In talking on education from the grade and high school level and colleges, including state supported junior colleges, Mr. Stamey told of the things that have local effect and told of the phylosophy of higher education. He said that school was a big

business and cited figures to show that more than \$5 billion dollars was spent last year on public schools and colleges and two and a half billion dollars on schools supported by the churches As a comparison he stated that toxicating liquors and \$20 billion on known gambling.

In 1915, Mr. Stamey said, the federal government received 30 per cent of the tax dollar while the local government and schools received 52 per cent. Mix oats, milk and mustard. Let stand 5 minutes. Mix in ham. Put into 4 greased muffin cups holding 3/4 cup each. Bake in moderately slow oven (350) 45 minutes, or until light brown. Meanwhile, cook onion slowly 5 minutes in hot fat. Add catsup, vinegar, Worcestershire sauce, water and sugar. Boil slowly and stir 3 minutes. Turn out loaves and serve with the hot gravy.
