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



Materials Used AUSTIN, Jan. 28.-The Army's program to impress on all of its members, from general to private, the cost of the equipment and material they use will be extended to the Organized Reserves at their annual field training this

Colonel C. M. Culp, Chief of the Texas Military District, said today that commanders of reserve units scheduled for summer training have been directed to include in their training schedules a six-hour program of "cost conciousness" instruction.

Reservists will memorize the eost in dollars and cents of their rifles, mess kits, blankets and other items of personal clothing and equipment which are provided them at public expense. The Army's purchasing procedue and increases in the purchase price of various items during the

past few years will be explained To drive home the fact that each reservist has a personal stake in this program, it will be stressed that needless destruction, careless handling and improper use of any items provided at government expense results in a waste of tax money - tax money which the reservist and his family must provide their part.



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
