DALLAS, April 18. - Charles N. Shepardson, dean of agriculture at Texas A. & M. College, has been named chairman of the agricultural committee for Defense Bond activities in Texas The appointment was announced by Nathan Adams of Dallas, state Defense Bond chairman.

Dean Shepardson has been tive in promoting the sale of Savings Bonds (now Defense Bonds) to farmers and ranchers in Texas since the early days of World War II, and the present appointment elevates him to the relatively small group of volunteers who guide and direct all of the Treasury's Defense Bond activities in the state, Mr. Adams said.




