Sunday is a big day in the village. People come in from miles.

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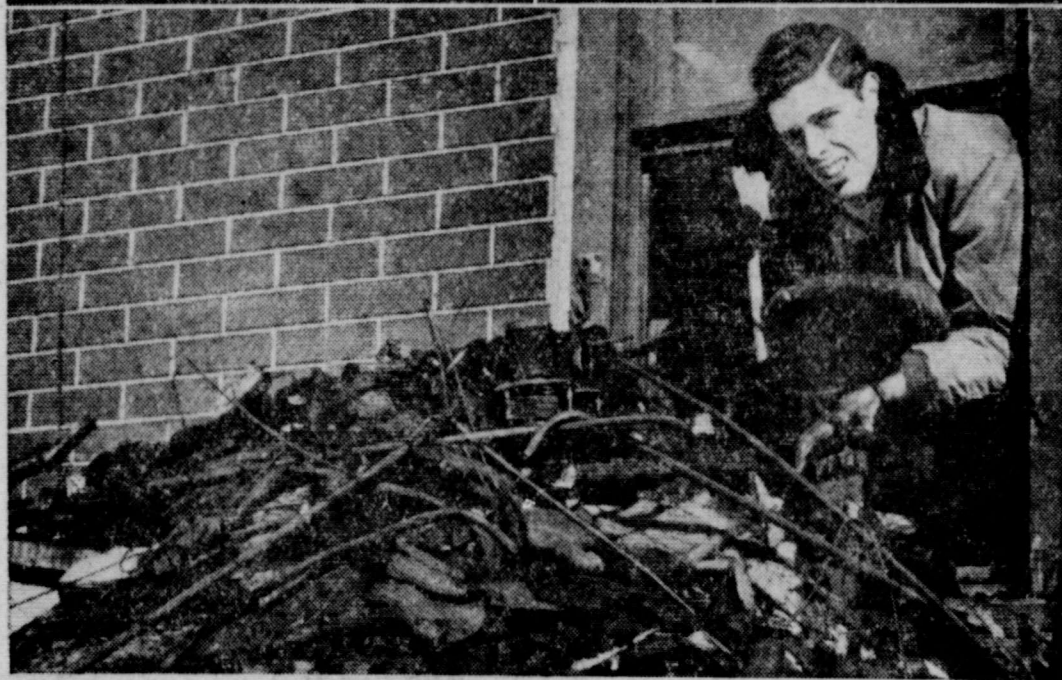
## Methodist Choir To Sing Sacred Cantata

**ELECTRIC USERS Show Increase** ABILENE, March 28. — From 1946 to 1952, customers of electric power companies serving 90 per cent of West Texas increased a total of 66 per cent, while revenues rose 79 per cent, payrolls jumped 121 per cent and fuel costs went up 104 per cent, according to results of a survey published in the current issue of West Texas Today, monthly magazine of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

These companies are doing \$55 million of new construction this year to bring to more than \$245 million their total investment in expanded facilities in seven years.

Contributions were being turned in to Treasurer James P. McCracken at the First National Bank. The Merchants Credit Association helped organize the campaign.

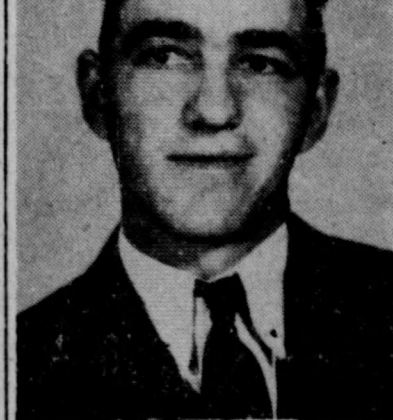

## BIBLE COURSE TO BE TAUGHT AT CJC BY BAPTIST MINISTER

The Rev. Ralph T. Wootton, pastor of the First Baptist Church, will teach a course in Bible at Cisco Junior College during the 1952-53 school year, beginning next September, President O. L. Stamey reported today.

Rev. Wootton will teach a survey course of the Old Testament during the fall semester, and a survey course of the New Testament in the spring semester. It will be a regular 3-hour accredited course and will count toward a degree from the junior college or transfer to higher schools, Mr. Stamey said.

## ACC Head Speaks At Final Luncheon Gathering Today

The 37th annual convention of the Sixth District Texas Federation of Women's Clubs held at the First Methodist Church in Cisco came to a close following the Education Department Luncheon and final meeting Wednesday afternoon.

The final report of the registration committee showed that approximately 300 club women from the district had registered during the three day affair.

A highlight of the Tuesday afternoon meeting was a report by the Public Welfare Department that clubs in the Sixth District had spent some \$8,000 during the past year on welfare projects, and a talk by Mrs. Edwin A. Brown at the symposium on program planning, telling of the outstanding programs planned by the Christoval club. Miss Nancy Cluck, Cisco High School student, entertained the afternoon group with a violin solo. She was accompanied at the piano by Fred David Shockley.

J. J. Shea of Dallas spoke at the Public Affairs luncheon at noon Tuesday. The tables were decorated with attractive liberty bells made of wire placed on containers of pansies. Mr. Shea, who came to America from New Foundland at the age of 18, issued a plea for the return to the principals upon which the country was founded and a return to God.

B. A. Butler addressed the Texas Dinner held at the convention site at 6:30 p. m. Tuesday. The tables were decorated in a Texas Battle of Flowers motif with miniature floats representing points and towns of interest in the Lone Star State. Also on the tables were small scrolls, quills and inkwells. Place cards were hand painted maps of Texas showing the industry and activities of the state. A huge Alamo graced the speaker's table and small decorated floats completed the decorations.

Mr. Butler spoke on "Texas-What's In A Name?" He used the letter "T" in the name Texas to represent Tradition, the letter "E" to represent Empire, the letter "A" to represent Area, the letter "S," Spirit and used the letter "X" to represent the unknown figure. He told of the traditions of the great state that had been handed down from generation to generation to build a great empire. He stressed the wide area of the state and said that Texas was the place where the spirits of two great societies, Roman and Anglo-Saxon met. In speaking of the letter "X" he said that the people were the unknown factor and that what the people did determined the progress spiritually and physically of the great state.

The Beauty Shop Quartet of Cisco Junior College furnished the entertainment for the dinner and Mrs. Philip Pettit of Cisco gave the invocation.

At the Tuesday evening session, which was the President's Evening, Mrs. J. F. Boren of Abilene, first vice-president of the sixth district presided. Miss Jane Huestis furnished the organ music and the Rev. Leslie Seymour gave the invocation. There was a processional of all club presidents and Miss Eudora Hawkins showed a movie film. The Cisco Junior College A Cappella Choir furnished the musical portion of the Tuesday evening meeting.

Mrs. Hubert Baker of Ozona, president of the Sixth District TFWC, talked on "What Price Freedom?" Mrs. Baker stated that she feared that the "Water level of character was too low to float the ship of state" and appealed to the club women to vote and to take part in affairs of state in an effort to bring that level up to the depth needed to keep the ship afloat. She named the three greatest Americans as George Washington, Abraham Lincoln and Susan Anthony — Washington as the father of the country.

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INVESTIGATING CORRUPTION

A good many people must be wondering what has happened to the campaign to thoroughly unearth, publicize, and punish corruption within the government. The corruption issue dominated the headlines not long ago, and Congressional and Administration spokesmen were unequivocal in saying that the sternest kind of corrective measures would be taken, and that no male factor would be big enough or well-connected enough to avoid the consequences.

Now, for the most part, the corruption story has moved to the back pages, and it's clear that very little is being done. The interesting case of Newbold Morris helps to explain why.

Mr. Morris, a successful New York lawyer who described himself as a Lincoln Republican, was appointed by President Truman to search out corruption and corruptionists on a let-the-chips-fall-where-they-may basis. The President asked the Senate to give Mr. Morris the power to subpoena witnesses and the discretion to grant immunity to people who helped him in his investigations. But a good many senators, including members of the senate investigating committee, are far from satisfied with Mr. Morris in the role of clean-up man. Some said that he had been associated with organizations with a red tinge — which Mr. Morris vigorously denied. Then it was disclosed that his law firm was involved in the famous oil tanker deal, in which a group of well-known men ran a small investment into a considerable fortune in a very brief period of time.

Mr. Morris got himself into all kinds of hot water with the committee when he charged that he was being smeared and unfairly treated. Very warm words passed back and forth.

In any event, the committee refused to give Mr. Morris subpoena powers. The committee then voted to authorize the President to appoint an investigator who would be subject to senate approval, and said that such a man would be granted the desired powers. This certainly inferred that Mr. Morris was not wanted.

In many circles it is believed that the Senate itself will have to do most of the investigating if real results are to be obtained. The revelations the country has had so far have largely come from senate inquiries, such as that headed by Mr. Kefauver. In all the great scandal-revelations of the past, the Senate has been the dominant factor. Some of the most ruthlessly efficient investi-

Civil Service To Hold Job Exams

The United States Civil Service Commission today announced an examination for Radar Instructor and Radar Instructor (Trainee) for filling positions at the Keesler Air Force Base, Biloxi, Miss. The entrance salaries are \$3,410 and \$4,205 a year.

To qualify for the trainee positions (\$3,410 a year), applications must show that they have had at least 4 years of responsible experience in radar or radio repair and maintenance, or in electronics research or closely allied fields. College study in electrical engineering, or in courses which have included study in engineering, physics, mathematics, chemistry, or other related physical sciences may be substituted for all or part of the experience. Some substitution is also allowed for experience as an instructor at the high school or college level in the subjects mentioned above.

For positions paying \$4,205 a year, applicants must meet the basic requirements for the trainee positions and, in addition, must have had at least 1 year of experience as a resident instructor in electrical engineering or physics in an institution above high school level. Appropriate graduate engineering or physics may

be substituted for this year of experience as an instructor. No written test is required. The age limits, 18 to 62 years, do not apply to persons entitled to veteran preference.

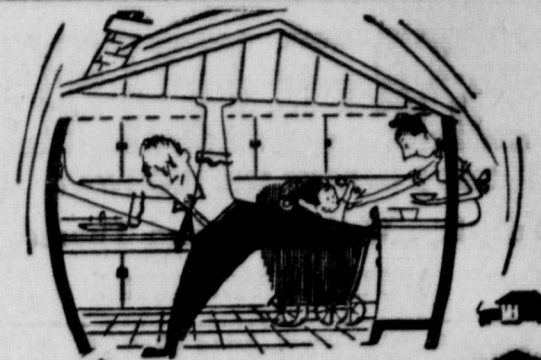
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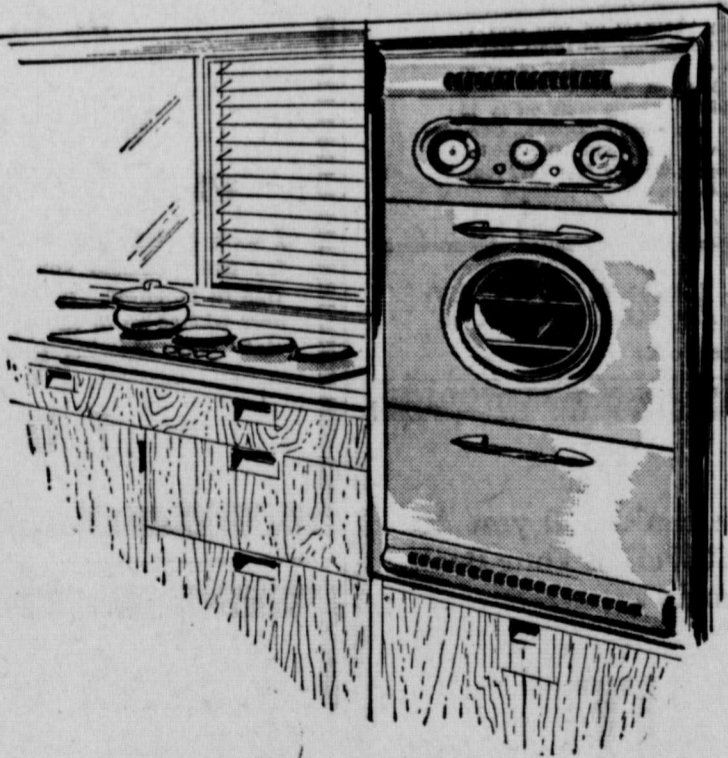

## Two New Control Measures Offered

ABILENE, April 1.—Two measures introduced in Congress would put industrial safety regulations and enforcement under control of the federal government through an expanded Labor Department, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce pointed out today.

The W. T. C. C. said a bill by Senator Humphrey (Dem., Minn.) would set up in the Labor Department a Bureau of Accident Prevention which would make rules and regulations superseding those at the state and local levels. It called attention also to a bill by Senator Murray (Dem., Mont.) which would employ the state "grant-in-aid" device to give the Labor Department almost complete authority over industrial safety practices without the Department having to assume corresponding responsibility.

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
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
