CARROLL-CRAFT Boats. How does that sound as the name for a line of fishing boats? Sounds better when you know that they're built in Cisco and that already five or six of them are afloat on Lake Cisco, and another is nearing completion.

Carroll-Craft Boats are the product of Mr. O. S. Carroll's shop at his Carroll Motor Company, 1111 Avenue D, Cisco. The first boat was built by Mr. Carroll for himself to use in frequent fishing expeditions to area lakes.

Mr. Ray Judia, Lake Cisco caddis, saw the boat and contacted with Mr. Carroll for five of them. They're all finished now and are at the lake, ready for one and all to rent.

Mr. Charlie Roberts decided he ought to have a boat, seeing how he is a serious fisherman. So the USS Roberts is now nearing completion at the Carroll shop. It will be a pretty deluxe affair, equipped with a trailer, which Mr. Carroll also builds.

The Roberts boat will have a comfortable, swivel chair. It was made by Mr. Ken Russ of the Victor Hotel. Ken says the chair will enable Charlie to take care of two lines at once, swiveling from one side to the other.

Mr. Judia and Mr. Russ believe that there's a future for Carroll-Craft Boats, and we agree. Besides the boats he has already built this year, Mr. Carroll has two more on order. It is reasonable to believe that he could do well building and selling boats and trailers. It could well become the beginning of a new industry for our town.

THERE'S A VERY definite need for a walking blood bank in Cisco. That is the opinion of Mrs. Peggy Gallagher of the Chamber of Commerce staff.

Early this week, she received a call from a hospital in Ranger that a Cisco man needed a transfusion badly.

After considerable checking around, Mrs. Gallagher found two people who went over and donated blood. The next day, Mrs. Gallagher received another call from the hospital. The man was badly in need of another transfusion.

It would be a considerable blessing if Cisco had a walking blood bank, Mrs. G. said. Such a bank is substantially a list of people with their blood types.

Those who donated blood in the recent Red Cross Bloodmobile project are to form the beginning of such a bank. Their names and blood types are to be sent here soon. Meanwhile, anyone who knows his blood type is invited and urged to call the Chamber of Commerce office and leave his name and blood type.

Plans are in the making for the blood bank program to be worked out here soon. Arrangements will be made for anyone interested to have his or her blood typed. A card index will be prepared with it, it is hoped, several hundred names of possible blood donors.

As Mrs. Gallagher says, you never know when you or your neighbor will need a blood transfusion. A real emergency could develop whereby a lot of blood would be needed by a good many people. In any emergency — large or small — the walking blood bank could be consulted for types of blood needed.

If you want to have a part in this project and know your blood type, call Mrs. Gallagher at the Chamber of Commerce.

THE ELECTRIC TIMES, magazine published by West Texas Utilities Company, carried a series of pictures and a story about Moran in the last issue. Among other things, the story reports as follows:

"The oldest producing well in Shackelford County is St. Mary's No. 1 Tarrant Cloud, two miles northwest of Moran. Several years ago it had produced 780,000 barrels."

General Rains Aid Crop Outlook In East Section

Prospects for the 1952 crop season were further improved by general rains over the eastern half of the State during the past week. Welcome showers also fell in most other areas but amounts were generally insufficient to effectively break the drought. Scattered showers in the northwest brought only slight temporary relief, and more rain was urgently needed. Some freeze damage to wheat is now showing up in north Texas and some Low Plains counties. In central Texas wheat and oats were heading on short straw.

Planting of corn, cotton and grain sorghums made good progress over the eastern half of the State until wet fields the latter part of the week stopped all field activity. Cool weather slowed development of growing crops. Along the upper Coast oats and clover were cut for hay. In south Texas, where scattered showers fell, some additional cotton acreage will be planted but in the Lower Valley rains were insufficient to encourage widespread planting of the remaining intended dry land acreage. Flax harvest was started in south Texas. Late flax received much needed moisture during the week.

Rice planting progressed slowly with some delay due to rains and cool weather.

Early peanuts were up in the southern area while land preparation continued in northern counties. The fruit crop was damaged by the mid-March frost over the Low Rolling Plains and peaches in north Texas were damaged further by low temperatures. Peaches continued blooming in east Texas. Pecans were blooming in central Texas.

Onion harvest was in full swing in all South Texas areas, under favorable weather conditions. Carrot shipments continued and harvest of green wrap tomatoes increased moderately in the Lower Valley. All south Texas truck crop areas still needed rain and development of spring planted crops in the areas was further retarded by cool, windy weather.

North Texas onions and east Texas tomatoes made fair to good progress, with soil moisture adequate to excessive. Tomato transplanting was mostly completed except in extreme north-east counties where it was expected to be completed within the next week.

Clover and rescue grass furnished abundant green feed over the eastern third of the State and grass was coming along in eastern and southern Plateau counties. General rain in eastern Coastal and central counties will maintain adequate feed supplies in these favored areas.

Scattered showers were temporarily helpful but soaking rains as well as warmer weather were needed to start green feed in the northwest, western, and extreme southern counties. Heavy supplemental feeding continued in these droughty areas. Spring movement of yearling and early lambs continued.

The program will be held at the First Methodist Church and will be open only to Scouts, Brownies and their leaders.

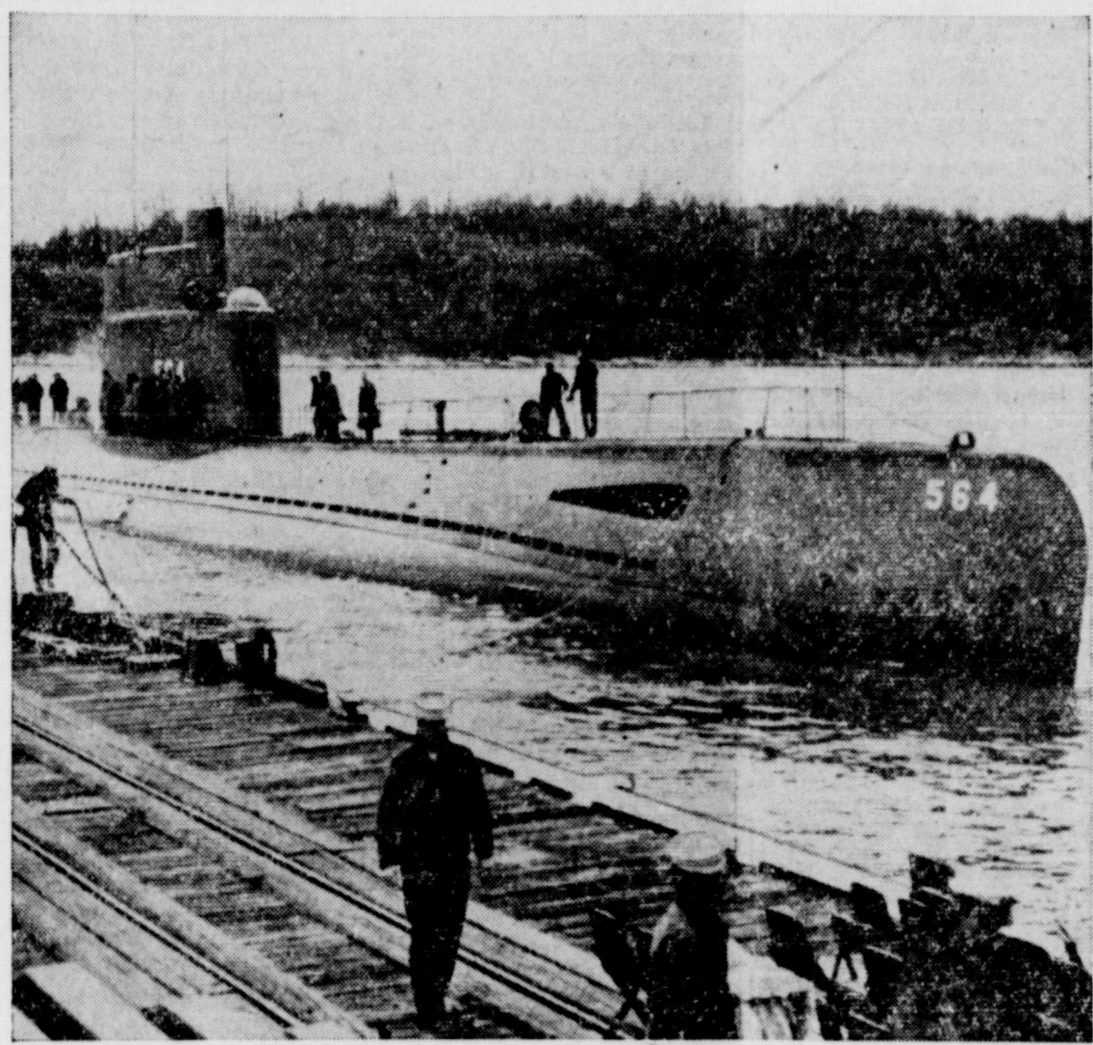

WORLD PEACE HOPES ARE DIM WITH STALIN, SPEAKER SAYS

"The world cannot hope for peace by negotiation as long as Joe Stalin is alive and the head of the government of the Soviet Union," Dr. Eduard Taborsky told Rotarians and guests at the regular meeting of the Rotary Club at the Hotel Victor Thursday.

"There will be either a hot war or the continuation of the cold war," Dr. Taborsky said, "and it is still possible to win the cold war without having a hot one — at any rate it is worth a continuing effort," he said.

Dr. Taborsky said that there was something interesting going on behind the iron curtain. His group, he said, was hearing encouraging reports of a falling away from the teachings of Communism, but that there was a long, hard struggle ahead. He said that the free countries had many allies behind the curtain and that the number was increasing hourly.

He said that there were only a few ardent Communists in Russia and in the satellite countries.

He gave the number as five percent and said that the remaining 95 percent hated Communism, but that "they must pretend to like it or be liquidated." This group he called "Radishes" — Red on the outside and white on the inside. He said that thousands of these "Radishes" were in high offices in Russia and satellite nations and that thousands were in the Russian army.

"Stalin's strength lies," Dr. Taborsky said, "in the fact that he has placed his own men in all the high government positions and in the secret police organization. He is the most hated man behind the iron curtain, and that includes Russia itself. He is hated because of the secret police, because of the living standards under Communism and because the promises have failed to materialize."

In explaining the living conditions Dr. Taborsky said that the average Czechoslovakian wage

Educator Named Bond Sale Leader

DALLAS, April 18. — Charles N. Shepardson, dean of agriculture at Texas A. & M. College, has been named chairman of the agricultural committee for Defense Bond activities in Texas. The appointment was announced by Nathan Adams of Dallas, state Defense Bond chairman.

Dean Shepardson has been active in promoting the sale of Savings Bonds (now Defense Bonds) to farmers and ranchers in Texas since the early days of World War II, and the present appointment elevates him to the relatively small group of volunteers who guide and direct all of the Treasury's Defense Bond activities in the state, Mr. Adams said.

"For many years I have advocated sound financial practices in agriculture," Dean Shepardson said, "and unquestionably this involves, among other things, the establishment of an adequate cash reserve by the farmer or rancher. I know of no better way of accumulating such a cash reserve than by regular purchases in Defense Bonds. I hope that, by working on this committee, I can further this idea as well as to encourage the farm people of the state to contribute an even larger share to the defense effort."

Cisco might hire a woman to greet new comers to Cisco and to give information about churches, schools, businesses, and etc. Gifts from various stores to new comers create a friendly atmosphere also.

If the merchants can keep up

the dollar day bargains that they have started it will attract more people from other towns as well as area farmers and ranchers.

If the general public would come to the school sponsored "Open House" and see the buildings and various rooms the people could see how badly Cisco needs some of the school buildings enlarged or replaced by new ones. The education of the children is very important, because after all, "The Children of Cisco today are the businessmen and women of Cisco Tomorrow."

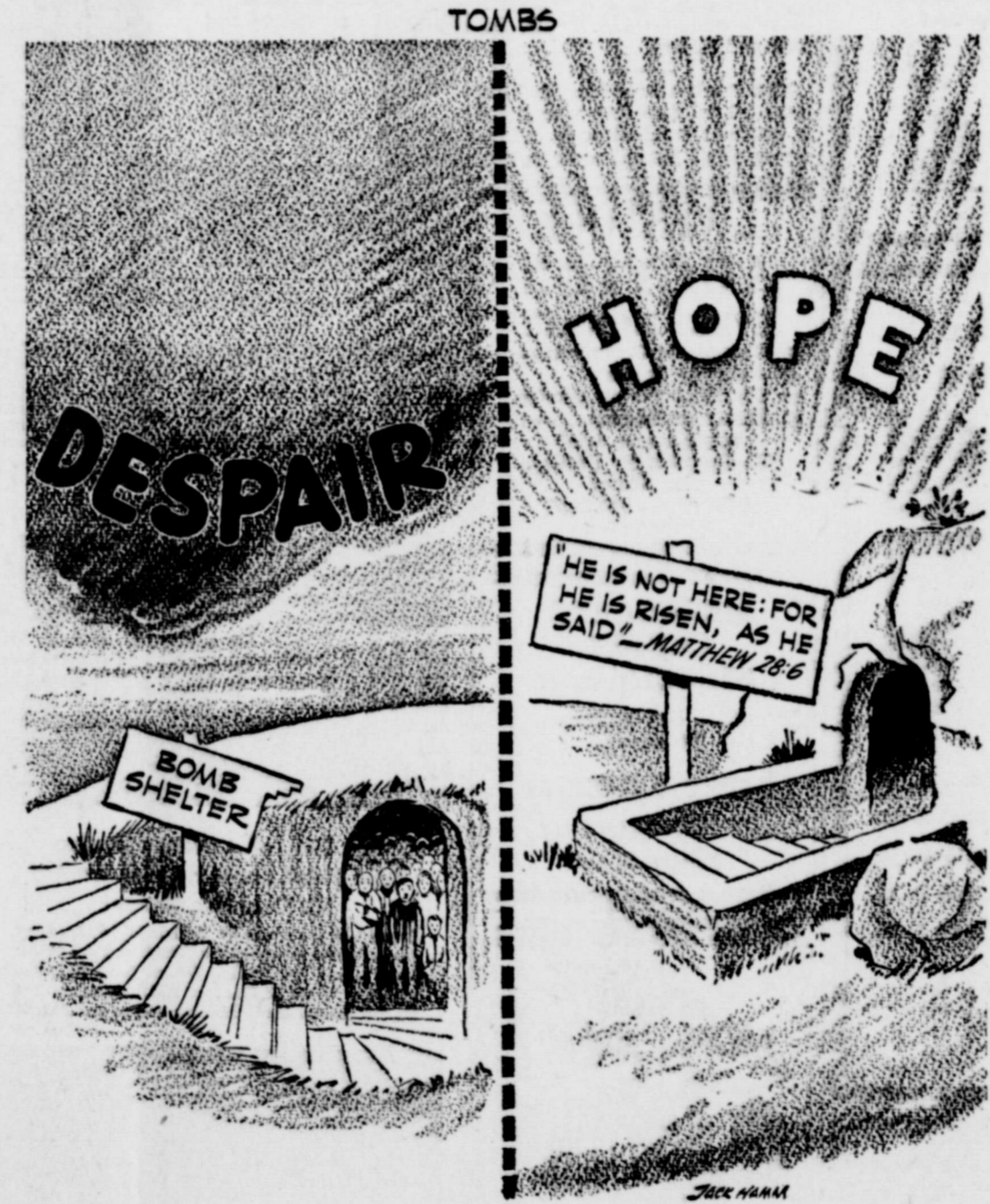

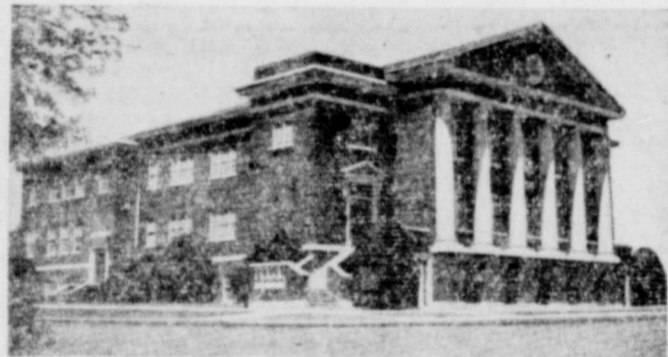

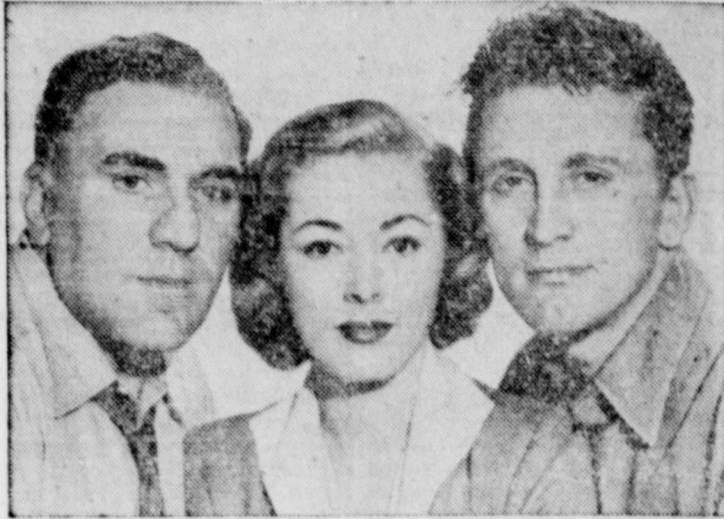
