

Social Security Man Will Be Here

Glen McNatt, field represen tative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, will be in Cisco at the Cham sons wishing information or as sistance in connection with oldage and survivors insurance matters are invited to call to see him at that time. Mr. McNatt sug-gests that any self-employed person who plans to retire at age 65 or over during this year should check with the social security office before making his decision.

"Anyone who has been in work covered by social security continuously since 1950, and who reaches age 65 after April of this year will be eligible for old-age benefit payments if he retires after that date" says McNatt He points out, however, that it will not be possible for him to get the highest benefit payments provided for those insured on the basis of earnings after 1950. This is because self-employment income for the year a claim is filed cannot be used in figuring a benefit payment, and two full years of such work are required to get the largest payments provided for in the new benefit formula. In most cases, it will be to the advantages o the self-em-ployed person to defer retirement until after 1952 or at least wait







GONZALES, April 5.-Three onstitutional amendments effecting inportant changes in the executive set-up and the medical advisory board of Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation for Crippled Children were passed at the anual meeting of that organization neld March 30. An election of diectors was also held to fill exting vacancies.

Of topmost importance was the eorganizing of the medical adrisory committee, charged with the responsibility of recommendng any changes necessary in the nedical program of the Gonzales treatment center. As provided in amendment, the medical oard will now consist of the deans, or their representatives of three Texas medical schools, one representative each rom the Texas Society of Orhopedists, the Texas Society of Pediatricians, and the Texas Academy of General Practice; and a qualified physiatrist.

The new medical board will eet several times annually to make recommendations concernng medical policies and medical ontrol of the Gonzales hospital f physical medicine nad rehabi-

The other constitutional amendments did away with the post of executive secretary and a sysem of proxy balloting. Execuive responsibility and initiative s now spread among several men, specialists in their respective fields.




