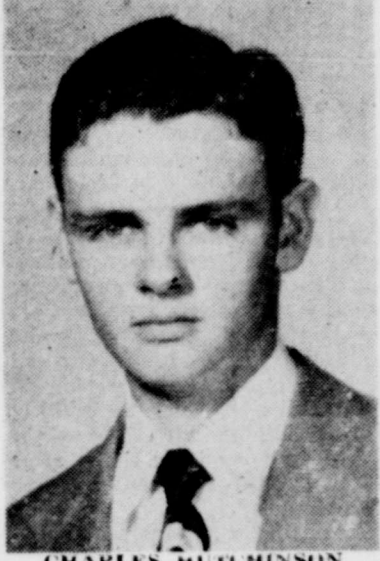
### CJC Singers Present Program At Abilene

### Former Wrangler Cage Star Dies In Hunting Accident

Charles Cleveland Hutchinson, 20, of Knox City, a student at Cisco Junior College last year and a member of the championship Wrangler cage team during the 1951 season, died of accidental gunshot wounds Sunday morning in a hunting accident near his home in the Knox City area.

Funeral services were to be held at 2 p. m. Tuesday at the First Baptist Church in Knox City with the Rev. E. V. Becker officiating. Burial was to be in the Knox City Cemetery.

Young Hutchinson, a junior at Texas Tech, was spending the weekend with his parents when the accident occurred. He was found beside a pickup truck on a bridge crossing the West Brazos River and a 12 gauge shotgun was found on the floor of the pickup.

Knox City Peace Justice W. L. Rodnett ruled that Hutchinson was apparently shot while attempting to remove the automatic shotgun from the pickup.

He was driving alone at the time of the accident. The family believed that he had been on his way from the farm where his parents lived to a farm west of the river to hunt. His body was found at 11:30 a. m. Sunday by Finis E. Walker, a farmer who lives on the west side of the Brazos.

Survivors include his parents, twin brothers, Wayne and Weldon of Knox City; two sisters, Melba and Ila Kay, both of Knox City and his maternal and paternal grandmothers.

### Abilene Firm Is Awarded Project

Awarding of contracts for the construction of a nursery building just west of the First Baptist Church was given formal approval Sunday morning by the congregation of the church. The action was in accord with recommendations of the church's building committee.

The general contract was awarded to the M. & H. Construction Company of Abilene in the amount of \$34,245.15. M. E. McGuire is a partner in the company and was here recently for the bidding and for conferences with the committee.

The \$34,245.15 price includes sub-bids for the electrical work, the plumbing work and the air-conditioning of the building. The electrical contract went to Jones Electric Company of Cisco on a bid of \$1,491, and the plumbing work was given to J. M. Smith and Son of Eastland on a bid of \$2,559.15.

The air conditioning contract went to Batjer-St. John Air Conditioning Co. of Abilene in the amount of \$3,087.

The recommendations of the building committee were explained by the Rev. Ralph T. Wootton, pastor, before the congregation voted to go ahead with the project.

The church had already purchased the steel for the building, costing \$5,156 and it is in a bonded warehouse in Cisco. In addition, the 17,000 brick required for the building are on hand at the church property. An allowance will be made for these items, it was explained.

The nursery building will provide space for small bed babies through the 5-year beginner group. The plans provide for four nursery rooms, two beginner department rooms, four bath rooms, a kitchenette, reception rooms and an equipment room. It will have summer-winter air conditioning. The concrete floor will be covered with asphalt tile, and haydite tile finished in soft colors will form the walls. Acoustical tile will be used for the ceiling.

Work on the project is expected to begin in the near future.

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THE CITY SLICKERS

New York City is the biggest rube town in America. It contains more hicks per square foot than any comparable area in the United States, according to an article in the February issue of Pageant Magazine. Although New Yorkers pride themselves on being city slickers, they're imposed upon, bilked, and hoaxed more often than the natives of Pumpkin Hollow ever were. More-over, because no one has ever told them, New Yorkers don't know they're rubes. As unsuspecting rubes, they're constantly being short-changed, double-talked, under-dealt and over-charged.

Sharp-witted operators now hover over Manhattan like flies over a fruit cake. Take the salty, ruddy-faced character who calls himself "Captain Blacklock." The Captain, who was born in Brooklyn, sells British woollens cut to men's suit lengths — supposedly imported material he managed to get by customs without paying duty. He charges \$10 a yard and New Yorkers, especially men in offices in the Wall Street district, fall all over themselves to buy it. The Captain actually gets the material for \$2 a yard from a cheap textile outfit on the Bowery. The "Made In England" stamp on the selvaige he puts on with his own rubber stamp.

New Yorkers, points out Pageant, have a native faith that something expensive is always a better buy than something modestly priced. A theatre manager recently complained that most tickets to his production were being bought by New Yorkers from speculators at double the admissions for them, checks enclosed.

TEXAS CLUB WOMEN RAISE BIG FUND TO GIVE HELP TO KOREA

WORTHAM, Jan. 26. — Texas ranks a proud second in the nationwide CARE-for-Korea collection sponsored by the General Federation of Women's Clubs, Mrs. Van Hook Stubbs of Wortham announced today. The Texas Federation of Women's Clubs leader reported big-hearted Texas clubs collected \$14,558 in twelve days earlier this winter in response to the call for clubwomen to aid destitute war victims in Korea. Only Pennsylvania's \$21,197 collection exceeded Texas'. California, whose per capita wealth surpasses Texas', trailed third with \$14,483.

Unanimous vote of clubwomen attending the GFWC convention at Houston last May launched the drive to send 150,000 CARE packages to Korea by Christmas time for Korea's 2,000,000 homeless. Delivery was rushed to beat the bitter Korean winter and its expected toll.

Extra interest in this particular appeal sprang from the fact that 4,500,000 Korean clubwomen were affiliated with the General Federation of Women's Clubs at the outbreak of war. Thanks to clubs responding were expressed by Mrs. W. P. Brightwell of Baird, state projects chairman, and Mrs. Preston Dial of San Antonio, state Council of International Clubs chairman. They led this major international project of the year for the Texas

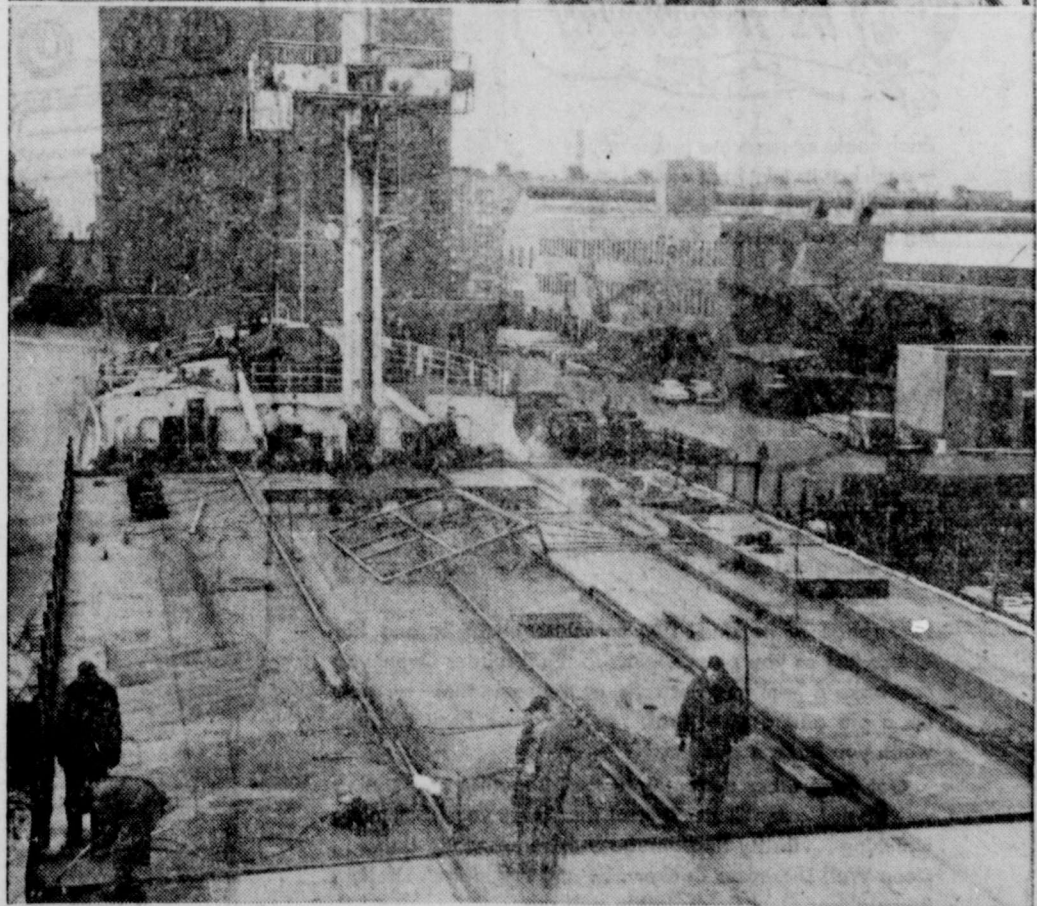
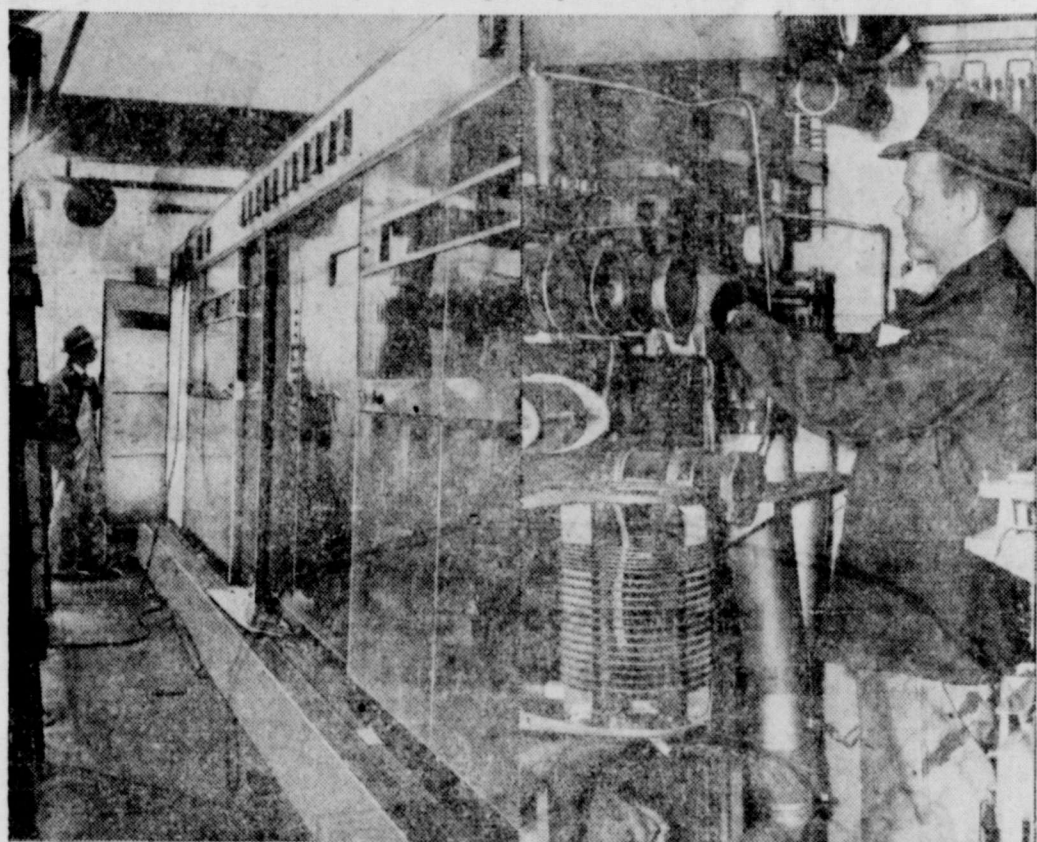

AUSTIN, Jan. 28.—The Army's program to impress on all of its members, from general to private, the cost of the equipment and material they use will be extended to the Organized Reserves at their annual field training this summer.
