We had no less than 50 people inquiring about the drinking water at our office. Mr. Edwards is showing this picture, which he says is a topnotcher, Sunday and Monday.

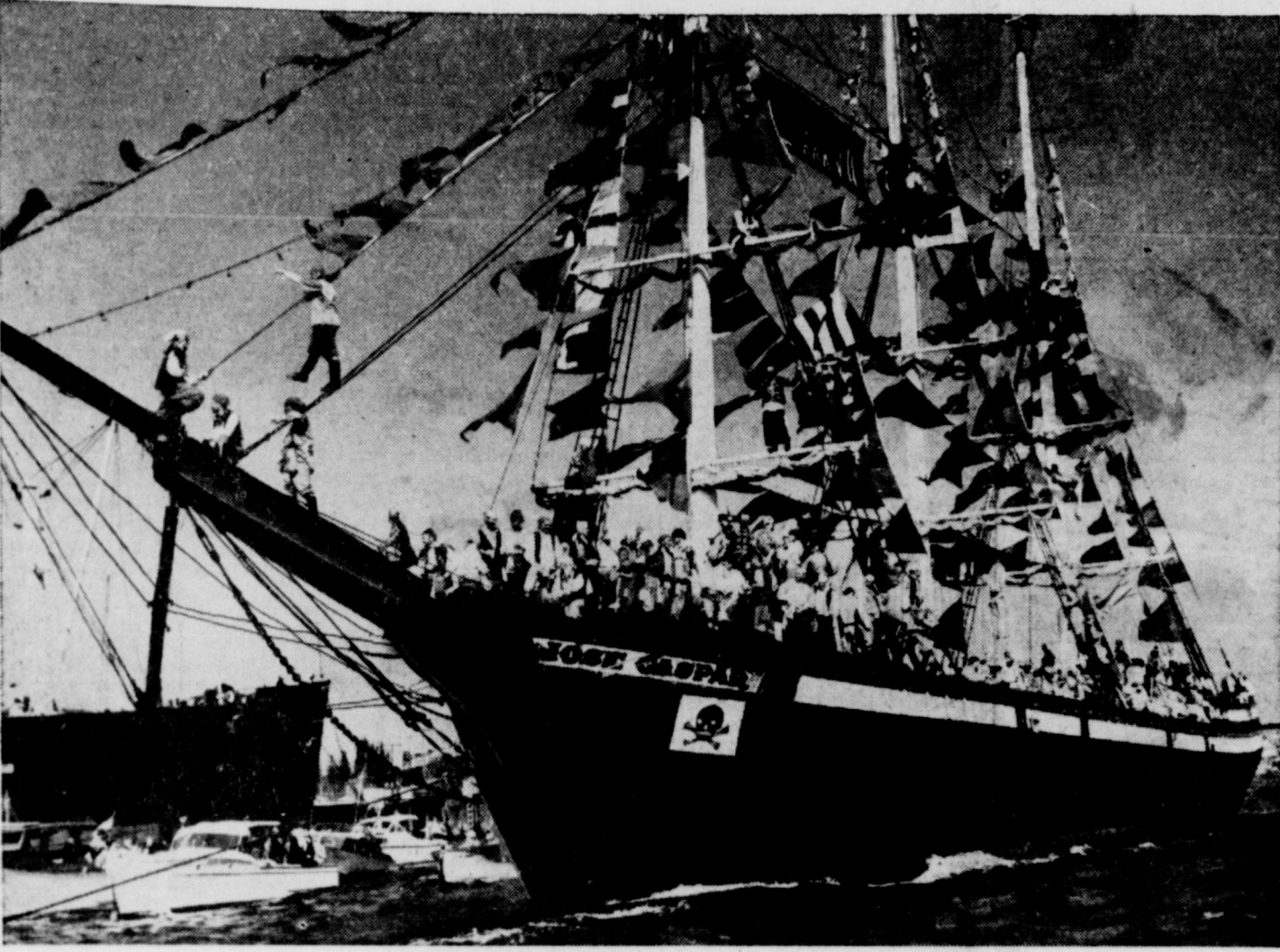

New Wildcat Oil Test Spotted Near City; Hickok Plans Well

FINAL RITES PLANNED SUNDAY FOR HENRY S. STUBBLEFIELD

Henry Stephen Stubblefield, 78, for many years prominent in church and civic affairs of Cisco and Eastland County, died in a local hospital at 5:30 p. m. Friday following an illness of some three weeks. He suffered a heart attack early in January and was carried to the hospital where he remained until his death.

Mr. Stubblefield had been a resident of Cisco and the Cisco area for approximately 75 years, coming to the county from New-

castle where he was born on December 10, 1873. He was the son of Dr. and Mrs. R. R. Stubblefield. Dr. Stubblefield served Ranger and a radius of 75 miles from there as a physician, making his calls on horseback. His mother was a member of the Horsley family, pioneers of Dallas County.

He was married to Miss Flora Emma Parks at the old Monroe church in the Scranton community on December 29, 1896. They celebrated their 55th wedding anniversary shortly before he became ill. He was a farmer in the Scranton area for many years. He was elected commissioner of precinct 4 and held that office for several years. Two years ago he retired from the office of Justice of the Peace of the Cisco precinct after several years of duty.

He had been an active member of the Baptist Church all his life and was a member of the Woodmen of the World and Odd Fellows Lodges.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Sunday from the First Baptist Church with the Rev. Ralph T. Wootton officiating. Burial will be in Oakwood Cemetery with Thomas Funeral Home in charge of the arrangements.

Survivors are his wife; two daughters, Mrs. H. B. Elliott of Lubbock and Mrs. G. O. Griffiths of Vernon; three sons, O. M. Stubblefield, R. M. Stubblefield and R. H. Stubblefield, all of Dallas; two sisters, Mrs. Alice McDermott of Monahan and Mrs. Rose Ladd of Mineral Wells. Also surviving are ten grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

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Clyde C. Harris Dies At Ranger

Clyde C. Harris of Ranger, a former resident of Cisco, died at 4 p. m. Friday in a Ranger hospital after an illness of 15 days. He was 54 years of age.

Funeral services will be held at 2:30 p. m. Sunday in Ranger. Mr. Harris, a painting and paper hanging contractor, lived in Cisco for several years before moving to Ranger four years ago. He was a native Texan and was born at Teahuacana. He was a member of the Baptist church.

Survivors include his wife, of Ranger; a brother, Vernon Harris, Cisco, and several other brothers and sisters.

Hailey Begins In New City Project

A new wildcat oil test for the Cisco area was rigging up Saturday some four miles west of town near Highway 80 on the James H. Turner land. A new well for the area northeast of town was announced by Hickok Producing and Developing Co.

The wildcat west of Cisco will be drilled by D. L. Rose of Albany as his No. 1 James H. Turner. Equipment was expected to be ready to begin drilling by Monday. Plans call for an Ellenberger lime test.

The Hickok company will drill their No. 10 Wright and Harrell some three miles northeast of town. Location was given as 330 feet from the northeast corner of the southwest quarter of Section 62, Block 4, H&TC Survey. Permit calls for 4,200 feet.

The well will offset production. The location is just northeast of Mississippi lime production in the Kleiner pool. The location was being cleared Saturday.

In the south Cisco townsite, Jack Hailey of Cisco spudded in early Saturday to drill his No. 1 Thelma H. Richardson et al as an offset to the E. C. Carey Company's No. 1 Masonic Home, completed recently. Surface pipe was set Friday and the well was drilling at 250 feet Saturday afternoon. Plans call for a 4,000 foot test.

Official location for the Hailey well was given as 849 feet from the north and 960 feet from the west lines of Section 66, Block 3, H & TC Survey.

A mile southwest of Cisco, the J. E. Connolly No. 1 Pearl McMurray was still testing in a Lake sand completion effort. Gas in considerable quantity was flowing with no oil, reports said. The well has been expected to make in excess of five million cubic feet of gas per day.

In the Bankline-Owens pool area, five miles northeast of Cisco, J. P. Lohan's No. 1 Sam Hart was expected to begin completion work early this week. Pipe was set Thursday at 3,413 feet on top of the Lake sand. A drill stem test showed gas to the surface in eight minutes with free oil and 100 feet of heavy oil cut mud in the hole. Flowing pressure was 1,150 pounds.

It was understood that Lohan planned to move one location west for another well on the Hart tract.

In the Dothan area, D. D. Feldman's No. 1 Pruet was still in completion stages. An Ellenberger lime prospect, the casing was perforated in a lower zone Friday and 10,000 gallons of acid was used in an effort to yield oil. Swabbing was underway Saturday, it was reported here.

Joe E. Sheridan Is Buried Friday

Joe E. Sheridan, 67, a native resident of the Cisco area, was buried in Oakwood Cemetery Friday following funeral services held at the Thomas Chapel at 3 p. m. The services were conducted by the Rev. Mart Agnew and the Rev. H. N. Baldaree and were under the direction of Thomas Funeral Home.

Mr. Sheridan was born in Eastland County on January 17, 1885, and had lived in Cisco and the Cisco area all his life. He had managed his farming and ranching interests southwest of town. He was married to Miss Beulah Pate on January 2, 1910.

He is survived by his wife; four daughters, Mrs. J. H. Wighton and Mrs. W. A. Kerr of Oklahoma City, Mrs. Helen Rinkel of Brownwood and Mrs. J. C. Small of Kermit. Also surviving are six grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. at the Thomas Chapel with the Rev. Mart Agnew and the Rev. H. N. Baldaree officiating. Burial was in Oakwood Cemetery.

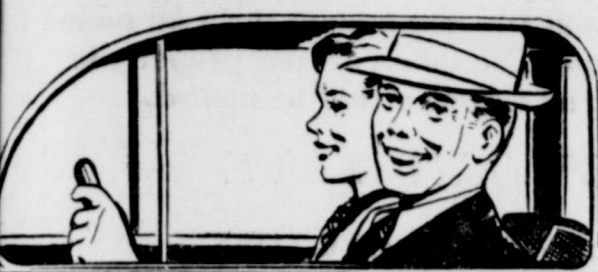
