City Council Considers Complaint Petition

GUEST EDITORIAL G.W. Bush Silences Critics With Huge Vote Margin

What do you suppose President George W. Bush's victory margin would have been if it wasn't for the ultra-liberal "Big 3" networks, whose nightly news for more than a year has been dedicated to Bushbashing?

Add to that the controversial "documentary" movie Fahrenheit 9-11 by Michael Moore, and it makes the president's winning margin even more impressive.

Fortunately, the American electorate still votes their "conscience" when they step into the voting booth, and the national voting map resembled a game-day slogan I recall either from Texas Tech or Friona called "All I See is Red!"

After all was said and done, Bush received 59,634,378 votes, or 51.04, to Kerry's 56,084,352. The President received the most votes ever for a presidential candidate. That's a margin of 3.85 million votes.

Last week's election completely went against the old concept that a large turnout favors the Democrats. That was the largest turnout ever, and that should quiet the liberals for at least a week or two.

Approving of the President's religious stance, George W. won the vote of 78 percent of white evangelicals, which made up 23 percent of the total votes. Bush also won 52% of the Roman Catholic vote, and 56% of white Catholics, defeating the first Catholic presidential candidate since JFK.

Bush also had a 61% margin from voters who attend church regularly. Kerry won 62% from voters who never attend church, but that group made up only 14% of the voters surveyed.

Kerry fell out with religious voters for his "pro-choice" stance on abortion.

Another group which helped the President roll to a second term was the Hispanics, especially in his home state of Texas, where GWB won 60%, compared to just 43% of the Hispanics four years earlier.

From the brave last stand at the Alamo in 1836, to rugged Monte Casino during World War II, to the desert sands of Iraq, Texans have earned a reputation for not backing down in the fight for freedom even when it may cost them their lives. Texas has our nation's third-largest veteran community, according to the 2000 census. Over 1.7 million of our 26.5 million veterans live in the Lone Star state. Texas is also home to a large number of defense facilities, with over 114,000 military personnel stationed in our bases. As we pay our respects this Veteran's Day, I hope we will also pause to show them our gratitude as well.

I try to express my thanks to our veterans by doing my part in Congress, where I serve on the Veterans Affairs Committee. There I have worked with my colleagues to ensure we provide our veterans the best possible resources and care. In recent years, we've passed a range of legislation that addressed the needs of . our veteran community: the Veterans' Opportunities Act, which created new life insurance and health care benefits for up to two million eligible spouses and children of veterans; the Homeless Veterans Comprehensive Assistance Act that authorized \$1 billion to aid homeless veterans and prevent others from becoming homeless; and the Veterans Education and Benefits Expansion Act, which authorized more than \$3.1 billion over five years to expand and increase educational, housing, burial and disability benefits.



Several enterprising high schools in the Fort Hood vicinity hooked up a video system to allow proud parents and their children see each other on graduation day. If anyone wants to talk about family values, they should look at our men and women in uniform.

And speaking of values, it is good to know that the courage that burned in the soldiers of the Alamo still shines brightly. Sgt. Pamela Osbourne used to call her husband Rohan almost every day from her supply depot in Baghdad. Her last conversation with her husband is poignant. "Hold your head up, baby," she said. "I'm coming home. Even if I come home in a box, you should know that I did it for you. Take care of the kids. Stay strong. And remember that I love you."

Unfortunately, she and a fellow soldier were killed the next day in a mortar attack. Sgt. Osbourne joined the ranks of those veterans who have died so we may remain free. An immigrant who came to our country at age 14, she had two goals; to become a citizen and to serve in the Army. In fulfilling her dream, she made that ultimate sacrifice.

Her devotion to her adopted country reflects the fierce loyalty which makes America the greatest nation on earth. This Veterans Day, Americans pay tribute to those extraordinary men and women who in every war have unfailingly answered the call to duty. Their memories will remain part of the fabric of our nation forever. To our veterans and their families. Thank you and God bless you.








FHS PHYSICS CLASS LAUNCHES PUMPKINS



Another complicating factor, especially in areas that recorded high snowfall amounts, is the sheer weight of the snow on plant branches and stems. Broken fruiting branches could increase the potential for Bark contamination during harvest and ginning operations down the

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Type 2 Diabetes: Are You At Risk?

November is American Diabetes Awareness Month. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, diabetes is the sixth deadliest disease in the United States, claiming the lives of more than 200,000 people each year. Approximately 90-95 percent of people living with diabetes have type 2, also known as adult onset diabetes.

"The long term effects of diabetes can be devastating and potentially life-threatening," says Fouad R. Kandeel, M.D., Ph.D., director of the City of Hope Leslie & Susan Gonda (Goldschmied) Diabetes & Genetic Research Center in Los Angeles. "Damage to the eyes, nerves, kidneys and cardiovascular system are just some of the many problems that can result from the disease."


Although early detection and an awareness of the risk factors associated with type 2 diabetes can significantly increase the chances of successfully preventing or managing the disease, a third of the estimated 18.2 million Americans with diabetes remain undiagnosed. Those at highest risk for diabetes include:

- o People over the age of 45
- o Those with a family history of diabetes
- o People who are overweight or do not exercise regularly
- o Women who develop gestational diabetes during pregnancy
- o People of African American, Latino, Native American or Asian descent
- o Children who are overweight and in middle to late puberty

Diabetes can cause a multitude of serious complications, including heart disease, stroke, vision loss, kidney disease, skin disorders, foot problems and amputation. Fortunately, following a few simple guidelines can help prevent or manage diabetes and lead to an overall healthier lifestyle. Dr. Kandeel suggests the following:

- o Eat a well-balanced diet
- o Exercise regularly and shed extra pounds
- o Manage physical and mental stress factors
- Practice good personal hygiene, including oral health, skin care, foot care and eye care

"Watch our for common signs of diabetes, which include frequent urination and infections, unusual thirst or weight loss, excessive hunger, fatigue, blurred vision, slow-healing cuts and bruises and tingling or numbness in the hands and feet," says Dr. Kandeel. "People exhibiting these symptoms or who think they are at risk of developing diabetes should consult their physician."

THINK ABOUT THIS God Is Omniscient

Omniscient means having infinite, universal, complete knowledge. God has all knowledge. He knows everything and because God is all knowing, He knows our very thoughts. He knows when we sit down, when we get up. He understands our thoughts from afar. He scrutinizes our paths and He's intimately acquainted with all our ways. (Psa. 139:2-3) Our struggle with the all-knowing facet of God's nature is difficult for many reasons.

First, we and God are on different intellectual dimensions. Our thoughts are not His thoughts and our ways are not His ways. (Isa. 55:8-9) God is unknown until He reveals Himself, and His revelation is selective and limited. Moses said "the secret things belong to the Lord our God, but the things revealed belong to us and to our sons forever, that we may observe all the words of this Law". (Deut. 29:29)

But God's revelation to man is sufficient. Peter said "His divine power has granted to us everything pertaining to life and Godliness, through the true knowledge of Him who called us by His own glory and excellence." (II Pet. 1:3)

One thing we need to remember is that God's omniscience is not equivalent to His will. The fact that He knows all does not mean that He wills all that happens. God knows what you and I are doing and will do with our lives. We may choose to now believe in Him or to disobey Him and be eternally lost. But it is not God's will for any of us to be lost. He desires that we all come to repentance. (II Pet. 3:9) Therefore he educates (Jn. 6:45); He warns (Lk. 12:4-5); and He offers the assistance required to rescue the perishing (Jn. 3:16).

Thank God for His omniscience! He is the only one who can

give our lives the guidance and direction it needs.
