Last week's election completely went against the old concept that a large turnout favors the Democrats. That was the largest turnout ver, and that should quiet the liberals for at least a wow W. won the vote of 78 percent of white evangelicals, which made up 23 percent o the total votes. Bush also won $52 \%$ of the Roman Catholic vote, and $56 \%$ of white Catholics, defeating the first Catholic presidential candidate since JFK.
Bush also had a $61 \%$ margin from voters who attend čhurch regularly. Kerry won $62 \%$ from voters who never attend church, bu that group made up only $14 \%$ of the voters surveyed.

who came to our country at age 14, she had two goals; to become a citizen and to serve in the Army. In fulfilling her dream, she made that ultimate sacrifice.
Her deyotion to her adopted country reflects the fierce loyalty which makes America the greatest nation on earth. This Veterans Day, Americans pay tribute to those extraordinary men and
