One of the most interesting parts of the book is the use of the cinquain, a verse form introduced by Adelaid Crapsey but used frequently. The cinquains are five line poems and Miss Pyle has made her book more entertaining by their use

The poems in the volume are divided into four groups: Heart Songs, Nature, Miscellaneous and

The honor of having her poems published is nothing new to Miss Pyle. While atending college at Howard-Payne in Brownwood she wrote and had published her first effort. The poem, a sonnet "To Ruskin" won first prize in the school paper's poetry contest. Her second prize winner was "Your Handclasp" which was entered in the Tri-State Fair poetry contest held in Amarillo in 1931. 
