

Construction of two dormitory buildings and a bath house for the Presbyterian Encampment at Lake Cisco was authorized Friday afternoon by the board of rustees after an all-day meeting here, according to an announce-Saturday. Work on the nent project will begin in the immeiate future

The initial construction will begin a 3-year improvement program for the encampment, which being financed by churches hroughout the Mid-Texas Presbytery. The work, which will be one by Garrett and Speir, Inc., is expected to cost between \$7, 00 and \$8,000.
