheumatism, or by tuberculosis, or it may be a complication of heart or kidney disease.

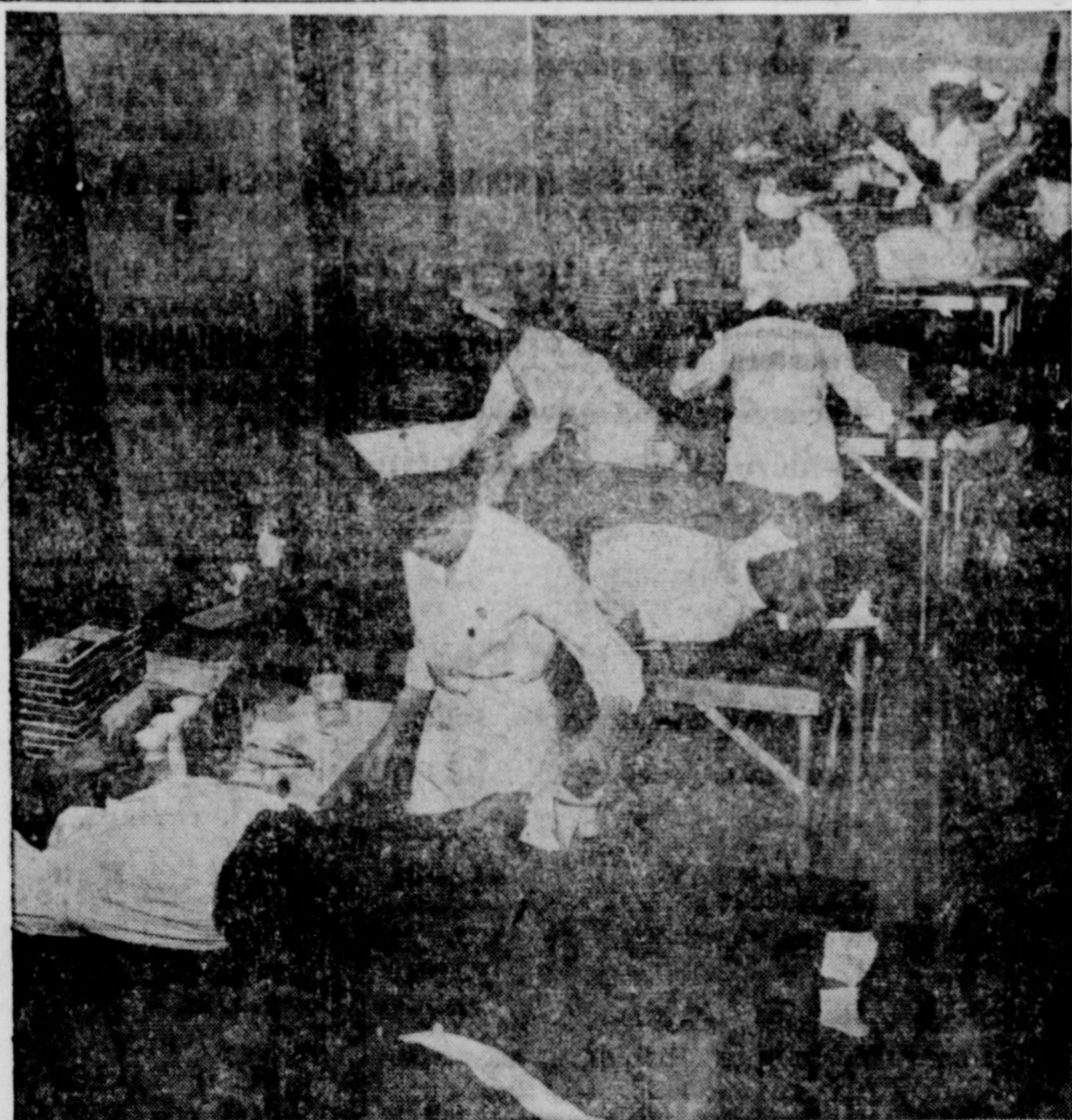

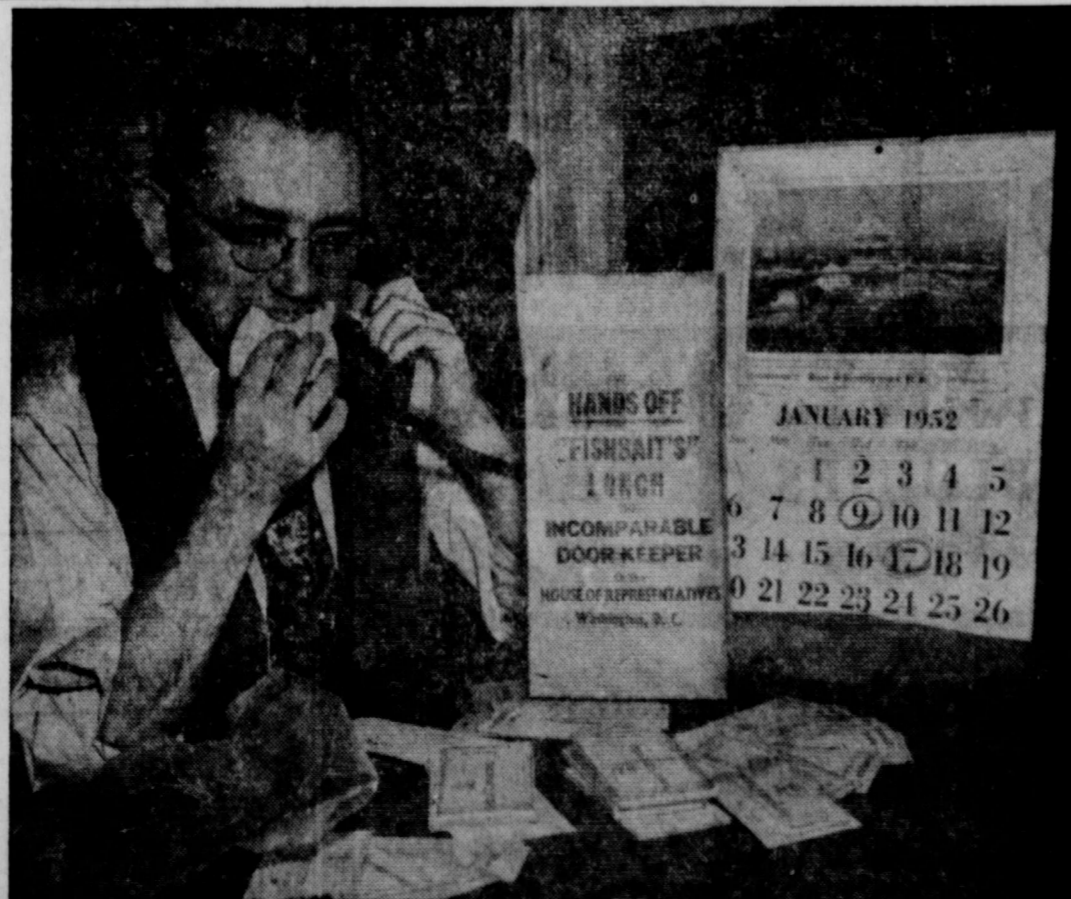

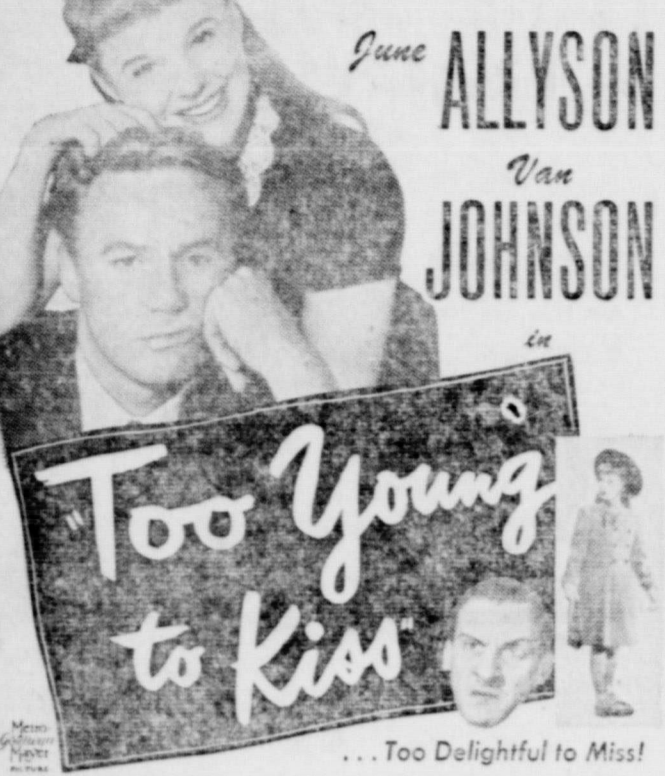
