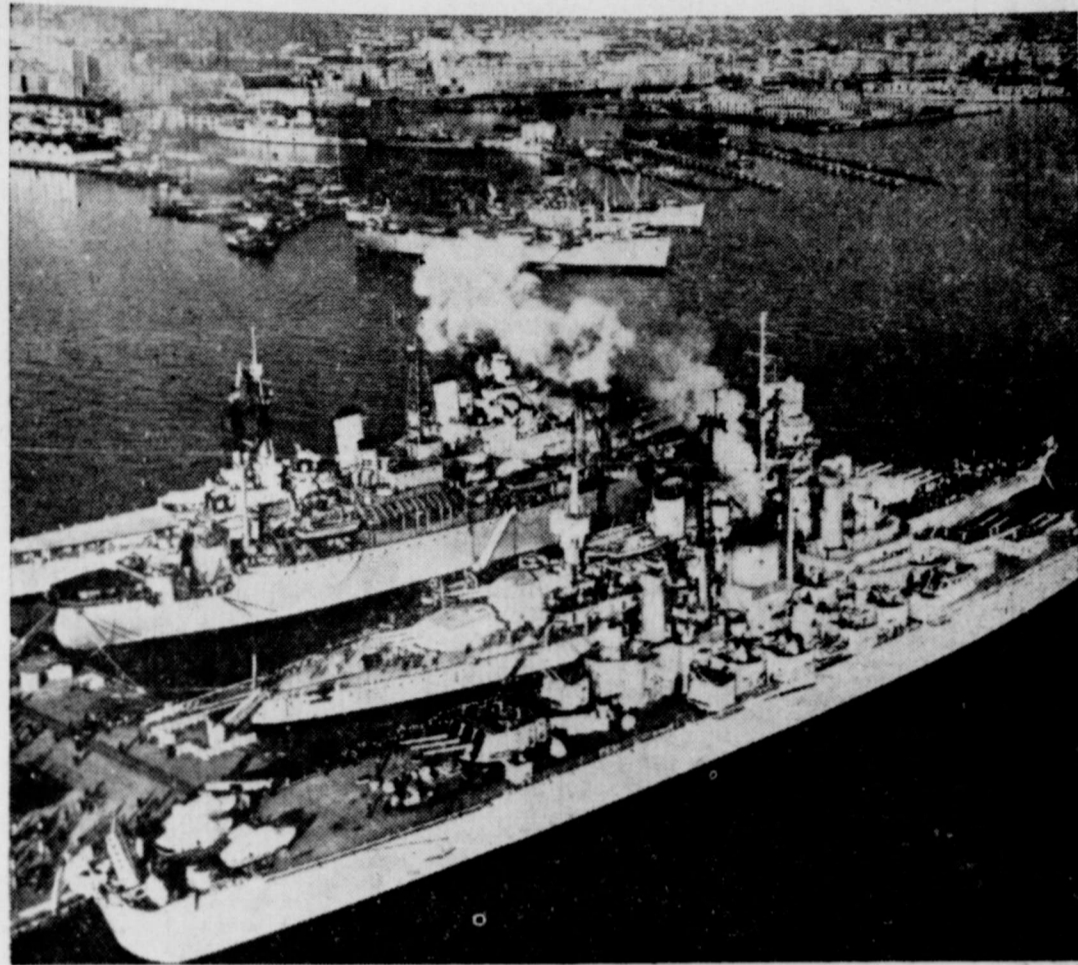

Field Work Being Pushed In Eastern Section Of State

Field work was pushed early and late over the eastern half of the State where soil moisture was adequate for planting, germination, and early growth of crops during the past week. In east Texas and along the upper coast, rains late in the week kept most farmers out of the fields. Droughty conditions continued in the southern, western and northwestern areas and strong winds further depleted soil moisture.

Wheat prospects declined further as wind, dust storms, drought, red-spider and wheat mites plagued the crop in varying degrees in the important high and low plains counties. In the blackland counties development of crop was fair to good, although strong wind was taking moisture and some fields which were beginning to head needed rain. Oats were heading in southwestern counties.

Cool nights retarded development of corn and cotton in central and southern counties; some corn acreage in central counties was ready for first cultivation. Grain sorghum planting was active over the eastern half of the State. Cotton planting was started in central Texas, with final seed bed preparation active in the counties along the Red River, where planting is not expected to become active for ten days or two weeks.

Pecans were leafing out and blooming over the Edwards Plateau and central counties, with some damage apparent from recent freezes. Late peaches were in bloom in central and northern counties. It now appears that early blooming varieties were damaged severely by low temperatures in late March.

Temperatures were generally favorable for recovery of commercial truck crops from cold damage.

Ranges and pastures over the eastern third of the State continued to supply adequate green feed for livestock in that area and additional rain has assured continued development. Grass was starting but still very short in the Plateau and Cross Timbers where rain fell a week ago, but strong winds have taken much of this moisture and rain is again needed. Heavy supplemental feeding continues in the dry southern, western and northwestern counties. Because of lack of range feed in western counties many ewes were not claiming lambs. Spring movement of yearling and early lambs was starting in volume.

Fleming Waters, who was indicted by the Eastland County Grand Jury last week on charges of embezzlement and theft in connection with his handling of a property transaction for a client, declared today that he is innocent of any wrong doing.

Mr. Waters, a Cisco attorney who is a candidate for judge of the 91st District Court, surrendered voluntarily to Sheriff J. F. Tucker last Friday when informed of the indictment. He was released immediately on \$3,000 bond.

Mr. Waters said that he believed he would be proved innocent when all of the facts are brought out. He added that he has statements in his possession from prosecuting witnesses "completely exonerating me from any wrong doing."

No hearing has been set in the case as yet. Mr. Waters said he was ready and anxious for an early hearing.

Telephones Are Restricted To Emergency Use Only In Cisco

LESS THAN THIRD OF COUNTY'S AUTOS HAVE BEEN INSPECTED

Less than one-third of Eastland County's nearly 10,000 motor vehicles have been inspected at approved state inspection stations, a representative of the Texas Department of Public Safety reported here today.

The county has 9,682 registered vehicles, and only 3,132 have been inspected. The new state law provides that all vehicles must be inspected by September.

There are 16 state approved inspection stations in Eastland County, including the A-G Motor Company and the Nance Motor Company in Cisco.

Inspection stations in Eastland include Muirhead Motor Co., Fullen Motor Co., Blevins Motor Co., McGraw Motor Co., Rushing Motor Co., and King Motor Co.

There are five stations in Ranger, including the Clarke Motor Co., Mission Garage, Crawley Motor Co., Anderson Chevrolet Co., and Levellille Motor Co.

In Rising Star, Butler Chevrolet Co. and J. W. Roach Motor Co. are inspecting stations, and the Smith Bros. Chevrolet Co. is the only station in Gorman.

The Department of Public Safety spokesman urged motorists to take steps soon to have their vehicles inspected, pointing out that "we have only about five months to meet the requirements of the law."

Vice-President James Duff, who presided in the absence of President Austin Flint, presented a pin to Lion Charles S. Sandler for 20 years of perfect attendance. A 25-year membership pin was presented by Mr. Duff to J. T. Eggen, club treasurer.

Workers Off Job Thursday Morning

The strike of Western Electric employees was being felt in Cisco today as telephone operators and installation and repair crews were absent from their jobs and telephone service was being limited to emergency use only.

The emergency procedure began here at 7 a. m. when operators did not report for work. The situation was unchanged at noon Thursday.

There is no dispute of any kind between Southwestern Bell Telephone Company and the union representing employees in Texas," Manager W. H. McNally of the Cisco district office told The Press. "We have a contract with the CWA-CIO which remains in full force and effect.

"It is the responsibility of the telephone company and its employees to furnish telephone service to the public on a continuous basis. We are doing everything we can to meet our responsibility through the use of every available person to man the switch board."

Local officials were told that the union was having a meeting and no mention of a strike was made. No pickets showed up in Cisco, although pickets were reported in many Texas cities. Similar employee meetings were taking place in Eastland, Ranger, Breckenridge and elsewhere in the state.

The switch board here was manned by supervisory personnel only. Those who picked up their telephones this morning were greeted with a recorded message, saying "Due to labor troubles, we are accepting emergency calls only." Instructions were given to lift the receiver slowly several times as a signal to put through an emergency call.

The Press was unable to contact members of the union for a statement. Observers believed the local situations were called as a means of expressing sympathy to striking Western Electric workers.

Construction crews were on the job, but the installation and repairmen were holding meetings in area towns. Telephone company officials had no idea how long the meetings would last.

Business firms that depend considerably on telephones were having a day off. One grocery store, which does considerable delivery business, reported that only one grocery order was turned in by telephone this morning.

Former Veterans Official Is New WTCC Staff Man

ABILENE, April 10. — Appointment of Loyan H. Walker as manager of the agriculture and livestock department of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce was announced today by Fred H. Husbands, executive vice president and general manager.

Walker will fill a vacancy created by resignation of C. DeWayne Davis, who now is manager of the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce.

After his graduation from Texas A & M College in 1939, Walker became vocational agriculture teacher at Aspermont high school serving there until 1942. It was in Aspermont that he met his wife, the former Patsy Ruth Mitchell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Pat Mitchell, Stonewall County ranchers.

Most of his three years of World War army service as an infantry officer was devoted to training troops. He spent 14 months with the 90th Infantry Division at Camp Barkley, Abilene.

Following his military service, Walker taught agriculture at Wylie, Taylor county, during the 1944-45 session and was an employee relations counselor at Abilene Army Air Base when he joined the Veterans Administration in 1945.

His first VA assignment was at the Abilene Veterans Guidance Center at Hardin-Simmons University. A year later he became a technical training specialist in agriculture and has served in that capacity since. He has been supervisor of field training officers of 51 counties of the Dallas regional area. At the peak of the GI educational program, eight thousand veterans were in institutional on-the-farm training in his territory.

Walker was born at Walnut Springs, Texas, in 1918. He majored in agricultural education at A & M College.

Court Rules Protect Rights And Insure Fair Trials

Many people regard rules of legal procedure as mere tools of delay, of concern only to lawyers and judges. Far from this, they

are instruments of justice, and of real significance to all of us. Procedure is the lubricant which makes the machinery of uniform justice run smoothly.

The law is composed of two parts — the substantive and the adjective law. The substantive law defines rights, duties and remedies; it enforces contracts and rights wrongs; it describes crimes and sets up penalties. People can usually see the value of substantive law. Adjective law deals with legal procedure and describes the steps a person must take to invoke the substantive law.

Some of our most important rights are to be found in the body of procedural law. For ex-

ample, as a people who want justice to prevail, we like to think that every man, rich or poor, shall have his day in court. This is an important right, for a day in court implies more than merely the right to have your say before a judge and jury.

Your day in court implies that you shall have the right to be properly represented, to have your case presented before an impartial jury and an unbiased judge, and to have a reasonable time to prepare for the trial. It holds that you shall have proper notice of the action against you; that the complaint or indictment shall state a clear cause of action. It means that you shall be confronted by your accusers; that you shall have the right to cross-examine them; that you shall be able to present evidence in your own behalf.

Finally, the law governing procedure tells you how you may appeal your case to high courts when you feel that you have not had a fair trial or that a prejudicial error has been committed in the trial court.

Much of our procedural law comes down from centuries of experience in the courts of other lands. It was inevitable that through the centuries some of the procedure would become cumbersome, obsolete and difficult. For this reason the history of procedure has been characterized by great periods of reform. In America we have experienced many advantageous changes in our laws governing the procedure of courts and administrative

agencies. There is a growing custom in the United States of giving the courts the power to revise their rules in certain fields.

Our Texas rules of civil procedure are made by our state Supreme Court. The Court is constantly striving, with the recommendations of the practicing lawyer, to improve these rules. The aim of the Supreme Court is to provide a uniform and relatively simple set of rules for dispensing justice with a minimum of delay.

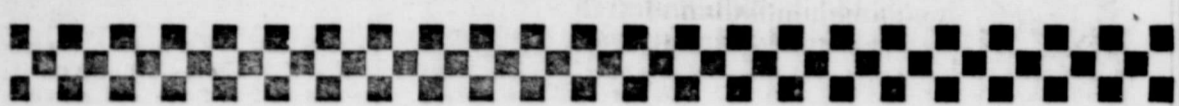

Broadcast: April 12, 1952

1/2 cup rolled oats 2 Tablespoons hot fat
1/2 cup Fat Milk 1/2 cup catsup
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard 2 teaspoons vinegar
1 lb. ground, Worcestershire sauce
smoked ham (can omit)
1/2 cup finely cut onion 1/4 cup water 2 teaspoons sugar

Guard Against Polio Is Warning Of State Officer

AUSTIN, April 10. — Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued the following statements and suggestions concerning the control and prevention of poliomyelitis which is always more prevalent during the summer months.

Until recently it was generally believed that this infection is transmitted by means of discharges from the respiratory tract. It is now believed that poliomyelitis is primarily another of the several gastrointestinal infections. Therefore, control measures must emphasize clean-up campaigns and improvements in sanitation.

Strict sanitary measures must be observed in all communities. Stringent efforts should be made to eliminate the housefly and to destroy its breeding places. All mosquitoes and mosquito breeding places must be eliminated at once. Every effort should be made to institute approved garbage collection systems immediately. Safe water supplies must be assured. Where adequate com-

food handling establishments should adhere strictly to the State Law concerning the sterilization of dishes and utensils.

Every effort should be made to secure approved milk. Rats and mice should be eliminated. Maintain in the home the same sanitary standards that are necessary in community life. Particular attention should be paid to personal hygiene. Excreta from cases and contacts should be handled and disinfected with the same scrupulous care as in typhoid fever or bacillary dysentery.

Early symptoms of infantile paralysis are headache, fever, vomiting, drowsiness, followed by stiffness in the neck and back. When suspicious symptoms appear, a physician should be called immediately.

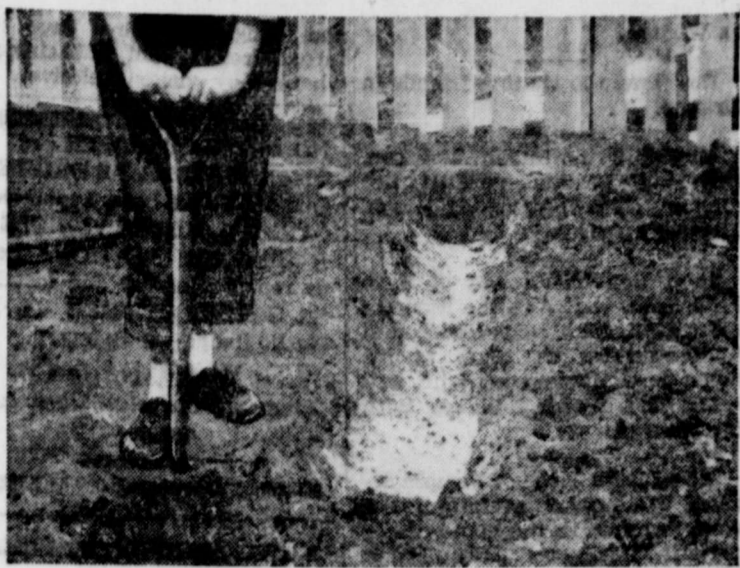

Spade Home Garden This Easy Way Before Planting

No matter what you may read about new practices in agriculture, this spring most farm and garden land will be plowed or spaded, before seed is sown. For the home gardener with a few thousand feet or less of garden space, spading is best. Weeks may slip by waiting for a plowman to do a job which, by the proper approach, can be reduced to enjoyable and beneficial exercise.



When Soil Crumbles Easily in Your Hand, It's Time to Spade.

The secret is to take it easy. Spading is not hard work if done a little at a time. A space of 1,000 square feet can be spaded in a leisurely way in eight hours. One hour a day for eight days, and the job is done. Be sure the soil is in condition to spade. Never work soil which is too wet; and if the soil is heavy, don't wait until it has become too dry. There is a point between extremes when even heavy clay can easily be lifted, and will crumble under a blow from the spade. You can tell this point by using the "mud pie" test.

Mould a ball of earth in your hand, and pat it to make a mud pie. If the pie holds together, the soil is too wet to spade. If it crumbles, then you can go ahead.

Set a definite task for your first day's work, say a strip six feet wide, running the shortest dimension of the garden. At one end dig a trench, say the width and depth of the spade, removing all soil from it. File this soil near the opposite end of the strip.

Now spade with the blade not parallel to the trench, but at right angles to it. This enables you to lift the soil more easily, and deposit it in the trench. The spade should be

driven down, not on a slant, but perpendicularly to its full depth. Take a small slice of the soil so your back is not strained. Lift it up, turn the spade over, so that the top soil falls underneath and bottom soil on top. In filling the first trench, you have opened a second.

If you wish to spade under manure, spread it evenly over the area, except for the top of your initial trench. When this first trench has been dug, clean the manure from the top of the next trench and throw it into the bottom of the first; then proceed with your spading, piling the soil on top of the manure.

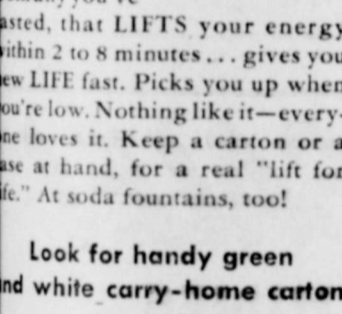
When you have finished your day's quota, you will have an empty trench, which should be filled with the soil you removed from the initial trench.

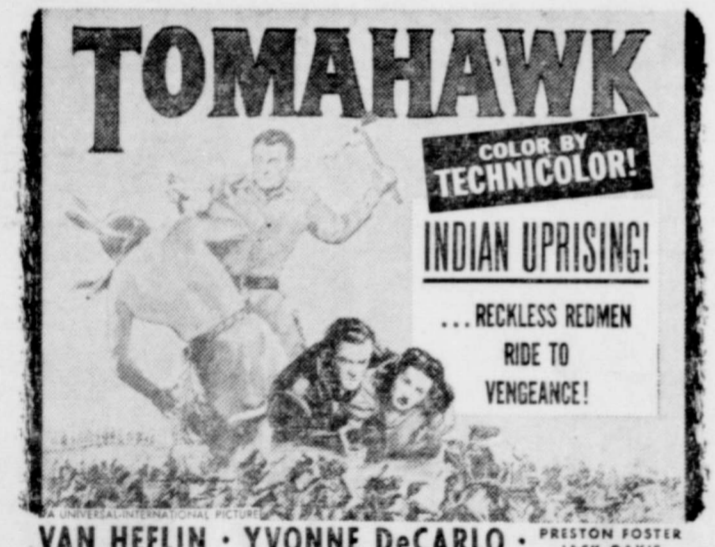

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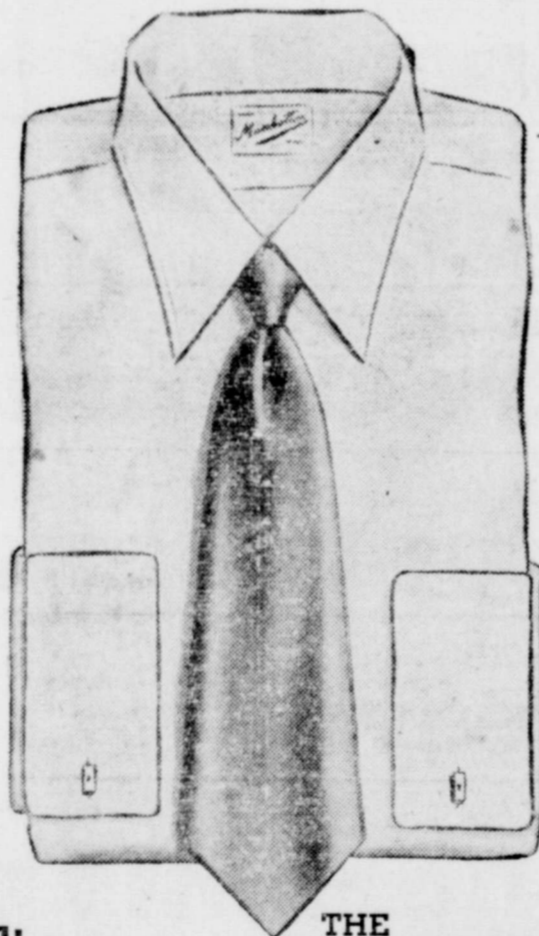
