SPRING LIVESTOCK TOUR IS SET FOR MARCH 8 IN EASTLAND CO.

The route of the annual spring livestock tour to be held next Saturday, March 8, has been designated, according to an announcement by Sutton P. Crofts, Cisco, president of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association, sponsors of the tour.

For the first time in many years the tour will be through the southeast part of the county and the group will see sheep, milk goats,

beef and dairy cattle at seven different stops.

The tour is scheduled to leave from the City Hall at Eastland at 9:15 o'clock that morning, returning about 3:30 o'clock that afternoon.

The first stop will be at the W. H. Hailey farm in the Staff Community to see his Columbia and Rambouillet sheep. On the I. S. Echols farm in the same community the group will see Toggenburg milk goats as being bred and sold by Echols. He also has some goats mixed with Nubian strain.

On the Ed Harrison ranch between Desdemona and Gorman the group will inspect some of his registered Hereford cattle of the Real Domino B and other prominent bloodlines.

The beef steers fed out by Boyd Hilley will be the first stop after lunch at the Fire Hall in Gorman. The registered Herefords of Dr. D. V. Rodgers will be inspected as well as the Jersey herd on the Jake Caraway and L. R. Higginbottom dairy farms in the Kokomo Community before the tour returns to Eastland.

Members of the organization as well as any others interested in the improvement of the livestock industry in the county are cordially invited to go along on the tour, Crofts said.

Patrons And Parents Invited To Public School Week Events

Volume Of Poetry Written By Miss Pyle Published By New York Firm

Miss Doris Joe Pyle, teacher of English at Cisco High School, has published a volume of lyric poetry which has just come off the press. The book, published by The Poetry Digest of New York City, contains 66 poems and is called "Crushed Opals."

One of the most interesting parts of the book is the use of the cinquain, a verse form introduced by Adelaide Crapsey but used frequently. The cinquains are five line poems and Miss Pyle has made her book more entertaining by their use.

The poems in the volume are divided into four groups: Heart Songs, Nature, Miscellaneous and Cinquains.

The honor of having her poems published is nothing new to Miss Pyle. While attending college at Howard-Payne in Brownwood she wrote and had published her first effort. The poem, a sonnet "To Ruskin" won first prize in the school paper's poetry contest. Her second prize winner was "Your Handclasp" which was entered in the Tri-State Fair poetry contest held in Amarillo in 1931. The poem won third prize in the contest which was entered by writers from Texas, New Mexico and Colorado.

She has had poems published in The Poet's Scroll, The Lantern, Delta Kappa Gamma Bulletin, Texas Parent Teacher, Texas Outlook, Poets On Parade, Wings Over The Classroom, National Poetry Anthology and New American Poetry.

Four poems published in Wings Over The Classroom, "On Sending Out My First Manuscript," "Pagan Worship," "Vignettes" and "Futility," won honorable mention and words of commendation from the editor of the publication who said: "It has been a great delight to read and publish your work."

Miss Pyle is a member of the Texas Poetry Society. She is past president of Beta Upsilon Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma and a member of Alpha Chi, honor scholarship society.

French M. Robertson, Abilene independent producer and the Association's District Vice-President, said Windfohr would address oil men and civic leaders from West Central Texas at a reception and dinner at the Windsor Hotel, beginning at 6 p. m. Robertson and local directors of the Texas Mid-Continent will be hosts for the occasion.

"Mr. Windfohr is touring the state to discuss the Association's program with petroleum industry leaders in the various regions," Robertson said. "Because he is looked to as a spokesman for the industry in Texas, we expect a large turnout."

Windfohr will be accompanied to Abilene by two of the Texas Mid-Continent's administrative officers, Andrew M. Howsley of Albany, Vice-President and General Counsel, and Charles E. Simmons of Dallas, Executive Vice-President.

The Texas Mid-Continent chief, an independent oil operator, was elected to his present post last October at the Association's annual meeting in Beaumont. He succeeded R. B. Anderson of Vernon. He is a partner in the oil firms of Nash and Windfohr, and Nash, Windfohr and Brown. He entered the oil business in 1921 at Breckenridge and drilled his first well at Graham, where he lived before moving to Fort Worth a few years ago.

Constantly active in petroleum industry problems, Windfohr was one of the original committee of 55 Texas oil men who championed the state conservation laws at the time of their initiation during the turbulent 1930's.

He is a director of the First National Bank of Fort Worth, a director of the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, and vice-president and director of the Fort Worth Air Terminal, Inc.
