A GROUP OF US was discussing the business of city government yesterday. The fact that very few people are willing to run for city offices was brought up. Helping run the city's business is — or should be — everybody's business.

Serving on city commissions, on school boards, on juries and the like is a civic responsibility — an obligation that every citizen and taxpayer should be willing to accept. Serving in these positions is often a burden. And you shouldn't expect one man to accept more than two terms in such offices. If they are willing to do so, that's fine and commendable. In any event, we should all applaud the work of our city leaders and other public officials.

Since it's hard to get people to consent to run for public jobs, we've suggested that a plan we ran into in another town might work here. In this town, the city council nominates 15 men to fill three vacancies and the 15 names along with any others who want to run are placed on the ballot. The schools there do the same thing. With a ballot of 15 or more names, voting is always brisk. The people seem to take more interest in the elections.

A lot of people wouldn't mind being on the ballot in an election like this. But you wouldn't be able to get them to run voluntarily. What do you think of something like this?

RAN INTO AN old-time salesman yesterday. He is Mr. John Bennett of Stamford and he sells Morton Salt in this section. It is mined and brought out in lump form. It is then powdered and boxed. The other way is to mine it in liquid form and, after it dries, a special process is used. Anyhow, it's interesting.

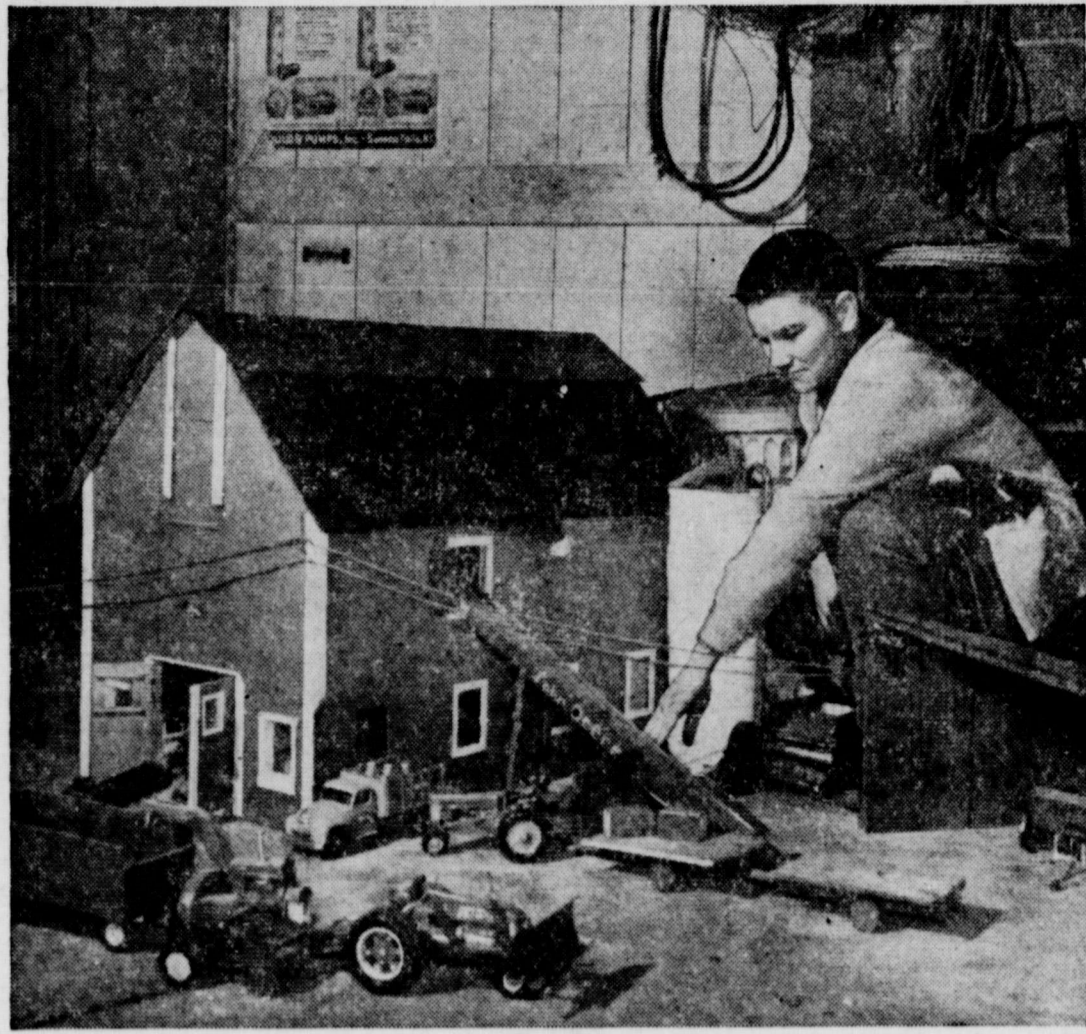

## Oil And Gas Show Is Reported For Star Co. Wildcat

An oil and gas show had been reported here today in the Star Oil Company No. 1 James Turner, wildcat oil test some six miles west of Cisco. Drilling was continuing in the test at 3,420 feet in hard Caddo lime.

The show was logged in a Straw section from 2,844 to 2,853 feet. The tools were open for one hour. Gas appeared at the surface for "a good blow." Recovery was 190 feet of oil and oil and gas cut mud and 150 feet of salt water. Shut-in tubing pressure was 960 pounds.

A drill stem test was run in the upper lime at 3,169 feet with no show reported. Permit calls for 5,000 feet. The location is in Section 8, BBB&C Survey.

Four miles northeast of Cisco, the J. P. Lohan et al No. 1 Sam Hart has been completed as a good producer. Observers said it would be "a hundred barrel well." The well flowed Monday when opened after the hydraulic treatment. Potential tests are due to be run in a few days to determine the well's ability to produce.

Nearby, the Bloomquist company's well on the Hart lease, a strong gasser with oil was being reworked. It was understood that plans called for perforations higher in the hole in an effort to obtain more oil.

Bankline Oil Company's No. 7 Evans Estate, in the same pool, was testing after being completed this week. No potential figures were available, but it was expected to be a good well.

Bankline's No. 1 Ralph Kendall was drilling at 2,300 feet. It is a Bankline-Owens pool location. In the same area, the Fleishman and Ginsberg No. 1 Wesley Methodist Church was drilling at 2,820 feet.

In the Pueblo area of Callahan County, McElroy Ranch Company's No. 1 T. G. Caudle was reported to be a Caddo lime discovery well. Tanks were being set up for completion tests.

In the south Cisco townsite pool, the Jack Hailey No. 1 Thelma Richardson was drilling at about 2,800 feet.

## BOY SCOUTS MARKING THEIR 42nd BIRTHDAY THIS WEEK

The nation's 2,900,000 Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Explorers and their adult leaders will observe Boy Scout Week, February 6-12, marking the 42nd birthday of their organization by giving the nation a unique birthday present. The Boy Scouts of America will launch a new three-year program known as "Forward . . . On Liberty's Team," a program of action designed to help keep America strong and free.

President Truman, members of Congress, Governors and national representatives of organizations and institutions throughout America will share in ceremonies during Boy Scout Week.

Twelve outstanding Eagle Scouts, chosen to represent the more than 2,900,000 members of the organization, will share in ceremonies at the White House when President Truman greets the mat 12:45 p. m. on Friday, February 8. Mr. Truman, as Honorary President of the Boy Scouts of America, is to receive a scroll stating the broad objectives of the new program.

At a breakfast in Washington with nearly 100 leaders from Cabinet, the Senate, the House of Representatives and national organizations, the twelve picked Eagle Scouts will dramatize Scouting's part in meeting the problems of these times. The Scouts will tell what the entire membership of the Boy Scouts will do next fall in their major activity of getting out the vote in the national elections.

Following the visit to the White

House February 8, the Scout party will go to Independence Hall in Philadelphia. At this national shrine, ceremonies will be held to dramatize the part played by the churches and synagogues, schools, civic and community organizations in supporting and extending Scouting throughout America.

## Federal Service Seeking Workers

Recruitment of eligibles for the position of Junior Professional Assistant in the Federal service is being intensified as an aid to the defense program, Paul H. Figg, Director, Fourteenth U. S. Civil Service Region, Dallas, said today.

More than thirty different types of positions, from Personnel Assistant to Legal Examiner, are being filled from this examination and it is assuming increasing importance in filling positions in the Federal service. A college degree or three years of progressively responsible experience in one of thirty-four optional fields is sufficient to qualify applicants, but such eligibles must also successfully pass a written test, Figg said.

Persons interested in applying for eligibility in these positions should contact the Secretary, Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, at the nearest first or second-class post office. Application blanks and additional information are maintained at all such offices.

Weeds Cost U. S. Farmers Billions of Dollars Yearly

Pests of all kinds are troublesome, but noxious weeds cause more losses than most farmers imagine. The farmer of today may be likened unto the man of the parable who "sowed good seed in his field, and while men slept his enemy came and sowed tares among the wheat, and went his way."

Weeds listed as noxious vary in different states, even in adjoining states. Three kinds so listed in practically all states are field bindweed, Canada thistle, and dodder (all species). Those that are considered noxious in from 20 to 35 states are Bermuda grass, chestnut, hoary cress, nutgrass, oxeye daisy, and pennygrass. In addition to these rather widely distributed and generally noxious weeds, there are 33 other plants considered as noxious weeds in from 2 to 9 states, and 34 others in only one state.

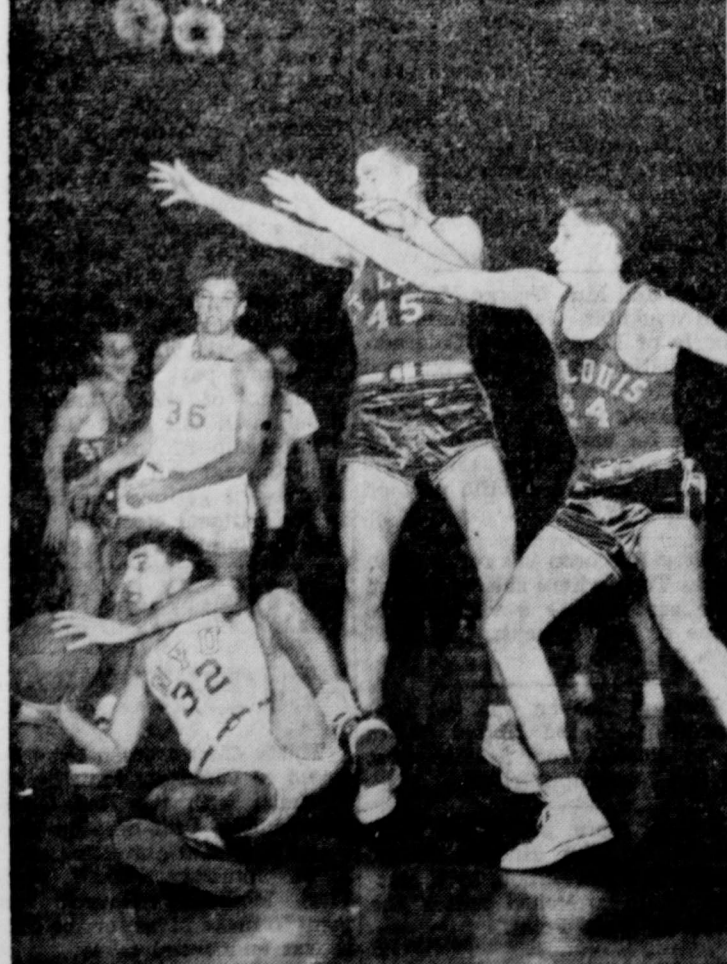

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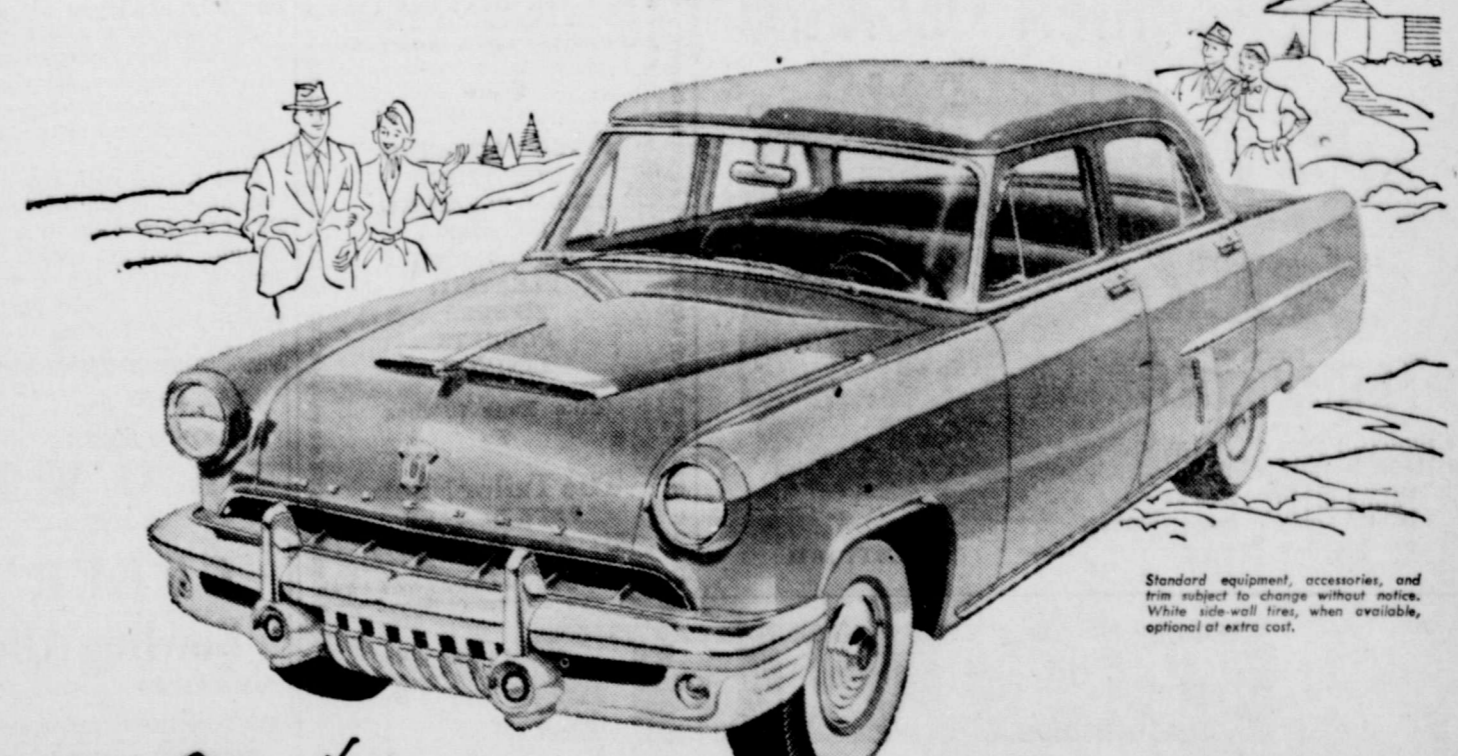
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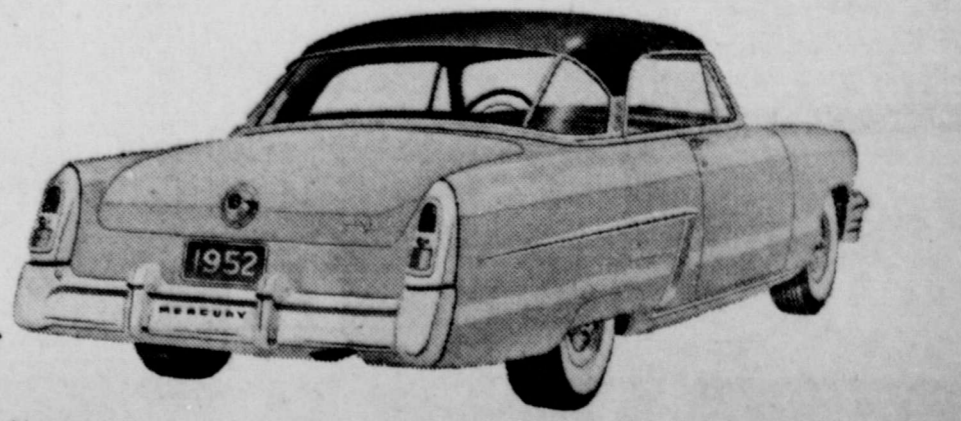

## Frankie Masters Started Out To Be Banker, But He's Top Band Man

Frankie Masters really intended to be a banker.

But a flute, a banjo and a beautiful singing voice inherited from his Welsh ancestors triumphed over his original aim, and today Frankie Masters is soundly entrenched as leader of one of the sweetest rhythm bands in the nation.

He doesn't go in for eccentricity in music. He stresses melody, with tantalizing rhythm and appealing vocals.

The Masters musical success story goes back to the University of Indiana, where he discovered that the banjo would get him further in college activities. He earned his way through the entire course of economics and finance by strumming banjo at fraternity dances, and by his senior year was known as the music king of the campus.

Meanwhile, he had organized a college band which did so well that it was booked through the Orient on the liner "President Madison," with Maestro Masters and his college boys each being paid the munificent sum of \$15 a week.

Banking was still his goal in life, he thought, so after returning from the three months tour, Masters returned to his home town and became a teller. He couldn't resist doing engagements "on the side" and one day he suddenly realized that what he actually wanted was a musical career.

Leaving banking forever, he joined a band that was playing in a Chicago theater, and for the next few years barnstormed around various theaters in the Windy City.

Getting together a combination of topflight musicians, he formed his own organization and started to play at Chicago night spots. He was an instantaneous success.

Two years later he opened at the Roosevelt Hotel and clicked

overnight with sophisticated New York patrons. After a season there, he left on a cross-country theater tour with Betty Grable and Rochester.

Back in New York, he signed with Columbia Broadcasting Company and did a lot of recording work besides appearing on CBS's "Magic Carpet," "Show of the Week," "Fitch Bandwagon," "Coca-Cola Spotlight Bands," "It Can Be Done," "Household Finance" and other shows on NBC, ABC and Mutual.

Frankie Masters is a triple threat man, for not only does he lead his own band, but he does many of the vocals and writes music as well. One of the greatest hits he penned was "Scatterbrain," a tricky novelty number.

Now the success of his television shows in Chicago has opened a new facet of show business for him — one that promises to offer him new and brilliant success in this great field.

Masters holds the all-time attendance and length of run records at the Boulevard Room of the Stevens Hotel in Chicago, where he recently concluded an engagement that originally was set for six months, and stretched into two years.

## HEALTH TALKS

Suppose you were a fat red corpuscle, sailing down the blood stream in a boat. First off, that boat would have to be a cage-like affair because you're going to meet with some rough sailing. So instead of a regular boat, you might imagine that you are in a cage-shaped boat, and you might as well have it made of iron while you're at it. So that makes you, a red corpuscle, riding the stream in an iron like meglobin.

You hop aboard that boat in the bottom part of the lungs and sail down a pretty stream known as the pulmonary vein, "pulmonary" meaning relating to the lungs and "vein" meaning a channel that carries blood to the heart. You sail along fairly smoothly until you hit a tunnel where your pulmonary vein and the other three pulmonary veins all come together; with four converging streams, the water gets pretty rough and to top it off, it's a tunnel — dark.

That tunnel with the four converging streams is the first chamber of the heart known as the left atrium. You get tossed about in there a short distance and then, suddenly, you wham into a dam. This is a special kind of dam that

opens like sliding doors, only the tunnel is round and there are two doors, one overlying the other each opening to a different side. Behind those doors are braces which keep them from sliding back until the right time. These spring-like braces are called chordae tendinae.

So you push against the doors, which are called the mitral or bicuspid valve, and then suddenly those braces on the other side pull the doors back and you swish in a torrent into the other part of

the tunnel, a basin-like affair called a left ventricle. If anything happens to those doors or to the braces that control them, through disease or injury, it may result in too small an opening for the normal flow of blood, an obstruction called mitral stenosis, or it may cause the opening to stay open too long and not form a proper dam, a condition called mitral insufficiency.
