Precinct Conventions Are Place For You To Have Political Voice

In the past a very small portion of Texas voters have had direct influence — with their individual votes — upon the election of the President and Vice President of the United States. They have voted in primary elections, and a few of them in general elections. But they voted for Presidential Electors — not candidates themselves.

Those candidates — the party nominees — had been selected three or four months before the general election itself.

And, even then, they had not been selected by ballots of individual voters, cast in an election.

Their nominations originated

way back there in May at party precinct conventions.

Here is how it works:

The precinct convention names delegates to the party's county convention.

The county convention selects delegates to the state convention.

The state convention selects delegates to the national convention.

The national convention nominates the presidential and vice-presidential candidates of the party.

It is, therefore, necessary that the individual voter take part in the precinct convention to most effectively make his own vote count in election of the President and Vice President.

Because such a relatively few voters usually attend Precinct Conventions, the vast majority have had little moral right to complain about any administration's policies.

Here are some questions and answers to point up fundamental facts about the Precinct Convention:

Q. When will it be held?
A. On Saturday, May 3.

Q. At what hour?
A. The law requires that it be held between 10 a. m. and 8 p. m. Outside the largest cities, it usually is opened at 2 p. m.

Q. The County Chairman of the party is required by law to file a list of times and places with the County Clerk at least ten days before the convention day. This list must be posted on the Court House bulletin board.

Q. Who can take part in the Precinct Convention?
A. All qualified voters who live within the voting precinct.

Q. Must each person show proof

of his right to vote in the Precinct Convention?

A. Yes. He must bring with him to the convention, his Poll Tax receipt or his Exemption Certificate.

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — I am an ex-WAC, going to school full time under the GI Bill. I'm married and have a child. Would I be eligible for the \$120-a-month subsistence for veterans with more than one dependent (my husband and child)?

A — No. You may, however, be eligible for the \$105 rate paid to veteran-trainees with one dependent—that dependent being your child.

Q — How do I go about finding a lender who will lend me money under the GI Bill?

A — Information as to who makes GI farm loans may be obtained usually from the County Agricultural Extension Agent. Information concerning home and business loans may be had from

your local Chamber of Commerce, or by inquiring at banks, savings and loan associations, mortgage and insurance companies, and other public and private lending agencies.

Q — I have a service-connected dental condition, and was fitted with bridgework several years ago through VA's outpatient dental program. The bridgework seems to be wearing out. May I have it replaced?

A — Yes. Bridgework which becomes unserviceable through legitimate wear and deterioration may be replaced, provided your dental condition is still shown to be service-connected.

Q — I surrendered my NSLI permanent policy for cash when I went back into military service. I expect to get out soon, and I'd like to know what I must do to regain my insurance protection.

A — You may either (1) apply to VA in Washington, D. C. for a new permanent policy on the

same plan and not in excess of the amount surrendered for cash, and pay the required premium, or (2) reinstate your surrendered permanent plan by paying the required reserve and the premium for the current month. In either case, you must act within 120 days following your separation from active service. Physical examination is not necessary.

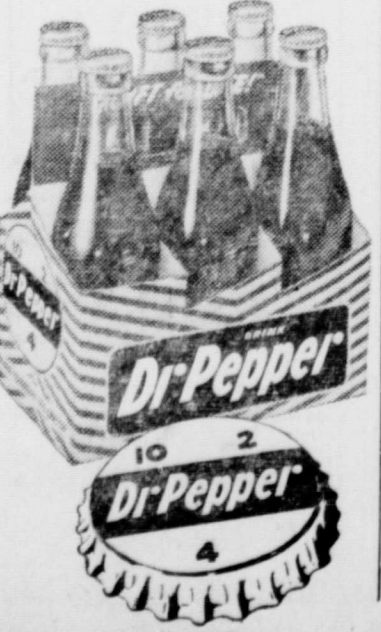
