Mr. Bill Burrows has been named manager of the team, and they work-out every afternoon late at ABC Field.

The Legion baseball committee, an ABC Club committee and officials of the school are planning to get together this week to talk about making changes at the field. Among other improvements, the boys want to move home-base around to the north so the batters won't be hitting into the sun.

George Fox Will Make Bid For Job As County Clerk

George A. Fox, Jr. has authorized The Press to announce that he is a candidate for the office of County Clerk of Eastland County, subject to action of the Democratic primary in July.

Mr. Fox was elected treasurer in the 1946 primary by a large vote. Later, he resigned the office due to his health. A war veteran, he had 37 pieces of shrapnel in his body and had to spend over a year under observation of the Veteran's Administration. He was released by the VA hospital in 1951 with "a clean bill of health."

VA doctors have told Mr. Fox that he is physically qualified for inside work. He said he would be grateful for the consideration of the voters and promised a faithful and efficient administration if elected to the office. He said he would issue a formal statement at a later date.

Warren Well To Make Potential Test This Week

An official potential test is due to be run Sunday or Monday on the L. A. Warren et al No. 1 Mrs. Maurine Royall, new oil well just west of the city limits boundary.

The new producer was drilled in last Thursday night. Oil men believed that the well would be good for at least 150 barrels per day. It began flowing after the cement plug was drilled and the hole was cleaned out in swabbing operations. Completion work was scheduled to begin over the week-end in the Curtis McFadden Company No. 1 Myrick-Maxwell Heirs, located a mile southwest of Cisco. Pipe was cemented early last week after a drill stem test had indicated a sizeable gas flow.

Services will be held twice daily during the coming week — at 10 a. m. and 8 p. m. Rev. Bradley reported that good crowds have been attending the services, and that the general public is welcome to all services this week.

CHS TRACKMEN SET TWO NEW RECORDS AT DISTRICT MEET

Two Cisco High School trackmen set new records Friday at their team won fourth place at the annual district meet of the Texas Interscholastic League at Stephenville. Comanche won first place with 60 points. Hamilton had 27 points, Eastland 24 and Cisco 23 points.

Jimmy Webb, Lobo star, set a new high jump record for the district by leaping six feet and two and a half inches to win first place. The highest he had previously jumped was five feet and ten inches.

Bobby Cleveland vaulted ten feet and six inches for a new district record in that event. The

old mark was nine feet and nine inches.

Other Cisco winners included Webb, 2nd in the low hurdles; Doug Johnson, 2nd in the shot put and 2nd in the discus throw; Gerald Birt, 2nd in the mile run. The Cisco mile-relay team, composed of Marcos Gallegos, Robert Jackson, Jim Reynolds and Doug Johnson, won 4th place.

Others from Cisco who took part in the meet were Sherwood Gaines, shot put and discus; Bob Miller, mile run; and Bobby Black, low hurdles broad jump and pole vault.

In the junior division, Freddie Hayes of Cisco won top honors in the high jump with a leap of five feet and two inches. The Cisco 440-yard relay team, composed of Hayes, Harold Pippen, Jerry Weiser, and Arzelle Hale, won 4th place.

By Virtue of their work at the district meet, several of the Cisco boys will go to the regional meet to be held in the near future, Coach Jack Everett said.

Report On Work Made To Judge By Grand Jury

In a report to Judge George L. Davenport, the recent 91st District Court grand jury reported that it had returned 21 indictments and five no-bills after being in session for eight days.

Robert Vaughan, the foreman of the jury, reported that the panel heard 125 witnesses during the eight day period and that the county jail had been visited and that everything was in good condition. They commended the jailer for his work.

The jury recommended that the county auditor be charged with conducting an actual audit of the various books of accounts and bank accounts of the several offices of the county and in the event the audits required the services of additional help, that such necessary part time or full time employees be provided.

The group thanked Judge Davenport and District Attorney J. M. Nuessle for their cooperation.

Special Values Are Offered By Business Firms

The merchants of Cisco will inaugurate a "First Monday" trade program on Monday, April 7, and announcements concerning special values for the event are carried in advertisements in today's edition of The Press.

Plans call for First Monday to be a "big day" in Cisco every month. Many local stores were preparing to offer special values for area shoppers on the first of the new series of special events.

Cisco merchants plan to continue holding "Dollar Days" late in each month. The first Dollar Day program was held last month and it was a considerable success.

The recent opening of the Cisco Livestock Exchange's weekly auction sale on Mondays at the Rising Star highway barn was expected to contribute to the numbers of Monday visitors. Cisco merchants had a big part in the reopening of the auction sale in this city.

"We want every First Monday to be an old-time trade day in Cisco," a spokesman for the merchants committee of the Merchants Credit Association said Saturday. "As our First Monday program continues, it will be better. It takes time to organize special trade programs, and we want this program to grow in interest as time goes on."

The livestock exchange sale will begin shortly after noon as usual. In two previous sales since it opened for business, the interest has been good. Some \$30,000 was paid out for livestock at the sale two weeks ago. Last week's sale was somewhat smaller.

OPS Regulations To Be Explained At Meeting Here

Provisions of the Office of Price Stabilization's new regulations for eating and drinking establishments, Ceiling Price Regulation 134, will be explained at a meeting April 10 at 7:30 p. m. in the Chamber of Commerce office.

A representative of the Fort Worth District Office of Price Stabilization will explain the new regulations. A question and answer period will be held at the conclusion of the meeting. The Chamber of Commerce made arrangements for the meeting.

The new restaurant regulation became effective April 7. It will require the posting of prices in eating and drinking establishments.

The regulation froze restaurant prices at their highest level on menus or charges during the week of February 3-9, 1952. The regulation does not prevent changing of prices lower than the ceilings established by the regulation.

These frozen prices, with permissible adjustments by operators who have been charging prices lower than permitted under the present restaurant regulation, will be the dollars-and-cents ceilings which restaurateurs will post. The posted prices may be increased in the future only by the direction of the Office of Price Stabilization. The regulation provides that future adjustments may be made if the director determines that food and other costs have increased significantly.

James Haynie To Help With Sale

James Haynie of Cisco has returned here after almost a month spent in Brownwood where he was connected with the Garner-Alvis Company in the selling out of their \$100,000 stock of merchandise.

Mr. Haynie announced that he will work with Dupree Drygoods Company here in the closing out of their stock. He also reported that he purchased the remainder of the Garner-Alvis stock and will include it in the Dupree sale. Included in the merchandise will be surplus Army stock and miscellaneous merchandise.

Further announcement of the Dupree sale will be in a coming issue of The Press.

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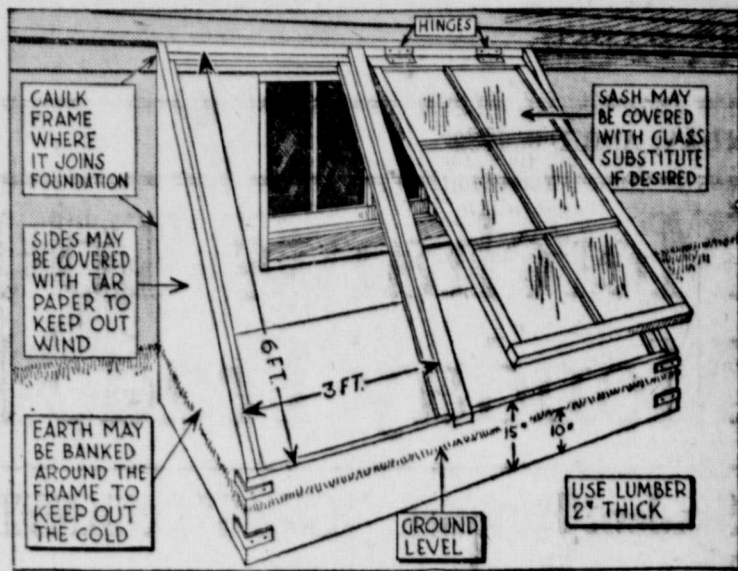

This Hotbed Keeps Both Plants and Gardener Warm



Working Drawing for Hotbed Outside Basement Window.

If you have a basement window facing south, a hotbed can be built around it which is most economical and convenient for the user of any. Using heat from the basement, which usually can spare it, it is also accessible from within, so that the operator need rarely brave wintry winds to use it. Build a frame to fit in the excavation. The sides must slant sharply from a point above the window, almost to the ground. Fit the sash on this frame, using hinges at the top so the sash may easily be raised for ventilation. Earth may be banked around the frame to keep out the cold; and the sides should be as tight as possible to keep out the wind. The frame should be caulked where it joins the foundation to prevent drafts.

Social Security Man Will Be Here

Glen McNatt, field representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, will be in Cisco at the Chamber of Commerce at 2 p. m. on Thursday, April 10 and 24. Persons wishing information or assistance in connection with old-age and survivors insurance matters are invited to call to see him at that time. Mr. McNatt suggests that any self-employed person who plans to retire at age 65 or over during this year should check with the social security office before making his decision.

"Anyone who has been in work covered by social security continuously since 1950, and who reaches age 65 after April of this year will be eligible for old-age benefit payments if he retires after that date" says McNatt. He points out, however, that it will not be possible for him to get the highest benefit payments provided for those insured on the basis of earnings after 1950. This is because self-employment income for the year a claim is filed cannot be used in figuring a benefit payment, and two full years of such work are required to get the largest payments provided for in the new benefit formula. In most cases, it will be to the advantage of the self-employed person to defer retirement until after 1952 or at least wait

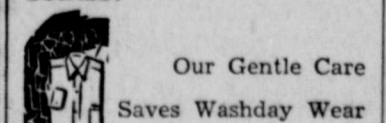

HEALTH TALKS

Different parts of the vessels that carry the blood of life through the body may become diseased or undergo changes. Sometimes the change from normal may affect only that local spot in the blood vessel system and sometimes it may interfere with the function of the whole system.

Aortitis is inflammation of the aorta, the cane-shaped blood vessel that rises out of the heart, loops over, and then courses downward in the body behind the heart. Coarctation of the aorta is narrowing of part of the aorta, usually where it arches downward, causing the portions before the narrowing spot to become somewhat jammed and swollen and the portions beyond the narrowing to become smaller with less blood flowing through.

Aortitis is most often caused by syphilis, though it also may be caused by rheumatic fever, typhoid fever, flu or strep infections. High blood pressure and hardening of the arteries, as chronic diseases, often create the background for the development of aortitis from one of the infections just named. There are different symptoms and different effects from aortitis, depending upon which part of the cane-shaped vessel is inflamed.

One of the complications of aortitis is aortic aneurysm. Often arising on its own and not following some other condition such as aortitis, an aneurysm is a ballooning of a portion of the artery. If you took a long thin balloon, bent it over in cane-fashion, and kept blowing air into the balloon, one point on the balloon would start swelling up in a small balloon of its own. That is similar to an aneurysm. Most aneurysms occur in the downward swoop or clear down in the abdominal portion of the great artery.

If the blood flows into that balloon—like aneurysm and starts cutting a new blood circuit there, it is known as a dissecting aneurysm.

The course of the blood flow through the body is from the heart to the arteries to the capillary beds to the veins and back to the heart. This is known as the greater circulation. If there's a "greater" there must be a "lesser" and the lesser circulation is

the system by which the blood flows from the right side of the heart up to the lungs, through the lungs, and back down to the left side of the heart.

There is the same system of arteries, capillaries and veins in the lesser circulatory system as there is in the greater, but it's a little twisted around. The blood flows from the right side of the heart into the pulmonary artery into the lungs, where the capillary beds filter out the waste materials which the lungs expel. Then the blood picks up oxygen in the lungs and flows into the pulmonary veins back to the left side of the heart. There it goes through the heart and on back into the greater circulatory system.

Every part of the body has its own system of arteries, capillaries and veins. The aorta carrying the oxygen-laden blood, branches out into many tributaries as it travels through the body. The branches are smaller than the main vessel, of course, and they keep getting smaller as they approach different organs or extremities of the body. When the arteries become quite small they are called arterioles. Finally the arterioles split into hair-like tubes, each one of which is a capillary. There are many capillaries together which form a net-like arrangement, usually smack in the heart of each organ.

From the capillary beds the organ takes whatever it needs from the bloodstream and gives back to the bloodstream whatever it doesn't need. This waste material is then sent over to the other end of the net of capillaries, into somewhat larger tubes called venules, which feed into the large tubes called the veins.

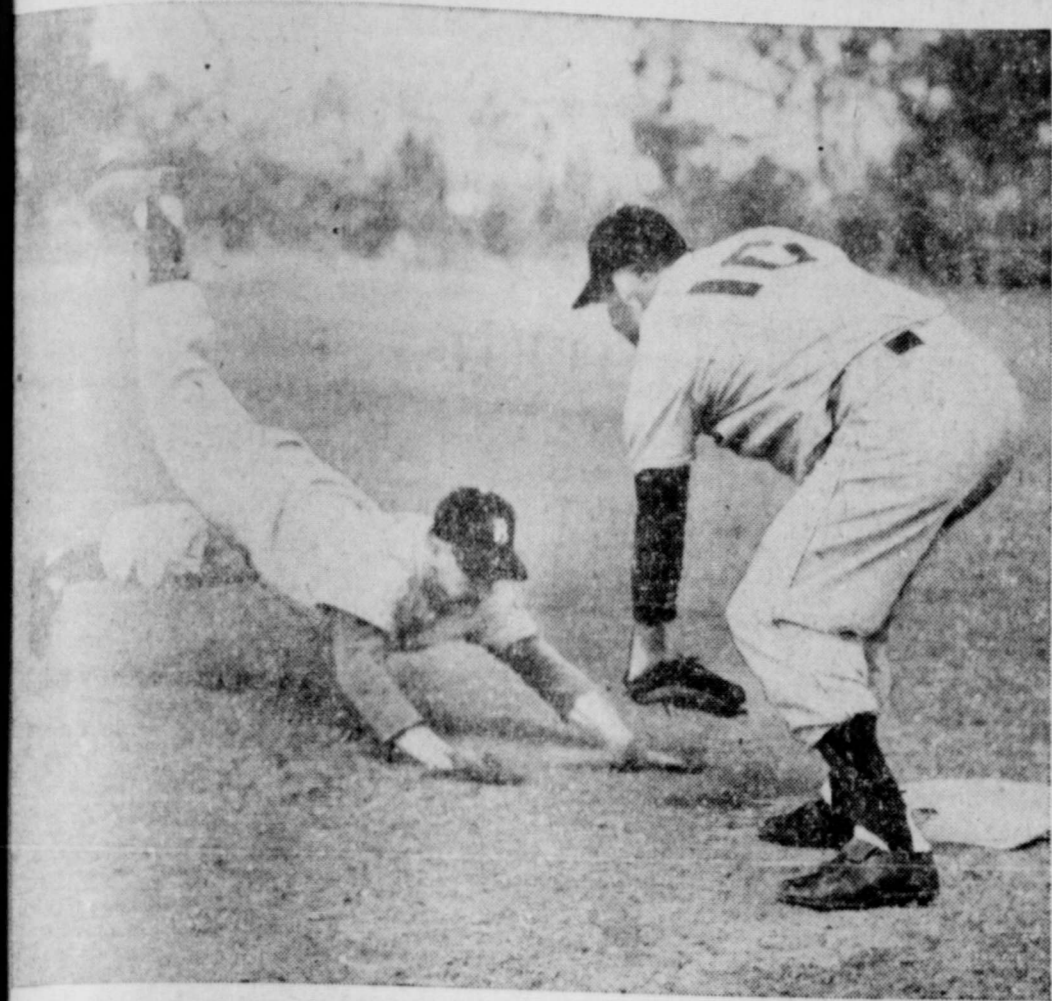

Directors Pass New Rules For Polio Foundation

GONZALES, April 5.—Three constitutional amendments effecting important changes in the executive set-up and the medical advisory board of Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation for Crippled Children were passed at the annual meeting of that organization held March 30. An election of directors was also held to fill existing vacancies.

Of topmost importance was the reorganizing of the medical advisory committee, charged with the responsibility of recommending any changes necessary in the medical program of the Gonzales treatment center. As provided in the amendment, the medical board will now consist of the deans, or their representatives, of three Texas medical schools, plus one representative each from the Texas Society of Orthopedists, the Texas Society of Pediatricians, and the Texas Academy of General Practice; and a qualified physiatrist.

The new medical board will meet several times annually to make recommendations concerning medical policies and medical control of the Gonzales hospital of physical medicine and rehabilitation.

The other constitutional amendments did away with the post of executive secretary and a system of proxy balloting. Executive responsibility and initiative is now spread among several men, specialists in their respective fields.

Many Conferences Held At Aggieland

COLLEGE STATION, April 4.—Four thousand three hundred and seventy persons representing 19 conferences and short courses, were on the campus of Texas A. and M. College for the month of March.

The total attendance at such meetings since June 1, 1951, was 16,859. March attendance was the largest of any single month of known record.

The figures do not include attendance at athletic contests, Mother's Day, Muster Day, commencement, cotton pageant, social affairs and other like events, which represents at least 50,000 visitors.
