## **Two Wildcats To Be Drilled Soon** Northeast of City

Plans for a new deep oil test just south of Cisco were announneed, and completion work was expected to be finished late today in a West Cisco well as the highlights of area oil development activities.

The new test was the KLB Drilling Company No. 1 Martin H. Weiser, west of the Jack Hailey lease in the south part of The Wichita Falls comtown. pany, which is a partner in the Hailey lease and in other area development, has some 60 acres in the new block.

A slush pit was being dug today and equipment was ready to move in. KLB will drill the well with its own equipment.

Just west of the city limits boundry, the L. A. Warren et al No. 1 Mrs. Maurine Royall was due to be completed late today. Pipe was cemented last Friday after drilling some five feet into the Lake sand pay horizon. Bottomed at 3,493 feet, the well flowed oil in 20 minutes on a drill stem test, giving promise of an outstanding producer. Equipment was moved in Tuesday to

begin completion work The success of the drill stem test has caused considerable activity in the leasing of city lots in the westerly part of town.

All of our work is guaranteed to your satisfaction. Subject to the con-

ditions printed on the reverse side This is signed by the XYZ Company. Under this signature is the word "Accepted" followed by a line for the signature of Mr. Householder. His question is should he sign it? Before he signs it there are some things he should consider. He should first remember that once he and the XYZ Company have both signed the agreement, no matter how informal it may appear, they have bound themselves to the terms as written and cannot later escape the obliga-

tions they have assumed. With this in mind, here are ome of the misunderstandings that might arise from such an agreement: The company has agreed to build a garage - yet nothing is said about the size or type of construction. It has not even been stated whether it is to be a single or double garage. There is no indication in the agreement as to where on the lot the garage will be built. It says nothing about when the work is to be finished. There is no agreement as to whether Mr. House-


