## Most Of State Is Still In Need Of **Rain For Crops**

Drought breaking rains along the upper Coast and parts of East 1952 season in those favored areas during the past week. Most of the State, however, continued dry with strong northwest winds causing serious soil erosion on poorly covered fields in the High Plains. A haze of dust covered

the entire State. Wheat in the northwest was temperatures prevailed. How- bert Hansen here. ever, cutworms were spreading and causing increasing damage in the northern counties of the Low Rolling Plains. Flaxseed in all parts of the winter growing area Flint. of south Texas needed moisture. The crop started under favorable conditions and growing temperatures have been desirable all winter but very little additional rainfall has been received since the crop was planted. Growers in the spring crop flaxseed area need moisture before land can

be fully prepared for planting. Supplies of hardy type commercial vegetables were plentiful in irrigated Lower Valley, Winter Garden, Laredo, and Eagle

Livestock was holding up re-markably well on the limited feed supply as temperatures continued unusually mild. Clover and small grain pastures over the eastern third of the State were coming along and last week's drought breaking rains in parts of that favored area were most welcome.

Dry soil was holding new feed practically at a stand still in most remaining areas even though temperatures were very favorable for new growth to start. Settling dust from last week's storm will lower palatability of the short dry grasses which is still available. In the northwest wheat was still supplying fair

### School Week To Be Observed In Baird March 2-8

Representatives from nearly every club or group of people in Baird met Thursday, January 31, at the High School to discuss plans for Texas Public Schools Week from March 2-8.

This will be the second annual observance of Public Schools Week. The slogan this year is "Texas Public Schools-Democracy In Action." The purpose of this week is to acquaint the community with the public school.


