

## The Gay Philosopher

IF MR. MARSTON Surles of the Surles Dairy doesn't make a lot of money, it's not because he doesn't get up early enough in the morning. Seven days a week, he gets out of bed at 3 a. m. to begin his daily chores. And his work day usually includes some hours of work. His Sundays are somewhat lighter, as he does only the essentials on Sundays.

WENT OUT TO the Surles Dairy yesterday afternoon for a look. It was 4 p. m. and milking time. Cleanliness is the watchword from the time the cows come from the pasture until your bottle of Grade A Raw Milk is opened at the dinner table.

The barn is spotless. Concrete floors are washed down after every milking and treated with chemicals. The cows are turned out to the pasture at a time. They know which stall is theirs and lead straight to it.

Each cow's bag is washed thoroughly and then electric milkers are hooked up. Marston says the cows had rather be milked by machinery than by hand. After each group is milked, the milk goes to the cooling machine. Here it is strained and runs down over coils to cool it.

Next, the milk goes to the bottling machine. This gadget fills the bottles and caps them. The bottles are then placed in a walk-in refrigerator — ready for delivery truck next morning. Another room houses the bottle washing department. The bottles go through three separate vats and a scrub brush to insure cleanliness.

ALTHOUGH THEY have some Jersey cows, there is an average of 40 or so milked twice daily. Right now, the 39 milkers are giving 120 gallons a day. Surles Dairy delivers milk to 275 retail customers in Cisco. Most of the grocery stores also sell Surles milk.

UNDER THEIR Grade A permit, Surles Dairy has to meet the requirements of the city and state. These requirements are strict indeed. In fact, Grade A milk requirements are such that you get the same milk (in quality) as pasteurized milk.

In other words, pasteurization takes any kind of milk and makes it safe. And the requirements of producers of Grade A milk are calculated to assure you of the same thing.

As a matter of fact, Surles milk is way below the minimum for bacteria count requirements. And it gives you almost twice as much butter fat as the law requires.

MARSTON OPERATES as a farmer, too, when it rains. The same place has 320 acres and he has an additional 310 acres leased. Some 170 acres are in cultivation, and the balance is in pasture. It has been three years since they made a crop. No rain.

The dairy was founded by Marston's dad and has been operating many years. The drought has cut heavily into profits.

They have an attractive residence at the dairy where The Surleses live.

THEY'VE STRUCK water out at Mr. Charles Sandler's place on 24th Street. Drilling stopped at 272 feet after cutting 20 feet of water sand. The well will pump 2500 gallons per day, which Mr. Sandler feels is adequate to keep his yard watered.

The driller has moved over to sink a well for Dr. Chief Brown, and we understand they're getting along nicely.

MR. CHARLES F. Hemphill, the oil man, made a tour of the Press printing department yesterday. He watched the big press run and saw the linotypes in action. ## OVER 150 ANIMALS EXPECTED IN COUNTY STOCK SHOW FRIDAY

The annual Eastland County Livestock Show and Horse Show will open in Eastland Friday at the old airport and officials of the show announced that everything was ready for what was expected to be a successful event.

More than 150 animals were expected to be entered in the show to compete for the \$1,000 in cash prizes. All animals must be in their places by 10 a. m. on the opening day and must remain at the show through Saturday, it was reported by the officials.

Judging will begin Saturday morning at 8:30 o'clock and continue through the day. An auction sale will be held in connection with the show but exhibitors may hold the stock until the following Tuesday when it may be auctioned at the Eastland sales barn.

Friday and Saturday evenings there will be a horse show and roping contests at the Sig Faircloth and Pete Tindall of Eastland are in charge of horse show arrangements. The horse show will include all classes in Palmino and Quarter Horse divisions. The calf roping contests will include jackpot roping and the regular contests. Many of the top ropers of the area were expected to enter.

The rules governing past shows will prevail in the livestock divisions with each boy allowed to enter no more than three fat steers, three fat barrows and 10 fat sheep.

Dairy cattle will be judged on a classification basis in that they are competing against the ideal dairy animal. Cash prizes of \$250 will be awarded to winners of the dairy divisions.

Most cash prizes will be \$10.00, \$6.00 and \$4.00 with ribbons going to all winners through sixth place.

The show is being sponsored by the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association and the group will afford free transportation to Fort Worth for club boys following the show. While there the boys will visit the Fort Worth stockyards, the zoo and other points of interest. A special bus will take the boys on the one day trip.

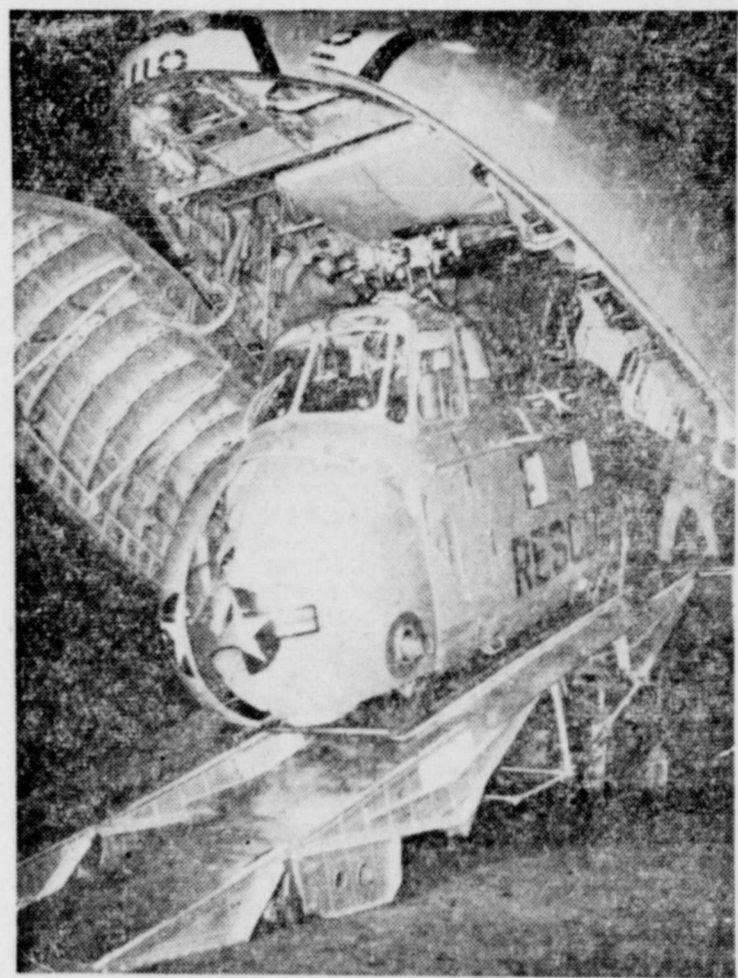

## GROWTH OF POTTERY PLANT IS OUTLINED IN LIONS CLUB TALK

The N. D. Gallagher Clay Products Company, manufacturers of flower pots, is making a considerable contribution to the industrial income of the Cisco area, Manager E. C. Whitaker of the company told members of the Lions Club in a talk Wednesday at the weekly luncheon meeting.

The company, whose plant is located just east of town on Highway 80, now is making and selling each year some 3,000,000 flower pots of all sizes to markets throughout the southwest. The company was formed in 1946 and after a slow start it began growing, and the growth has been steady for the past few years.

Some 13 full-time employees are on the firm's payroll. Mr. Whitaker predicted continued growth for the company because its products are good and the market outlook is good.

Lion Jack Anderson, who was in charge of the program, paid tribute to the work of Mr. Whitaker in the success of the plant. Mr. Whitaker joined the plant some five years ago and its progress has been steady.

Mr. Whitaker expressed the belief that a number of small manufacturing plants would be developed as much or more to the Cisco area as would one big plant. He noted that the ceramics outlook here was good for the reason that Cisco clay is very good for various clay products.

Each member of the club was given a tiny clay pot.

## HEALTH TALKS

When the blood flows through the arteries under pressure greater than normal, for any cause, it creates a tenseness in the arteries, a tight stretchiness of those tubes which is called hypertension. When the blood flows through the arteries at less than the normal rate, whatever the cause, the tubes that carry the blood are not tight enough, are sort of flabby, and the condition is called hypotension.

There are wide variations in the possible tensions of those arteries, of course, so that the same flow of blood which in one person would create very tense arteries in another might not be sufficient to stretch the arteries enough for even normal tension. The size of the heart, the diameter of the arteries, the size and the activities of the person are just some of the varied conditions that enter into the picture of tension of the blood-carrying vessels.

When the tenseness of the vessels keeps the heart itself from relaxing properly, it is called hypertensive heart disease.
