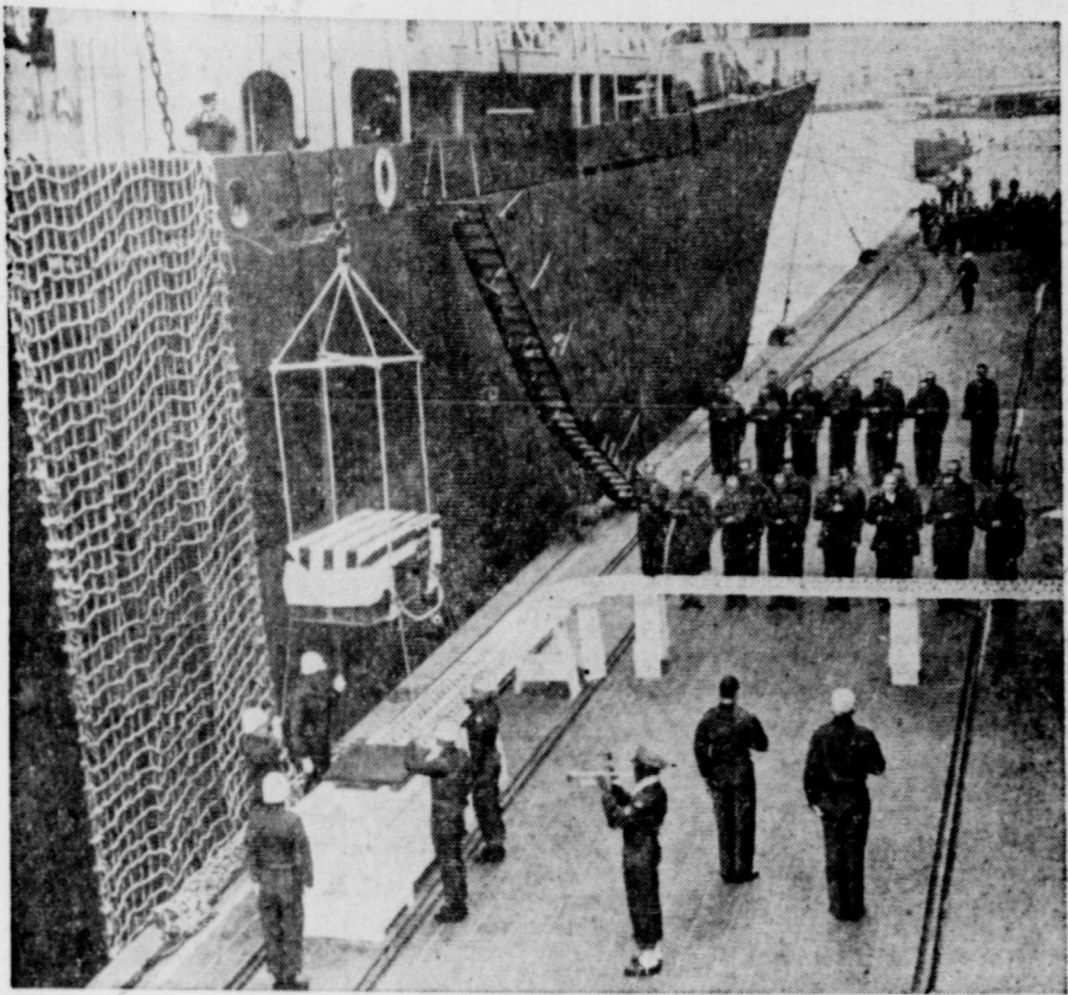

In the hospital as a result of the accident were Mrs. Claude McBeth and her daughter, Brenda. Both were said to have received painful bruises and scratches and possible head injuries. Brenda was thrown from the car by the impact which turned the McBeth car over and rolled it into a tree in the yard of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Leach.

Mrs. McBeth was driving east on West 14th, taking Brenda to a Valentine party at the East Cisco Baptist Church, when the accident occurred. Texas leads all states in the United States with 660 clubs and over 35,000 members, Mr. Shore said. He added that this district has 70 clubs with over 5,000 members.

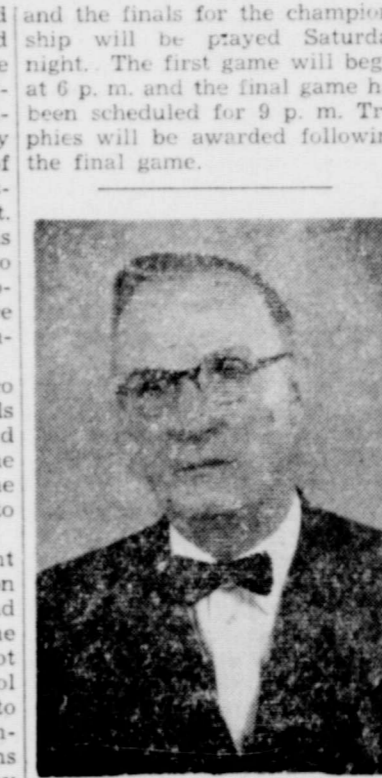

## Plasma Will Go To Korean Front

Signing up the 200 Cisco citizens who will give of their blood to help save the lives of American fighting men in Korea will begin next week, Mrs. W. W. Wallace, chairman of the committee in charge of the Cisco Blood Clinic announced today.

Plans for the sign-up were made at a meeting of the committee Thursday. Cards to be filled out and signed by prospective donors will be available next week, and an effort will be made to reach every person between the ages of 18 and 60 years who wishes to give blood at the clinic to be held at the First Methodist Church on March 6, Mrs. Wallace said.

"We are not going to stop at 200 donors," said Mrs. Wallace. "We intend to give every person a chance to give the blood that is needed so desperately to save the lives of our service men on the war fronts. If the number runs over the limit that can be handled on March 6, another clinic will be held at a date in the near future."

"The problem we have is that of reaching the people who want to give. I know that there are many times 200 people in Cisco who want to give blood and we are trying to give every one of them a chance to do so. But some are certain to be missed and for that reason we will have the cards at the Chamber of Commerce, the Cisco Daily Press and at other locations where they may be signed. Cards will also be made available through the various clubs and civic organizations, she said.

Blood given at clinic will be processed in a Fort Worth laboratory and delivered to the Defense Department for use on the battlefronts. The Red Cross mobile blood unit will take the blood but the Red Cross is serving only as a collector for the Armed Forces. The plasma will not be used in any blood bank, it was emphasized, but all of it will go to the defense department to be used in saving the lives of American fighting men abroad.

Highway Week Observance Showed Interest In Good Road, Chief Says

AUSTIN, Feb. 15.—Results of the observance of Texas Highway Week, January 27-February 2, show conclusively the highway users of Texas want to keep their roads in top condition, according to officials of the Texas Good Roads Association.

The Week was observed throughout the state, with the fullest cooperation of Chamber of Commerce highway committees and newspaper and radio publicity. In addition, speakers appeared before more than 400 service clubs, telling of highway conditions and needs.

"It is very obvious from every report we have had that the users of highways recognize the need of continuing good roads in Texas," said J. H. Kuitgen, Waco automobile dealer and president of the TGRA. "When Governor Allan Shivers proclaimed Highway Week, in observance of the 35th anniversary of the creation of the State Highway Department, we felt future action of this association should be charted in accordance to the observance.

"The statements made by Governor Shivers; Chairman E. H. Thornton of the Highway Commission; Mayor Armistead Rust of San Angelo, president of the League of Texas Municipalities; and Judge George Purpus of Corpus Christi, president of the County Judges and Commissioners Association over a state wide radio hook-up were direct and to the point. There is no doubt now in our minds the people want and will insist on good highways, built by an honest and efficient highway department.

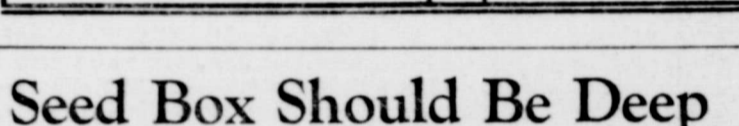

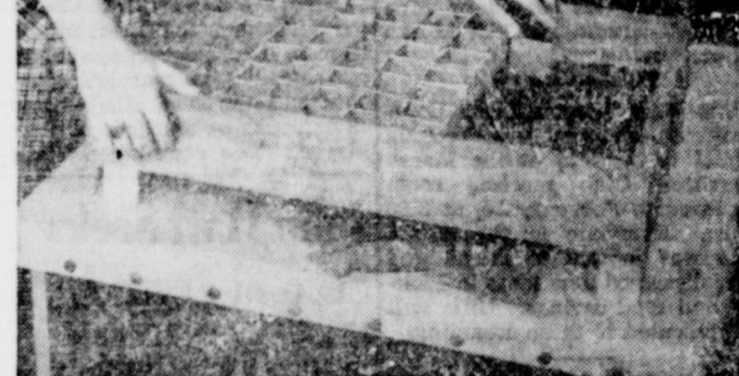

Seed Box Should Be Deep Enough to Nourish Plants



Plant Bands in a Standard Seed Flat.

If you plan to start flower or vegetable seeds indoors this spring, before it is safe to sow them in the garden, don't pave the way to failure by using inadequate equipment.

**Palace To Premier Marine Film**

An all-Texas premier of the new U. S. Pictures production for Warner Bros., "Retreat, Hell!" in honor of Texas-born Marine Corps Maj. Gen. O. P. Smith, will be held throughout the Lone Star State beginning the middle of February as a tribute to the fighting exploits of the 1st Marine Division in the battle of the Chosin Reservoir and the breakout to the sea at Hungnam in North Korea. It was Gen Smith, commanding the division, who made the comment destined to go down in American history: "Retreat, Hell! We are just attacking in a different direction."

The picture will play at the Palace Theater Sunday and Monday.

Gen. Smith is now the Commanding General at Camp Pendleton, California, where "Retreat, Hell!" was filmed with the cooperation of the Marine Corps. Frank Lovejoy, Richard Carlson, Rusty Tamblin and Anita Louise have the starring roles in the motion picture. Hundreds of Marine veterans of the Korean fighting participated in the battle sequences depicted in the production, for which Captain Benjamin S. Read, a Purple Heart survivor of the Chosin action, was the technical adviser. Included in the cast were Peter Ortiz, a Colonel in the Marine Corps reserve and one of World War II's most decorated fighting men, Mort Thompson, a Marine captain in World War II, and Joseph Keans, who was mustered out of the Marine Corps just in time to put the uniform on again as an actor.

Milton Sperling, who wrote and produced "Retreat, Hell!", was also a Marine captain during World War II and is now a major in the Marine Corps Reserve.

The Texas premiere showings of "Retreat, Hell!", will launch the nationwide presentation of the motion picture. The action shown in the film covers the Inchon landings, capture of Seoul and the North Korean campaign in which Gen. Smith led the 1st Marine Division.

Gen. Smith, a native of Menard, Texas, is a veteran of more than thirty-three years of Marine Corps service and is considered one of

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America's top amphibious warfare experts. During World War II he served at Peleliu, Cape Gloucester and Okinawa. His numerous honors and decorations include the Distinguished Service Cross, the Silver Star Medal, the Air Medal, the Legion of Merit with Oak Leaf Cluster, the Bronze Star Medal and many others.

Gen. Smith's connections with Texas are not limited to his birthplace in the Lone Star State. His first sea duty was as Commanding Officer of the Marine Detachment aboard the USS Texas in 1921.
