

#### Weeds Cost U.S. Farmers Billions of Dollars Yearly

Pests of all kinds are troublesome, but noxious weeds cause more losses than most farmers imagine. The farmer of today may be likened unto the man of the parable who sowed good seed in his field, and while men slept his enemy came and sowed tares among the wheat,

and went his way.' Estimates of losses from weeds in the United States range from 3 to 5 billions of dollars. Noxious weeds not only lower production and quality of the current crop, but such weeds as mustard and dodder if allowed to mature seed down the land for many years to come. Quack-grass, Canada thistle, hedge bindweed, and other weeds with vigorous rootstocks, spread over large losses to both present and succeed

Weeds listed as noxious vary in different states, even in adjoining states. Three kinds so listed in pracnoxious in from 20 to 35 states are spp.), corncockle, curly dock and other docks (Rumex spp.) Horseered noxious in from 10 to 19 states are Bermudagrass, chess or cheat, hoary cress, nutgrass, oxeye daisy, and pennycress. In addition to these rather widely distributed and gen-erally noxious weeds, there are 33



pens like sliding doors, only the tunnel is round and there are two doors, one overlying the other each opening to a different side Behind those doors are braces which keep them from sliding back until the right time. These spring-like braces are called chordae tendinae.

So you push against the doors which are called the mitral or bicuspid valve, and then suddenly those braces on the other side pull a torrent into the other part of

the tunnel, a basin-like affair called a left ventricle. If anything happens to those

doors or to the braces that control them, through disease or injury, it may result in too small an opening for the normal flow of blood, an obstruction called mitral stenosis, or it may cause the opening to stay open too long and not form a proper dam, a condition called mitral insufficiency

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
