## Ground Breaking Planned For New Baptist Nursery

## Parents Of Putnam Marine Given Bronze Star Medal In Ceremony

Parents of a heroic Marine, killed in the Korean fighting, today in Putnam were presented one of America's highest awards by a representative of the Commandant of the Marine Corps.

The award, the Bronze Star Medal, earned by the late Cpl. James Kelly Damon, was given to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George W. Damon in a quiet, informal presentation in their Putnam home. George Damon, a retired business man, and his wife were handling the coveted decoration by Marine 2nd Lt. J. D. McCullough, of Dallas Naval Air Station.

The officer read and then presented to the parents an accompanying citation telling of the son's heroic exploits in Korea last April 23.

In the name of the President of the United States, it told how the brave corporal had volunteered to lead a bayonet attack when enemy Communists had infiltrated his unit's position.

One month and two days later, on May 29, 1951, Cpl. Damon was killed by enemy small arms fire. A World War veteran and Marine Reserve called to active duty, he had been in the combat zone less than two months before making the "supreme sacrifice."

The hero's body was shipped from Korea and buried Oct. 30, 1951, in the hometown where the popular 27-year-old had played football and graduated from Putnam High School in 1942.

## Over 7,000 Pay Poll Tax Before Jan. 31 Deadline

Cisco and Eastland County will have a near-record number of people eligible to take part in city, county, state and national elections during 1952 as a result of rushing business at poll tax payment stations this week.

Stanley Webb, Eastland County Tax Assessor and Collector, estimated that the county would have a total voting strength of approximately 7,500 persons for 1952.

Webb said "we literally sold out" of poll tax receipts. The county had forms to issue 6,800 poll taxes. And only one book was left that had any blank receipts in it and that was at Ranger.

Cisco's sub-station at the Chamber of Commerce was issued seven books of 150 receipts each. The last book was sold out Thursday afternoon, and more than 100 additional poll tax payments were accepted on order forms — the receipts to be mailed out at a later date.

Webb estimated that Cisco voters paid about 1,200 poll taxes at the Chamber of Commerce office. At Ranger, some 1,000 poll tax receipts were issued. Rising Star sold in excess of 450, and the Gorman sub-station sold about 450.

The courthouse office ran out of receipts early in the day Thursday. Old 1947 forms were then used, the date being changed.

In addition to the 6,800 poll taxes issued, the county will have several hundred persons eligible to vote by exemption. The exemptions apply to persons over 60 years of age and to those who become 21 years of age during the calendar year.

Exemption certificates were not issued, however, because they are not required in cities under 10,000 population.

Webb attributed the heavy payments of poll taxes, in part, to the interest of civic clubs, service men's organization's the county's newspapers and public officials who have stressed the importance of "getting out the vote."

The heavy payments here were in keeping with a trend over the entire state where most counties reported record numbers.

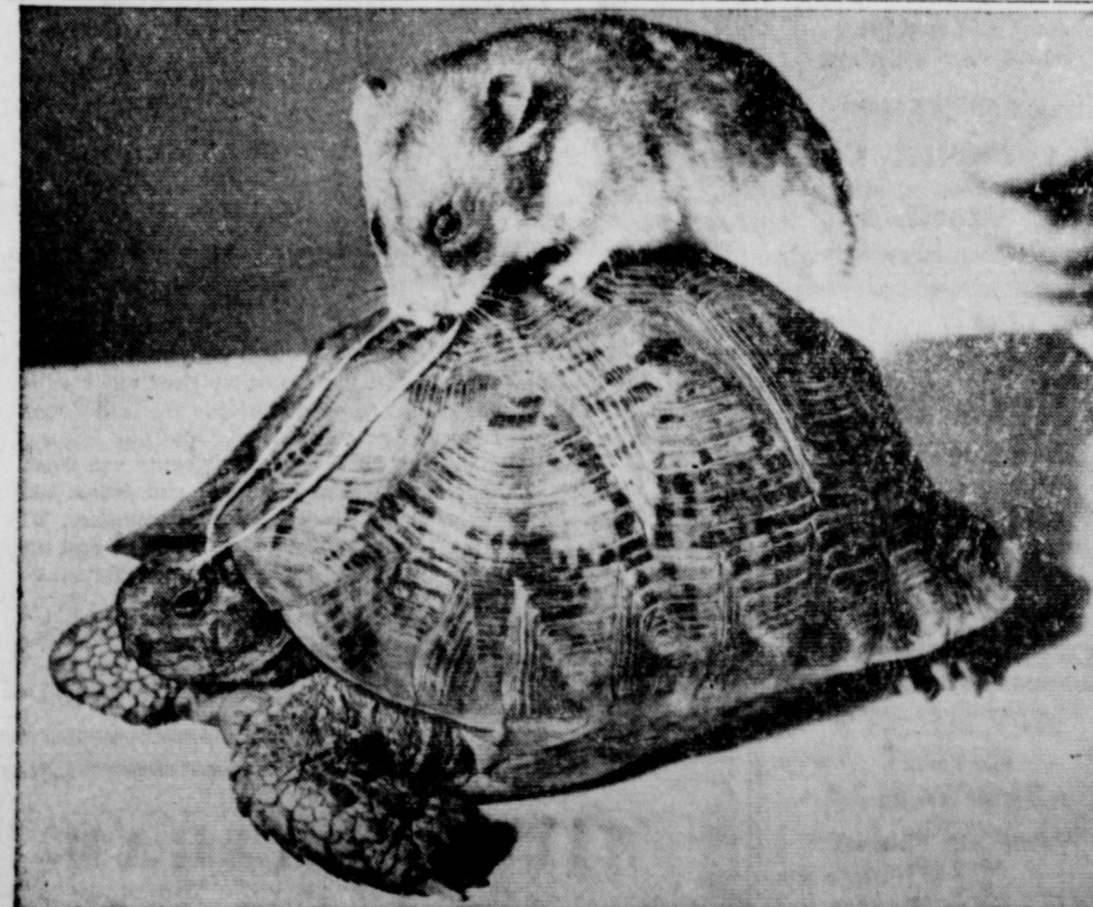

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THE GOOD OLD DAYS

WASHINGTON—When oldtimers get together they are wont to reminisce nostalgically about the "good old days." But not D. A. Hulcy, president of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, who always would rather look forward than backward.

"When I look backward it is only because it is through the lens of time we gain perspective of our own movement in the long parade of history. I don't waste time yearning for the good old days.

"I don't miss the livery stable. I can get along without muddy roads and the backyard pump. I want to use yesterday only as a measuring stick for tomorrow.

"Today, our living standards are beyond the wildest dreams of any good old days. What did it? How do we account for it? Who gets the credit?"

"Invention? Yes, to be sure. "You can invent a modern version of Aladdin's lamp, but it would gather cobwebs on the shelf unless you could sell it at a price the people could pay. Ben Franklin fished electricity out of the sky in the 18th century. But he didn't foresee vacuum cleaners.

"Marconi developed the wireless fifty years ago, but he didn't make radio and television sets standard pieces of household equipment.

"No one man could. No one man did. Scientist and inventor must share credit with the manufacturer, the merchandiser, the advertising man, and the salesman for our standard of living; in fact, with all business men. They didn't invent, but they knew how to adapt. Their incentive was personal success. We owe our solid gains to the achievement of personal success. Each generation buys more with less work. Our incentive system did it. No other economic system can match our record of performance.

"So, let's don't ever restrict the freedom of the individual. Let's don't curb individual achievement. Let's don't draw up any government directed five-year plans. Government planning can't project our country's economic development. That will be done by a multitude of individuals working in unison to assure well-being for all.

"When individual reward no longer is assured, we will have passed the peak of our economic advancement."

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HEALTH TALKS

The innermost lining of the heart, the endocardium, is a mass of tiny, tiny, mouths stitched together, a type of tissue which is called vascular, meaning it has the capacity to serve as a channel for fluid. This same substance provides lock gates inside the heart, trapdoor affairs that are called valves.

Blood flows into both upper chambers of the heart, hits the lock gates in each; the gates open to permit the blood to flow into the two lower chambers; the first gates close when the lower chambers are full, and then the second gates open, permitting the blood to continue its course before they close again.

Over and over again the stream of blood hits the first gates, they open, the basin fills, the first gates close, the second gates open, the basin empties, the second gates close. Those valves of the heart, therefore, are much pushed against and much in action. And they are perhaps the parts of the heart most often damaged. Anything that disturbs the action of the endocardium usually shows up in the valve of the heart and comes under the medical heading of endocarditis, inflammation of the lining or valves of the heart.

Acute endocarditis means that either warts or sores appear in the endocardium, often caused by rheumatism or an infectious disease. It usually affects the valves of the left (pure blood) side of the heart, which are called the mitral or bicuspid valve and the aortic semilunar valve or aortic valve. Since they no longer open and close properly from being deformed by the warts or sores (ulcers), the blood does not flow as smoothly as it should and there is a noise created in the heart, a murmur.

This murmur may be a gurgle, a swish, a growl or a plunklike noise, each different sound conveying a different meaning to a physician who hears it in his stethoscope.

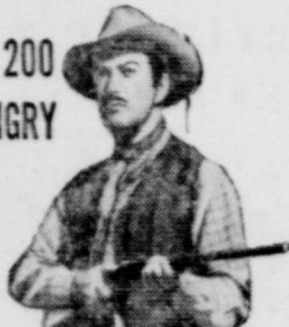

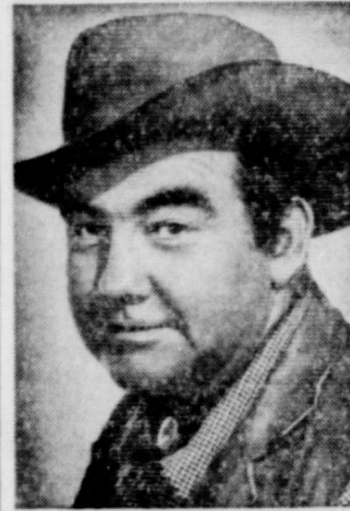

Mock Chicken Patties

1 lb. ground veal 2 tablespoons flour  
or lean pork 2 tablespoons hot fat  
2 teaspoons salt 1 can condensed  
1/2 teaspoon pepper cream of chicken  
1/2 cup rolled oats soup  
2 cup Fat Milk 1/2 cup water

Mix meat, salt, pepper, rolled oats  
and milk well. Dip hands in water,  
then shape meat mixture into 8 pat-  
ties. Roll patties in flour. Brown slow-  
ly in skillet on both sides in hot fat.  
Mix soup and water, then pour into  
skillet. Cook very slowly for 20 min-  
utes, or until soup is slightly thick-  
ened. Serve hot. Makes 4 servings.
