# Federated Club Convention Opens Monday

## THREE COMMISSIONERS WILL BE NAMED IN ELECTION ON TUESDAY

Three members of the City Commission will be elected by the voters of Cisco when they go to the polls on Tuesday, April 1, for the annual city election. All voting will be at the city hall, and the polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. Election judges are: Otto Kean, Mrs. James Flournoy, Mrs. Claude McBeth, J. V. Heyser, Sr., Riram McCantles and Sutton Crofts. The ballot will contain the names of seven men in the following order: Tom D. Smallwood, J. W. Sitton, Charles L. Cofer, John Dunn, Charles L. Moad, J. W. Slaughter and Joe Britain.

## Group Sets Crop Acreage Goals In County For Year

According to E. E. Blackwell, Ranger, chairman of the Eastland County Agricultural Mobilization Committee, crop production goals for 1952 for different crops grown in Eastland County for defense purposes have been set.

An acreage goal for cotton was named at 5,000 acres, Blackwell said. Due to the fact that cotton is planted in the county from April through June it is felt that this goal will likely be reached. Grain sorghum acreage has been set for 35,000 acres with corn acreage named at 3,000 acres. The peanut goal for the year is 30,000 acres. The Agricultural Mobilization Committee thinks there will be no difficulty in reaching the 35,000 acreage grain sorghum goal or the 30,000 acre peanut goal.

Corn acreage will likely be short unless adequate moisture for planting and germinating corn is available in the immediate future. These four crops are specifically named for defense purposes for which national, state and county goals have been named. The county crop goals were set by the State Agricultural Mobilization Committee and accepted by the County Agriculture Mobilization Committee.

Cisco is my home town and I am interested only in doing what I think is best for its continued advancement."

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## Cisco Chamber of Commerce PROGRAM OF WORK for 1952

Developed from the suggestions of Cisco citizens during Community Clinic Week.

### AGRICULTURE

Major Project — Development of good marketing facilities for all agricultural products, utilizing facilities such as livestock show barn and marketing shed.

Continue to encourage dairy development. Promote experiments in drought resistant and winter grasses for livestock ranges.

Encourage and assist development of new sources of agricultural income, such as a broiler industry, turkey raising, vegetable and fruit growing.

Cooperate with farm agency groups in all programs for benefit of farmer and rancher.

Encourage farmer-business man meetings for better understanding and closer cooperation between Cisco and the agricultural territory it serves.

Work with retail trade committee to promote better retail service to our farming areas.

### COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Major Project — Work with City and other agencies in planning and carrying out a thorough city-wide clean-up and beautification.

Cooperate in a mosquito eradication campaign.

Assist the fire department and local insurance agencies in anti-fire hazard campaign.

Working with Community Chest to insist that all general charitable agencies depending upon public subscription, combine their appeals in one annual drive to save manpower and in order that these appeals may be subject to more careful scrutiny and local control.

### HIGHWAY DEVELOPMENT

Major Project — Seek the improvement of U. S. Highway 80 between the viaduct over the MKT railroad and the east city limits to connect with new two-lane construction.

Continue to work for the installation of signal lights on the Sixth Street Texas and Pacific crossing.

Promote development of farm-to-market roads to serve rural areas.

Beautification of highways through Cisco.

Improvement of U. S. Highway 183 (D avenue) through Cisco.

Seek resurfacing the access road to the Lake Cisco swimming pool and park area.

Work to promote more tourist trade in Cisco.

### EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Major Project — Assist in promoting a program of vocational and adult education through the Cisco High School and the Cisco Junior college, including vocational training for high school youth, farm engineering courses in Cisco Junior College, and trade extension courses in adult education.

Study possibilities for building a new, modern high school plant.

A survey of the Cisco area to determine the demand for specific courses in adult education as the basis for junior college planning.

Encourage addition of courses in driver training to the public school curriculum.

### INDUSTRIAL COMMITTEE

Major Project — Develop a local Industrial Foundation to assist worthy new local industries and outside industries that may seek to establish themselves in Cisco.

Conduct a contest for ideas that may be used for the promotion of small industries in Cisco.

Support existing industries to the fullest extent.

Conduct an advertising campaign to attract industrial interest in Cisco's opportunities.

### MILITARY AFFAIRS

Major Project — Cooperate with the defense department in any program seeking to utilize Cisco facilities in defense development.

Support the Cisco National Guard unit in every possible way.

### RECREATION

Major Project — Development of a long range, city wide program of supervised youth and adult recreation based on a permanent financing plan, including youth center.

Support the American Legion, the City, the Country Club and the Presbyterian Encampment in improving the facilities and the appeal of the Lake Cisco area as a recreational center.

### RETAIL TRADE DEVELOPMENT

Major Project — Conduct a survey of frank trade territory opinion regarding Cisco as a trade center with a view to assisting merchants in sounder, more effective merchandising.

Sponsor more promotional demonstrations, trade trips, etc., to develop goodwill for Cisco.

### WATER SUPPLY

Major Project — Investigate the possibilities for financing a program of increased water supply through utilization of Battle Creek diversion or similar projects.

Cooperate with neighboring communities to the fullest possible extent in water conservation and development projects planned by them.

Insist upon adequate steps to insure Cisco of its priority of right to water resources within its area.

The projects enumerated above represent a careful summation and analysis of the many suggestions received through the Clinic Week Program. Numerous other and worthy suggestions were received but could not for want of space be included. They are not to be considered as discarded. They will remain in the file of ideas for constant reference and from time to time, as opportunity or need arises these other projects may be added to the overall program.

It is the plan of the Chamber of Commerce to prosecute these goals through the medium of special and standing committees on which you may be asked to serve.

We trust you will respond to the call for service.

We thank each person, young and old, whose thought and interest made possible this program of Work.

## Letters

Editor:

We, the harassed parents of two of the under-age drivers about whom some worried citizens wrote the Mayor of Cisco recently, thank these good people for coming to our aid. Goodness knows we need all the aid we can get, for as the writers may learn a few years from now, it is much easier to keep the little ones out of the street than it is to keep the bigger one from behind the wheel, once they get the urge!

We heartily subscribe to all the sentiments in that letter, for we have advanced all those arguments ourselves. We have cited the law, the prophets, the penal and moral codes, and case history after case history about youths who brought disaster on themselves and other people by their impatience to "solo."

Of course, if we had had the iron character we so admire in parents who never have any trouble with their children, we could have kept them glumly at home while their less restricted friends drove gaily by, waving with maddening condescension (which is, you must know, the greatest cross youth can bear!) And we have honestly and sincerely tried to do just that.

But those parents who have not yet had to cope with adolescence cannot dream of the Machievellian wiles, the tearful pleadings, the suicidal despondency, the burning oratory and the disarming persuasiveness which those youngsters employ in order to wangle permission to drive for 15 minutes around a closely prescribed area — not more than a few blocks in the least populated section of town. They appeal to your reason, your better nature, your faith in them and in your own teaching ability. And their skill at finding chinks in your armor and boring away at them would do justice to a criminal lawyer.

They are supremely confident of their own ability to handle any situation that might arise—a confidence which we do not wholly share, even though we admit they seem to have learned all the safety rules and are meticulous about abiding by them. Always when we give in and let them take the car for a few minutes, we live in dread of some unexpected situation arising that will prove too much for their youth and inexperience.

So, as I say, we are grateful to the people who have finally brought the matter to a head, and forced us parents of over-eager underagers to get together and crack down on them all at once. I know from frequent comparing of notes and collective wringing of hands that they mostly feel as we do about the matter, and remembering the old adage that "in numbers there is strength," and with this public mandate to wave before juvenile eyes, perhaps we can face the youngsters down and get them to compose themselves to wait out the few months until they are of legal age to own a driver's license. Of course, the day they successfully pass that test, we'll REALLY start worrying!

If we knew who wrote the letter to the mayor, we'd thank them personally. They needn't have been afraid of incurring our animosity, but I can understand how they hesitated to make their names public unless it became necessary to take the matter to the State department, which I feel sure it won't. Perhaps we, too, may be forgiven for

taking refuge in anonymity (except to the editor), because, really, we are ashamed of our lack of firmness in squelching these youngsters that are trying to grow up so fast, and hope the parents of the little tots will have much better luck in coping with the situation when it arises in their own lives.

To end on a hopeful note, this letter has already had an appreciable effect on our children's attitude. Yesterday when I went out to get in the car and take the children down town, my daughter was not, as usual, sitting behind the wheel saying imperiously, "Key, please." She was sitting in the back, where she belonged!

If you want to publish this open letter, perhaps it will be of some little help both in letting the protesters know that we are taking their complaint to heart and are not belligerent about it, and also in spreading the word to other parents of early-teenagers who may not have heard about the document, since only a few of the many who drive without license were mentioned. I am sending a copy to the Mayor, too.

I hope you don't mind withholding my name, as it's bad enough that so many people know of our defection from duty! Thanks.

Chamber of Commerce is to attract people to its city. No business man can do this by himself.

There must be cooperation." He compared a city to a huge department store, pointing out the necessity for all departments to work together.

"You have a good town and a clean town, but there are thousands of people who don't know it," Mr. Husbands said. "You must devise the means of attracting them."

He saw leadership, work and imagination as the necessities to build better communities. The greatest undeveloped resource in most cities, he added, are its people. He called complacency, petty jealousy and criticism as the things that destroy cities.

"Regardless of your success, learn to live well," Mr. Husbands concluded.

The speaker was introduced by E. L. Jackson, president of the Chamber of Commerce, who was master of ceremonies. In commenting on the work program, Mr. Jackson compared community building to mountain climbing, stressing the importance of erecting good base camps along the route of the climb.

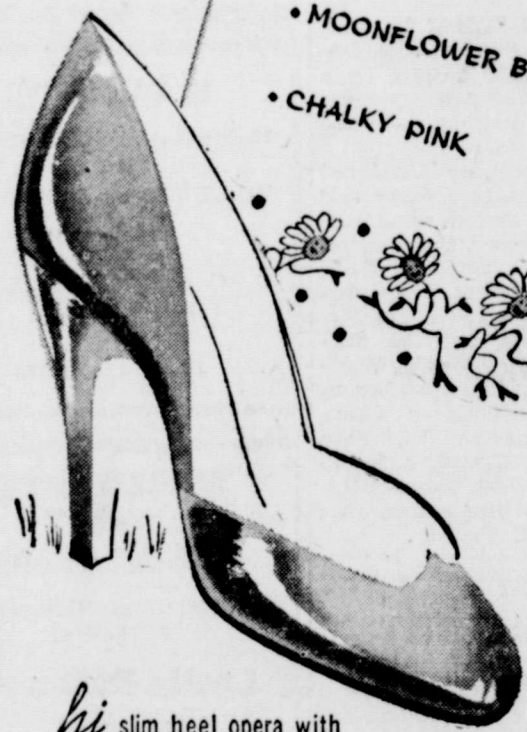
