The Gay Philosopher

THE "AH's the "OM's" you're hearing are coming from the First National Bank and from people who are seeing for the first time the first completed panel of a mural that Artist Randy Steffen is painting. The mural will be in the space just above the teller's cages.

The initial panel, an 8-foot section, went up Saturday afternoon. Artist Steffen spent most of two full months to paint it. The entire mural will be a story of a century in Texas — 1850 to 1950. The completed work will be 40 foot long, and work now begins on the second panel — a 24-foot section.

The first panel tells the story of 30 years — 1850 to 1870 — and depicts the Texas trail driver of 1850, the death of the confederacy from 1861 to 1865, and the Red Man's last stand in 1870. The mural in oils is a genuine work of art. The colors are outstanding. In their open house some months ago, the Bank printed up a sketch of the mural and prepared a story it was to tell. We'll recount the small portion devoted to the period 1850-1870. Read it and see if it doesn't tell the story. It follows:

In Texas the year 1850 saw the great trail drivers of a cattle trail terminals for eastern markets at their peak. This was a time of great disturbance from Indian trouble as the white 'encroacher' moved ever westward. Here is pictured the old trail driver before the Alamo where the Spirit of Texas was born in the 1836 massacre. San Antonio, appropriately shown, was a terminal for early day cattle barons. Cisco was just 'Red Gap' in those days. A wagon camp about 50 miles west of the Chisholm Trail to Abilene, Kansas, and 50 miles south of the Goodnight-Loving trail to Denver. The Indian depicted with his buffalo economy (in phantom) could sense his own doom — so Comanches were killed.

Then came the most terrible of all our national epochs — the bloody carnage of Civil War — 1861 to 1865 — the war between the states when southern brother and northern brother fought and each for his cause. Texas boys died for the Confederate cause — a tragic loss cause against the industrialized north.

Now go look at the first section of the mural.

THE FIRST PANEL of the mural, you will note, hasn't been permanently mounted. It is due to go to Austin in April for a special showing at a meeting of the Texas Federation of Artists. After that it will come home to be permanently mounted and framed and to stay.

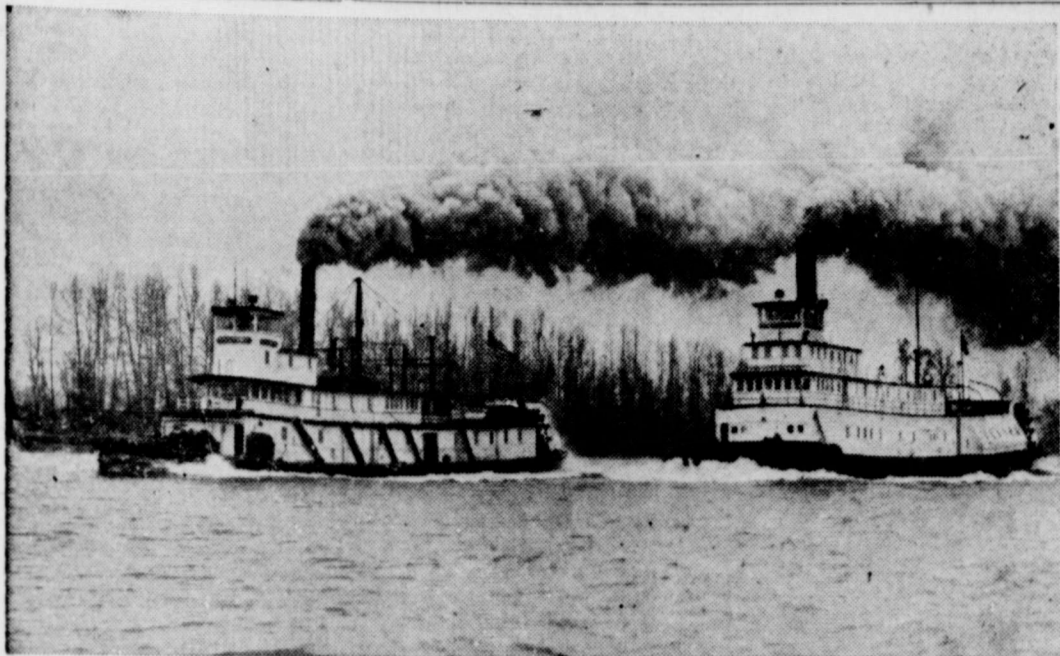

Remodeling Work Is Started For Penney Building

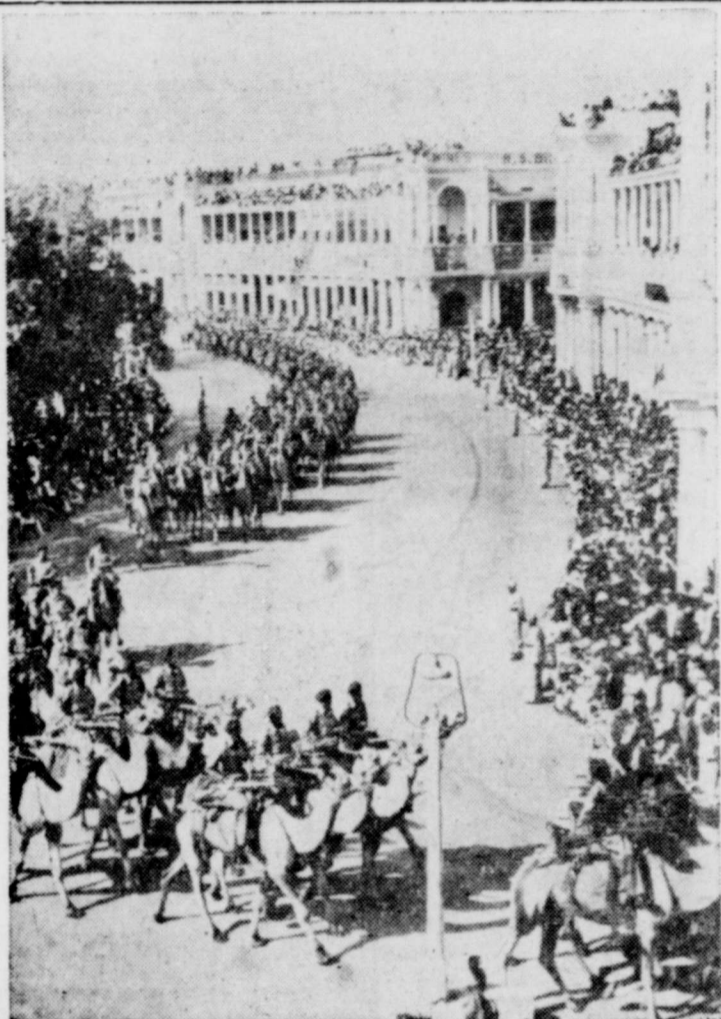

Two Championship Games On Program

The second game of the play-off series will be in Comanche Thursday night. If a third game is needed the site will be determined by a coin toss following the second game.

The Midgets will go into tonight's game with only three defeats for the season. They have lost to Olden, Albany and Ballinger. They avenged the losses to Olden and Albany by defeating the two teams in the tournament held last week.

The Loboes and the Indians go into the play-off game tonight with one conference loss each. The only other losses suffered by the Loboes this season were to Stephenville and to Clyde. Clyde won their district Saturday night by defeating Cross Plains in a game at Brownwood.

Coaches Overall and Tatum will probably start Jim Webb, Doug Johnson, Irvin Brunkenhoefer, Bob Black and H. L. Youngblood in tonight's game while Coach Bill Sledge will probably start Harold Hammett, Tommy Reynolds, Bill Smith, Alpha Elder and Joe Wayne Farrow.

The largest crowd of the season was expected at the gym tonight. Comanche has reserved 250 seats for the game and fully that many fans were expected to follow the Indians here for the game.

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Training Schools Begun By Baptists

DALLAS, Feb. 18. — More than 40,000 Texans are expected to attend Baptist Sunday School simultaneous training schools February 18-22, according to Andrew Q. Allen, Sunday School secretary of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

A total of 180 group schools in 41 associations have been planned. To teach in these 180 schools 1,000 workers have been enlisted. Several of the nightly schools will be conducted simultaneously in the larger cities of the state. Dallas Association will hold 17 schools and seek to enroll 10,000. Fort Worth has set a 6,000 enrollment goal in 15 schools, and Houston plans to enlist 15,000 in 20 group schools.

Books for every age group will be taught in the simultaneous schools, which last year enrolled 38,925.

Association leaders will report to the state Sunday School office on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday evenings by telegram so that reports may be mimeographed and sent to all 31 associations by return mail.

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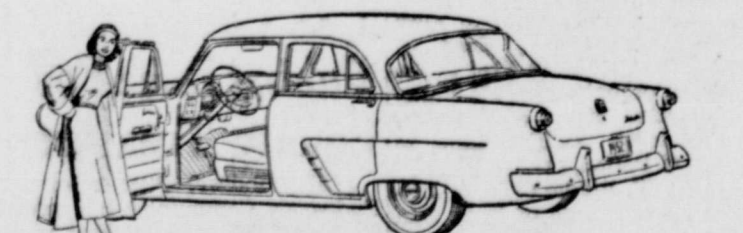

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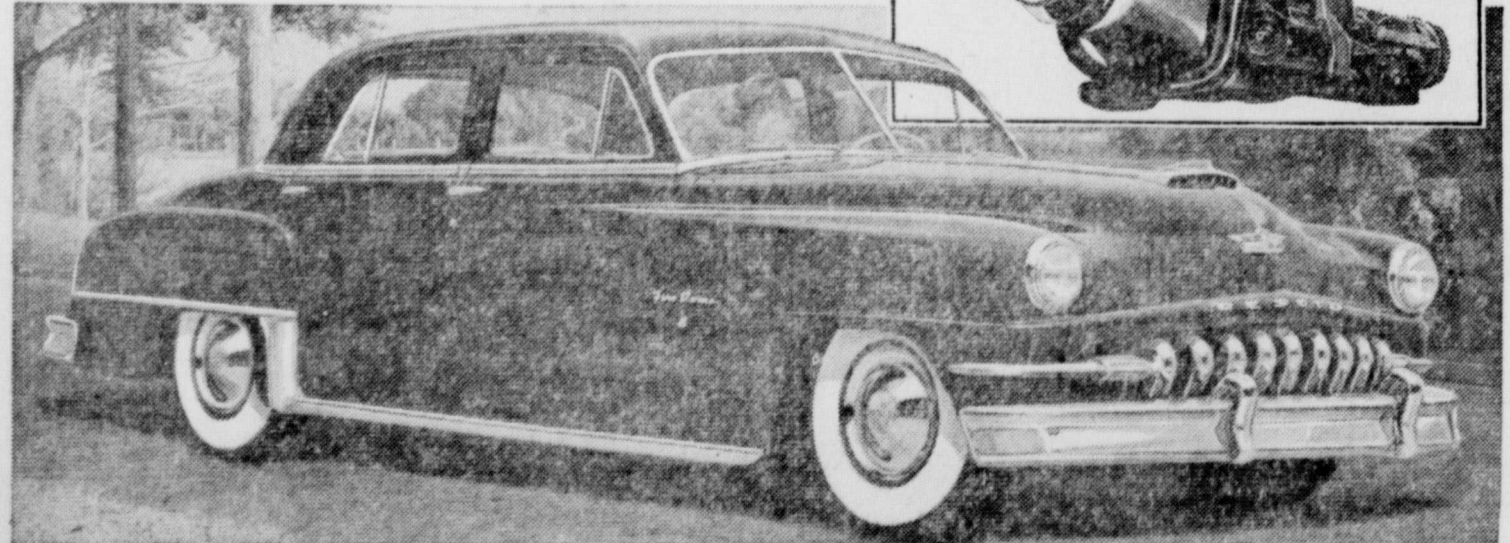
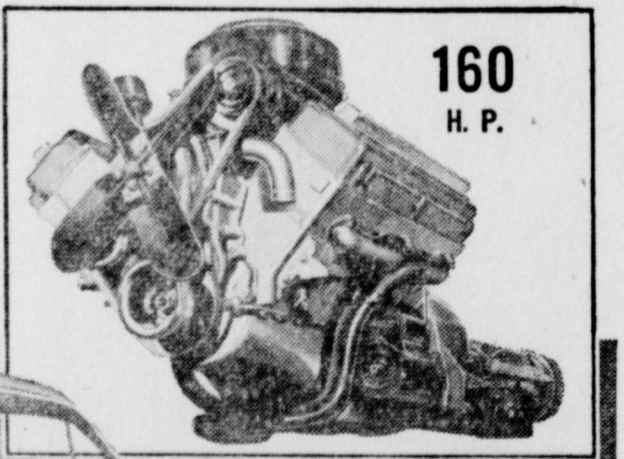
