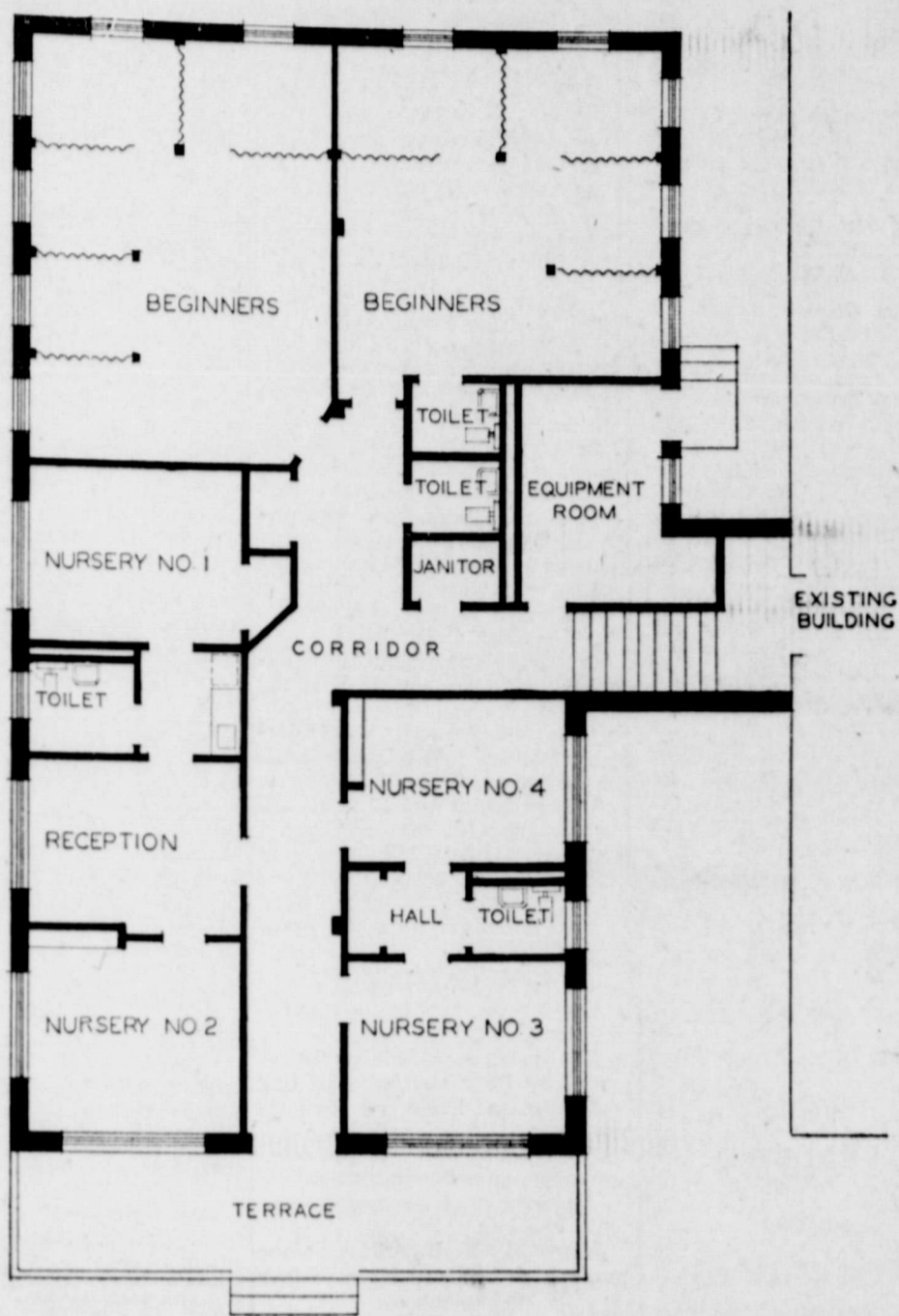

53 Candidates For Lobo Grid Team Working In Spring Camp

Coaches Jack Everett and Carroll Tatom issued suits to 53 candidates for places on the 1952 Lobo football team as they opened spring training at Chesley Field Tuesday. Included in the group were nine lettermen from last year's team.

The remainder of the squad was composed of last year's "B" team members, members of the 1951 junior high school Midget team who will graduate in May and some new recruits from high school grades.

Offensively the team was shaping up well following three days of actual drill but the defense needed weight and experience, the coaches reported. The biggest battle for positions appeared in the quarterback race where Boy Gallagher and Bobby Lloyd were fighting it out. Both boys looked good in the opening drills and both are good passers.

The coaches were running Irvin Brunkenhoefer at full in the spring drills. Brunkenhoefer, all district end, is a hard runner and a fine defensive back. Coach

Everett reported that it was possible that Lloyd would be shifted to the fullback slot and Brunkenhoefer placed at his usual end position to strengthen the line.

The end situation was fair after the first three days of work with Jim Webb, Jim Reynolds, Gerald Birt and possibly Brunkenhoefer and others ready for action. Daniel Gray and Sherwood Gaines were expected to come through at tackle and both were showing improvement over last season. The guard posts were giving the coaches a lot of worry but the situation was expected to improve when H. L. Coats and Mack McCauley report for duty. The other guards were shooting a lot of hustle but are a little light. Peanut Poyner was showing lots of fight at a guard post.

Bobby Qualls was given the nod as starting center but was receiving strong competition from Andy Mosley and Fred Haynes. At halfback posts Bobby Black and Marcus Gallegos were carrying the ball well and looking good in the broken field. Black

was hitting harder and running better every scrimmage. There are a number of boys coming out for the posts that will add much to next year's team.

Joe Wayne Farrow, Edward Birnie, Bill Smith, Ronnie Qualls, Kenneth Penn and Buck Whitehead were the best prospects coming up from the Midget team at the end of the third day of drills but others of the squad were progressing rapidly and gave promise of being in the running before the 30 day training period was over.

Coach Bill Sledge of the Midgets will join Everett and Tatom next week and will work with part of the boys. The two coaches have tried to give each boy some action each day.

The teams have been running off a straight T formation and plans call for using that formation during the coming season with some spread and wing formations thrown in. Humble's Report Reflects Gains

HOUSTON, April 10. — In its annual report released today, Humble Oil & Refining Company reported substantial increases in 1951 business resulting from a gain in public demand for oil products of almost 10 per cent over 1950. Humble's net crude oil production and trunk line deliveries were nearly 25 per cent. Net production of while its refinery runs and products marketed by the Sales Department increased more than 11 per cent. Net production of crude oil and natural gas liquids was 136,551,000 barrels.

During the past thirty-five years since the organization of Humble in 1917, public demand for petroleum products has increased at an extraordinary rate. In doing its part to meet this demand, Humble has expanded its assets and operations greatly. Humble's assets at the end of 1951 were \$1,060,413,344, and the Company's gross business in 1951 was slightly under a billion dollars.

The growth in investment and operations has been accompanied by increasing outlays. Payrolls, cost of materials, drilling and operating costs, and taxes are all reported to be increasing. In a letter to stockholders, Hines H. Baker, President, and L. T. Barrow, Chairman of the Board, state that if current replacement costs had been used, charges for depreciation on plant and equipment alone in 1951 would have been about \$24,000,000 higher and net income correspondingly lower.

Allen Jones of Cisco topped the Clovis, New Mexico, horse market recently when he sold three saddle horses for a total of \$865.

Top horse in the sale was Beaver, a three year old dun cow pony sold by Jones for \$355.

Delbert Hallmark of Cisco, now employed by the Clovis Livestock Commission, was the auctioneer at the sale.

Rotarians Hear Talk On School Plans Thursday

"America spends more on intoxicating beverages and on gambling than it does on education" O. L. Stamey, president of Cisco Junior College told Rotarians at their regular weekly meeting at the Hotel Victor at noon Thursday. Mr. Stamey appeared on the program at the invitation of Rotarian C. W. Henry.

In talking on education from the grade and high school level and colleges, including state supported junior colleges, Mr. Stamey told of the things that have local effect and told of the philosophy of higher education.

He said that school was a big business and cited figures to show that more than \$5 billion dollars was spent last year on public schools and colleges and two and a half billion dollars on schools supported by the churches. As a comparison he stated that the nation spent \$9 billion on intoxicating liquors and \$20 billion on known gambling.

In 1915, Mr. Stamey said, the federal government received 30 per cent of the tax dollar while the local government and schools received 52 per cent. In 1951, he said, the federal figure had jumped to 72 per cent while the schools and local government dropped to 13 per cent.

He said that last year Cisco Junior College received only \$8,432 from local support, which was only three and one half per cent of the total required to operate the school. The remainder came from state and federal funds. He said that when outside interests put money into the schools they were prone to say how the money was to be spent and the local government lost control of the operation.

Mr. Stamey told the group of some of the plans being worked on for next year. One of the new additions is to be the Bible course which was announced recently. Others include classes in agriculture, farm mechanics, dairy, animal and poultry husbandry.

Visitors at the meeting included Rotarians E. W. Berry, Joe Cooley, Lacy Beckman, W. C. Ribble and Bob Gilchrist of Abilene and Jack Reynolds of Brownwood.

Eight national 4-H awards programs, all more than 15 years old, which have been important factors contributing to the widespread popularity of 4-H Club work, are being conducted in the State for 1952.

The programs, their respective anniversaries and donors are: Girls' Record, 30th, Montgomery Ward; Canning, 24th, Mrs. Ruth Kerr; Meat Animal, 23rd, Thos. E. Wilson; Food Preparation, 18th, Kelvinator; Farm and Home Electric, 17th, Westinghouse; Leadership, 16th, Edward Foss Wilson; Dairy Achievement, 16th, Lederle Laboratories, and Beautification of Home Grounds, 15th, Mrs. Charles R. Walgreen.

Total enrollment in the eight programs exceeded 2,661,000 in 1950, indicating that many 4-H'ers enrolled in several of the programs.

Incentives for outstanding records of achievements in the programs are honor medals for all county winners, educational trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago for State or Sectional winners, and \$300 college scholarships for national champions.

County Extension Agents will furnish complete information on any of these programs, all of which are supervised by the Co-operative Extension Service.

More tennis courts, more baseball diamonds, more playgrounds for younger children, and a gathering place for the older ones are some of the things we need. Our one tennis court is run down and needs repair. Our one baseball diamond is not sufficient to go around. Children sit around waiting their turn to play tennis and often there are some who do not get the chance of playing.

This could be remedied by using the empty space beside our gymnasium for building more tennis courts, another baseball diamond, and other sporting facilities. For a much needed park, any convenient place would do if supplied with elementary amusements. A gathering place could be fixed up in any building where there is space enough to fill the needs.

Broadcast: April 12, 1952

1/2 cup rolled oats 2 Tablespoons hot fat
1/2 cup Fat Milk 1/2 cup catsup
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard 2 teaspoons vinegar
1 lb. ground, smoked ham 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce (can omit)
1/4 cup finely cut onion 1/4 cup water
2 teaspoons sugar

Mix oats, milk and mustard. Let stand 5 minutes. Mix in ham. Put into 4 greased muffin cups holding 3/4 cup each. Bake in moderately slow oven (350) 45 minutes, or until light brown. Meanwhile, cook onion slowly 5 minutes in hot fat. Add catsup, vinegar, Worcestershire sauce, water and sugar. Boil slowly and stir 3 minutes. Turn out loaves and serve with the hot gravy.
