

C. said a bill by Senator Humphrey (Dem., Minn.) would set up in the Labor Department a Bureau of Accident Prevention which would make rules and regulations superseding those at the state and local levels. It called attention also to a bill by Senator Murray (Dem., Mont.) which would employ the state 'grant-in-aid" device to give the Labor Department almost complete authority over industrial safety practices without the Department having to assume coresponding responsibility.
