The Gay Philosopher

LIKE MOST PEOPLE, when we want a drink or some water for a bath or something, we turn on the hydrant. And we don't think anymore about it until we get a bill on the first of the month. It never had occurred to us that it takes a lot of work and planning and money to see that the water is in the hydrant when we turn it on.

So yesterday late we accompanied Mayor G. C. Rosenthal, City Commissioner James McCracken, and Water Supt. John Rodden on a tour, looking over the water system from the Lake Cisco reservoir until water arrives at the hydrant. And it was an educational tour — one that any citizen could profitably take.

SINCE LAKE CISCO is low, they're using water from the third intake valve at this time. The valve system is under the dam, and the treating and pumping plants are nearby. Water comes from the lake through the treating plant and a 16-inch pipe line to the 2,000,000 gallon storage tank on college hill.

Pumps at the lake keep the college hill reservoir full, and a pumping plant there distributes water over town.

AT LAKE CISCO, Mr. Arlin Agnew showed us through all of the plant. He has been with the city for a good many years and is a goodwill ambassador for the city as well as an operator of the pump station. Scores of visitors go through the dam each year and he answers their questions.

Every few months rumors go out that there's a crack in the Lake Cisco dam and that it has been condemned. But these rumors are all false. The dam is as good as it was when it was built.

WE WERE SURPRISED to learn that the city's water system is run by only five men. We would have guessed that 15 or more would be needed to keep water going to the city's more than 1,800 customers. Mr. Rodden and his department is doing a fine job.

Right now the city is using around 500,000 gallons of water a day. The daily average will be stepped up to a million or more when it gets warmer. The city used to require around five million a day when the T & P Railroad was watering its trains here (before diesel engines came in) and the fish hatchery was running.

The lake and water system represents a big investment of your money. It might be worth your time to drop out sometime and look over the system.

Probe Of Union Shop Plan Urged By WTCC Leaders

COLORADO CITY, May 1. — Support of the movement in Congress for an investigation of the Wage Stabilization Board's recommendation of a union shop in the steel industry has been urged upon Texas members of both Houses by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in messages from its president, Frank H. Kelley of Colorado City.

Sentiment of West Texas was expressed by votes of Texas members of the House when they supported the Allen resolution, which calls for such an investigation, said Kelley. The measure was supported by all the 18 Texans whose votes were recorded when it was adopted.

Establishment of the union shop in industry by insistence from the Wage Stabilization Board would be a backward and reactionary step in labor-management relations, Kelley said in a letter to members of the Texas delegation.

The union shop is a non-economic issue and properly should be resolved between labor and management and is entirely outside rightful functions of a government agency, said Kelley.

He wrote WTCC directors that in the steel case, the government has become a party to a direct attempt to impose the union shop. Instead of protecting citizens in their right to earn a livelihood, the recommendation would force certain workers to join and support a private organization, which some clearly have indicated they do not wish to do.

"Certain members of the Wage Stabilization Board maintain that they merely recommended the union shop and did not order it. A government recommendation, however, can easily be given much of the force of an order, and might cause a strike to be called under the guise of 'upholding the hand of the government.'"

June Graduates Asked To Obtain SS Cards Early

June graduates of high schools, vocational schools, and colleges are urged to apply for their social security account-number cards before they graduate. Also, students who are not graduating this June but who expect to work during their summer vacations should obtain their cards before classes end. Seasonal workers, who expect to be employed for the first time on jobs covered by social security, should likewise apply early. Many prospective employers will not hire a person unless he has his social security account-number card with him, and many a good job has been lost this way.

Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene social security office, says that the importance of the account number lies in the fact that wages can be credited only through the use of the account number. Since the money recorded in a person's social security account is used to figure benefits, the more money credited in the account the higher the benefits. Thus, if for any reason wages are reported without an account number or with an incorrect number, then these wages may not be credited to the account. Not only future benefits will be smaller because of this, but in some cases no benefits may be payable at all.

The advice of the Social Security office is: "Remember that your social security account-number card is the key to all future benefits for you and your family. Protect it, keep it with you at all times, show it to your employer when necessary, and above all, get in touch with the social security office if you need help."

Chevrolet Safety Program Begins At Local Agency

The A-G Motor Company today announced participation in a nationwide automobile safety program sponsored by the Chevrolet Motor Division.

The program launches for the first time in the automobile industry a continuous routine of car checks in order to eliminate defects that might lead to traffic accidents.

"Indorsed by national safety organizations, we feel this is one of the soundest projects of its kind ever undertaken," said A. D. Anderson. "Over the years it will do much to reduce traffic accident rates in the community."

As explained by Mr. Anderson, in the future all passenger cars and trucks entering his establishment for service will be given a free 10-point inspection. This examination will cover the mechanical item frequently involved in accidents — tires, steering, brakes, front headlamps, rear headlamps, horn, body glass, windshield wiper, rear vision mirror and exhaust system. The owner will then be given a report on the condition of these features.

"The program was inspired by findings that virtually one-third of all cars on the highway are below safety standards," said Mr. Anderson. "In many cases the owners were not aware of the defects in their cars and in a great majority only a slight adjustment was necessary to correct the fault. "Whether or not the car owner decides to authorize repairs in my shop or elsewhere, we will at least bring deficiencies to his attention."

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Work Will Begin In Near Future

Work was expected to begin this week on taking down the Church of Christ building on West 8th Street in preparation for the beginning of construction of a new building estimated to cost slightly under \$40,000.

Arrangements have been made to meet in the city hall auditorium during the construction of the new building and members were advised that services would be held there beginning Sunday morning.

Plans call for replacing the present frame building with a new, modern building with solid masonry walls. The building will be built in the shape of a T with the bible class rooms at the back of the auditorium.

The new building will be centered on the lot and will face toward the north. Plans call for erecting walls of clay face tile in a light color. Windows will be tinted glass in stainless steel frames.

Planting boxes will be constructed at the front of the building to add to the attractiveness, and the lots will be leveled off and landscaped.

The new building will be completely air-conditioned and central heating units will be installed. It will be one of the most modern church buildings in the area when it is completed. The auditorium will have a seating capacity of 500.

Mental Disorders Seen As One Of Biggest Problems

AUSTIN, May 1. — Mental disorders today represent a real problem and it is estimated that almost fifty percent of all hospital beds are filled by persons suffering from mental or nervous diseases, declares Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

It thus appears that modern civilization is exacting a terrific toll. High speed living with its cruel exactions upon nature, is responsible for a large part of the trouble. But improper personal conduct must also shoulder much of the blame. The fact is that nearly fifty percent of the patients entering hospitals for mental disorders are there because of organic or toxic causes.

For example, general paralysis is the direct cause of many mental troubles in males entering hospitals. This condition is an organic disease of the brain due to the germ responsible for syphilis. It is a preventable disease. Early and effective treatment of acquired syphilis will block the end results of general paralysis in the insane.

The excessive use of alcohol is responsible for a number of mental disorders. Alcohol and syphilis combined are responsible for approximately one-fifth of the hospitalized insanities.

Lions Hear Talk On Safe Driving At Luncheon Meet

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IT'S THE LAW in Texas

A public service feature of the State Bar of Texas

Texas are generally aware that we have what is known as the "community property" system in this state, but many do not understand the significance and implications of this fact.

Most of the property acquired by a husband wife, or either of them, during their marriage belongs to them jointly and is referred to as "community property." In fact, the law presumes

that ALL property acquired during the marriage is community property unless the contrary is clearly proved. Not included in this category is property owned by either husband and wife before marriage, and that which is acquired by either of them after marriage by gift or inheritance.

the purchase money or the new property is to be the separate property of the husband or wife.

Very often the money received from a sale of separate property is deposited in the joint bank account of the husband and wife, mixing or "co-mingling" such separate funds with the community funds.

The distinction between separate and community property is important for many reasons, and married persons owning separate property should normally exercise care to prevent its being commingled with the community estate. Lawyers say that separate

bank accounts and proper records will help keep matters straight. Failure to use proper safeguards can result in an alteration of the legal order of descent at the death of a person leaving no will, since community property passes in one way and separate property in another.

Other consequences include the possibility that the separate property of one spouse may become subject to the debts of the community or of the other spouse. Or, if a divorce should occur, one of the parties may lose part of his separate estate during division of the couple's various properties.

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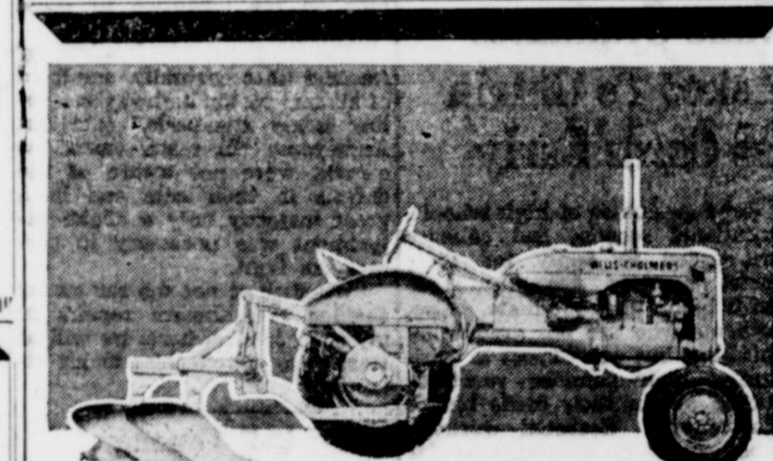

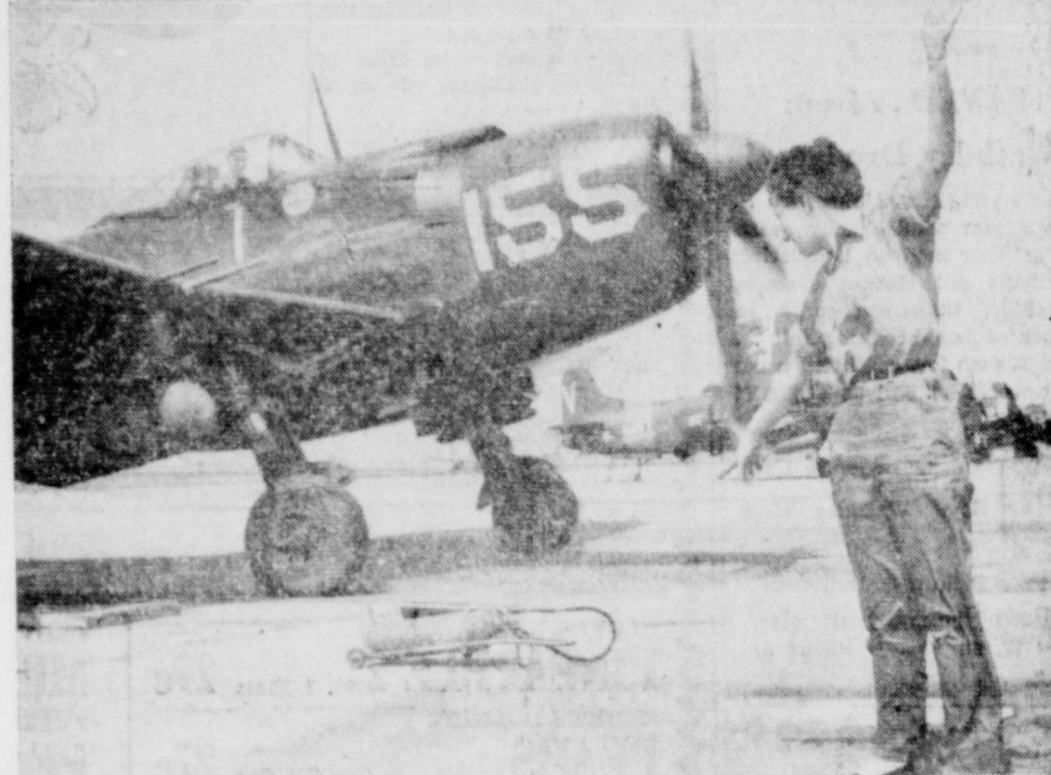

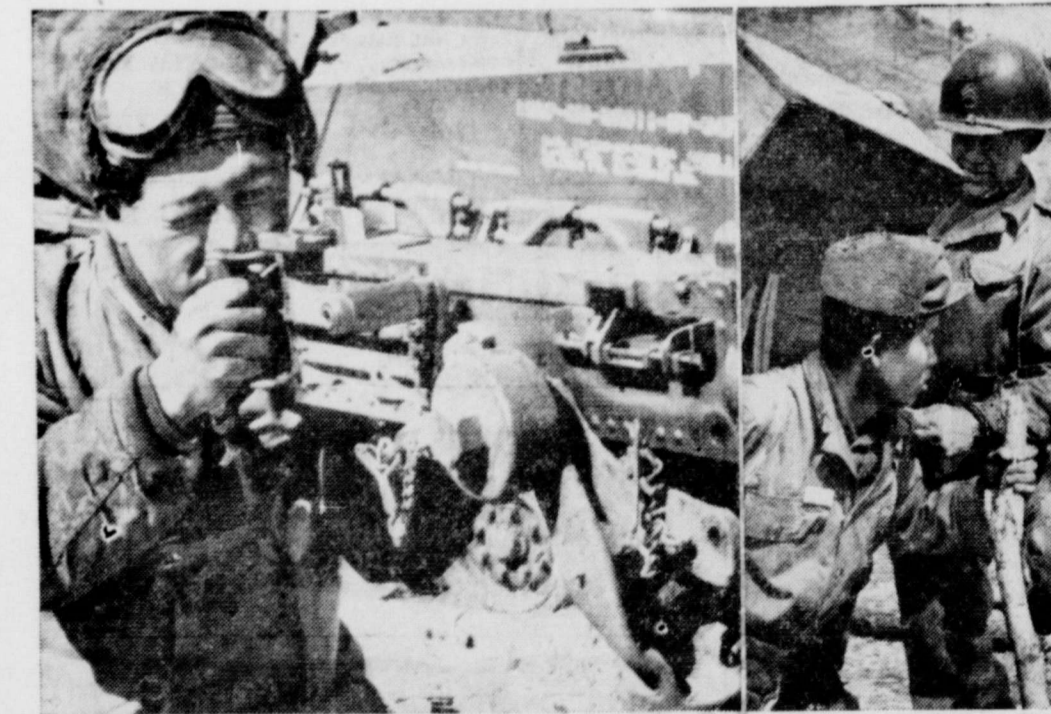

Simple Iron deficiency anemias

result from a lack of iron in the body. If iron can be pictured as the ladle that distributes the oxygen from its container to the organs of the body, then the necessity of iron can be better understood. There may be plenty of containers (globins) carrying oxygen, but if there is no way

for the oxygen to be distributed from the container the organs do not get fed. Iron-deficiency anemia can then be considered as lack of heme, the ladle.

Iron is obtained by digestion of food. It also may be obtained by iron medication. By digestive processes, the acids in the stomach separate the iron-containing substances in food and they are sent out to the liver early during the digestive process in the small intestines. The liver, spleen and other tissues of the body store the iron until it is needed in the bloodstream to form hemoglobin. Once iron gets into the body it sticks around. When blood is lost through hemorrhage, iron escapes, too, but otherwise iron is salvaged when it has done a circuit of the bloodstream and is saved for use another day.

Diets that do not contain enough iron will lead to an iron deficiency. Hemorrhage also can create an iron deficiency. And if something goes wrong with the signal system of the body that calls iron forth from its storage spots, there would be a deficiency in the

iron in the bloodstream even though there is not a deficiency of iron in the body.

Since the liver is the main reservoir of iron, an improperly-functioning liver may be the source of anemia. "Iron and liver shots," therefore, not only place iron in the circulation but also serve as a stimulus to the liver when it is suspected of being the cause of an iron deficiency anemia.

There are many different types of anemia, lack of some part of the complex red cells and hemoglobin. As a rule, all anemias result in failure of some part of the body to receive the nourishment it requires from the bloodstream.

The hemoglobin is considered the container for transportation of the oxygen to the organs fed by the bloodstream. The bloodstream itself might be considered as a sort of truck wagon. Hemoglobin is an integral part of the red cells. The red cells themselves can be pictured as the hot-

plate upon which the hemoglobin (container) rides with the oxygen inside.

Infections in the body are the most common cause for the lack of the hot-plate red cells in the bloodstream. When these red cells are held in the bone marrow because of an infection somewhere in the body, there results a simple anemia, the most common anemia of all and the mildest form of this bloodstream deficiency.

Since the body is not getting its "soup" (oxygen) however, the effects of this anemia are felt in a general weakness, a reflection of lack of proper diet in all parts of the body.

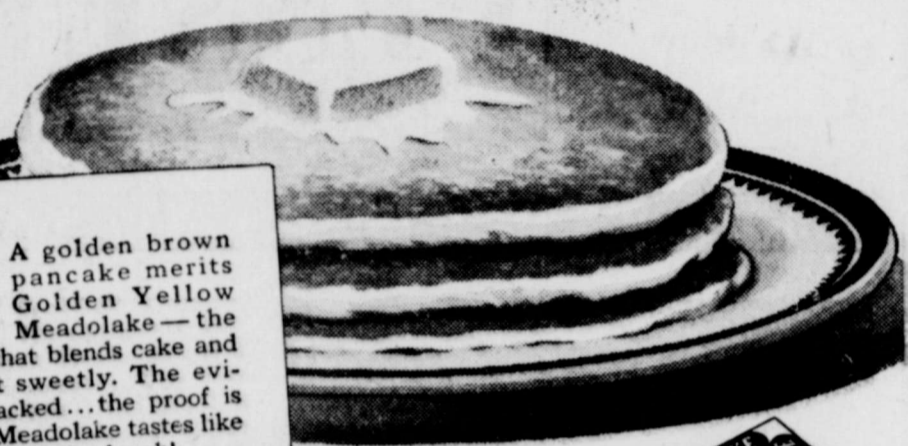
The source of infection must then be found and eliminated to overcome the block against red cell release from the bone marrow. The most common sources of infection which result in simple anemia are those in the urinary tract and pelvis, or rheumatoid arthritis, or lung disturbances such as chronic bronchitis or abscess.

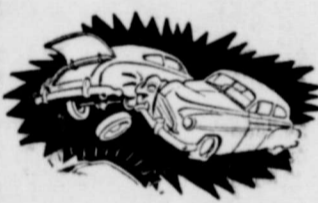

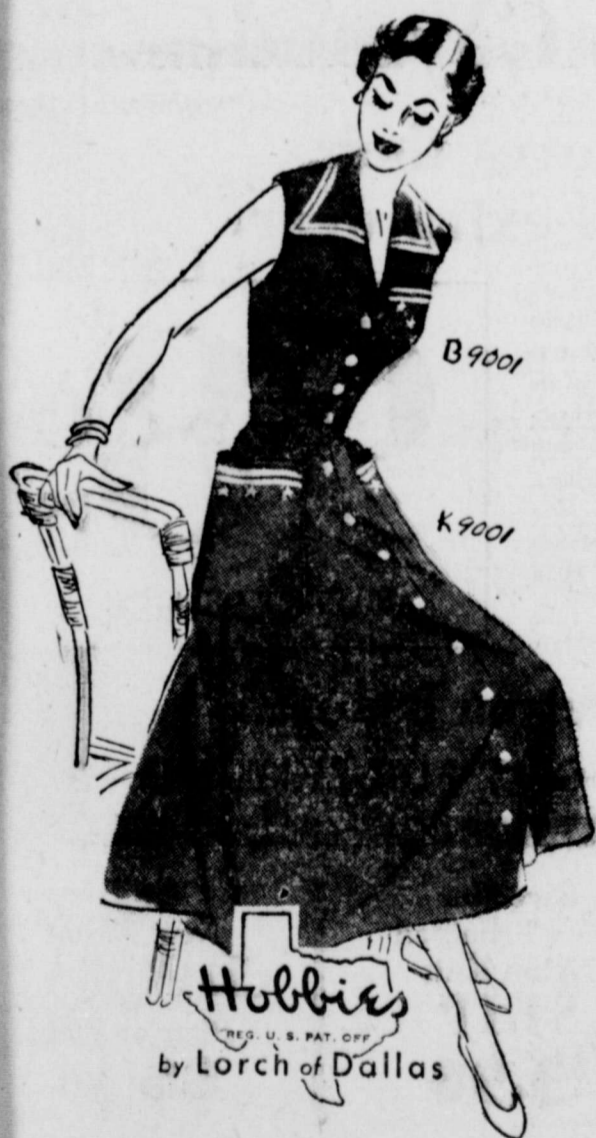
