SOME 20 CISCO business men will begin a drive Wednesday morning to raise \$1,500 as a contribution to the Livestock Auction Barn here. The funds will be used to help the owner pay for the property, and the \$1,500 will be paid to him over a period of one year. The barn has now operated for two weeks, and it appears that it will be a successful venture.

Cisco business men voted to raise the \$1,500 when it developed that that sum was the difference between what the owner wanted for the property and what the operator was willing to pay for it. The farmers and ranchers of the Cisco area had indicated that they definitely wanted an auction barn here, so the business men acted to help provide the facilities.

By contributing to the cost of the property, local business men are setting no precedent. A neighboring city did exactly the same thing a few months ago.

The project is worth your serious consideration because there is a need for a livestock auction barn in Cisco. Any funds contributed in excess of \$1,500 will be used to advertise the sale and Cisco as a shopping center.

Jonel Penny of Ranger showed the top ewe lamb and the grand champion of the breeding sheep. In the boat show, Danny Boyd, Cisco 4-H Club boy, had the grand champion, and his brother, Donald Boyd and Ralph Berry, Cisco 4-H Club boy, had all entries in the division.

A. C. Clark of Cisco showed the best aged Hereford bull in the show. R. E. Harrell of Ranger had the top breeding female Hereford, and A. D. Campbell of Olden the top young Hereford bull.

The Cisco FFA chapter had members entering animals in many classes. In the dairy cattle class, Franklin Myrick entered three, winning a first and two seconds. Norman Barton and Jimmy Webb won seconds, and Virgil Cozart and Jimmy Yates won thirds.

## Rev. Obenhaus Is Called By Death At Olney Sunday

Rev. G. A. Obenhaus, former pastor of Christ Lutheran Church here, died in Olney Sunday morning following a heart attack.

When he was stricken Rev. Obenhaus was dressing to attend morning services of St. Luke's Lutheran Church in Olney. Rev. Obenhaus was the first pastor for the Olney church when it was established in 1904. He had been a minister for 50 years before retiring in 1951. He had labored with the local church for a number of years and moved from Cisco in 1951.

He was born near Columbus, the son of a South Texas farm couple. He attended Concordia University in Springfield, Ill., and returned to Texas in 1901 when he accepted the pastorate of St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Wichita Falls. He was married to Miss Clara Ramming, daughter of a pioneer Wichita County family in 1902.

He had held pastorates in Wichita Falls, Olney, Seymour, Illinois Bend, Lexington, Dime Box, Anderson, Cisco, Clifton, Brownwood and Albany.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday afternoon at St. Luke's Lutheran Church in Olney. Burial will be in Wichita Falls.

Survivors are three daughters, Mrs. Conrad Kunkel of Olney, Mrs. Loy Nichols of Wichita Falls and Mrs. Grady Collier of Fort Belvoir, Va.; and three sons, R. A. Obenhaus of Austin, Victor Obenhaus of Williamstown, Mass., and Rev. G. W. Obenhaus of Houston.

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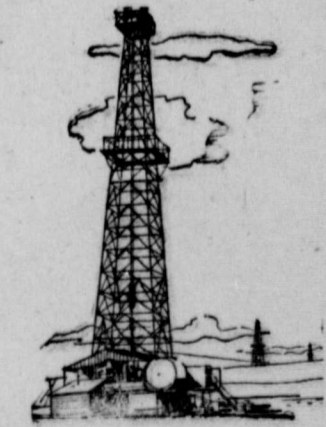

Cisco High School golfers lost to Eastland in the district interscholastic league contests last Friday at the Cisco Country Club

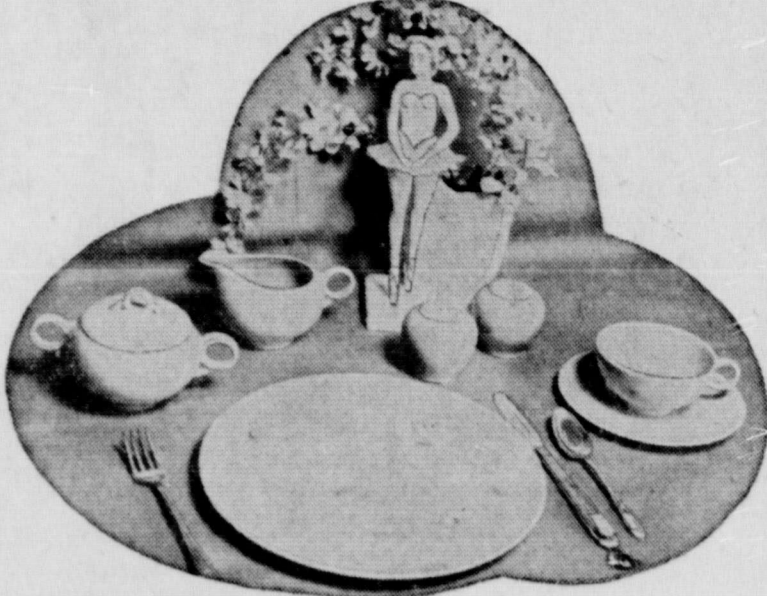
course, Coach Jack Everett reported today. Team scores were: Eastland 384, Cisco 394.

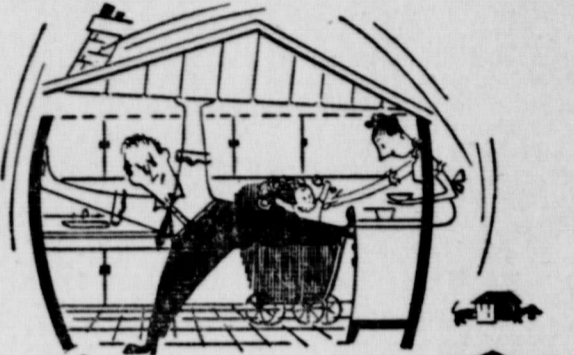
Coach Everett said the Cisco team would go to the regional meet in Brownwood about April 15. The Eastland team will also enter the regional tourney.
