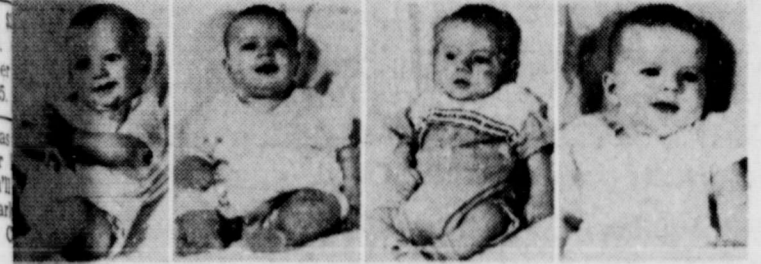

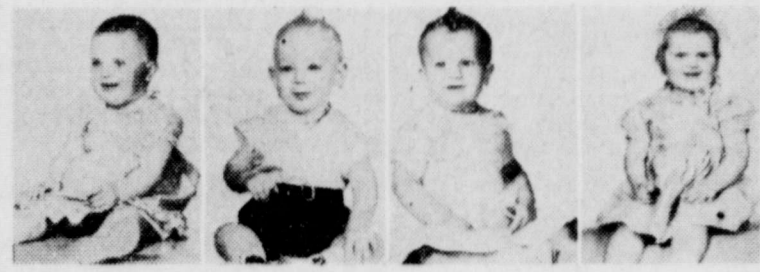

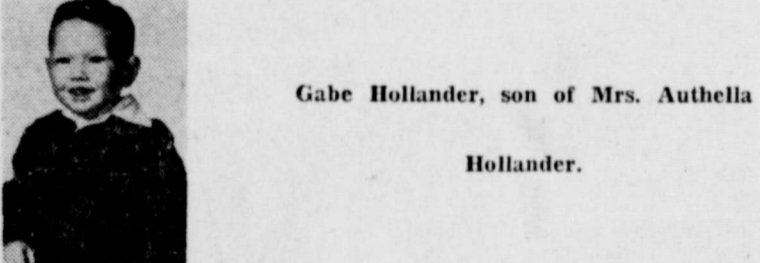

Seed Sowing Takes Care, But Is Not Precision Job

It says on the seed packet: "Sow in drills," or "Sow in hills." This is garden talk, and may deceive the beginner.

A "drill" to the gardener is not a military maneuver, but a shallow trench. A "hill" is not an elevation, except in a few sections of the country where the rainfall is extremely heavy. In most places it is a hollow, in which seed are sown, to produce a plant that stands alone with space around to spread out, instead of standing upright in a row as do plants sown in drills.

It says, "sow half an inch deep." Do you get down on your knees and measure every seed? Of course not. Seed sowing is not a precision job, and need not be. Nature sows seeds in a very careless manner. But the gardener must take more care, to avoid the terrific waste in which nature indulges, but he cannot afford.

The main point in sowing seed is to take care not to bury them so deep they will fail to emerge from the soil. This can be accomplished by the three methods of making

drills which are illustrated here-with.

For tiny seeds, press the edge of a straight stick into the soil. For medium sized seeds, make the drill by using the end of the hoe handle. For larger seeds use the edge of the hoe blade, pressed lightly if you want an inch-deep drill, more heavily for deeper sowing.

The depth to use depends somewhat on the nature of the soil. In sandy loam they may go a little deeper than in heavy clay; and in hot weather they should be at least twice as deep as in the moist spring weather.

Above all, except on a heavy slope, in making a drill, keep it straight. Some gardeners use a narrow plank as a ruler. A garden line is easier to handle, heavy cords on reels are handy, but any stout cord stretched between two stakes will serve.

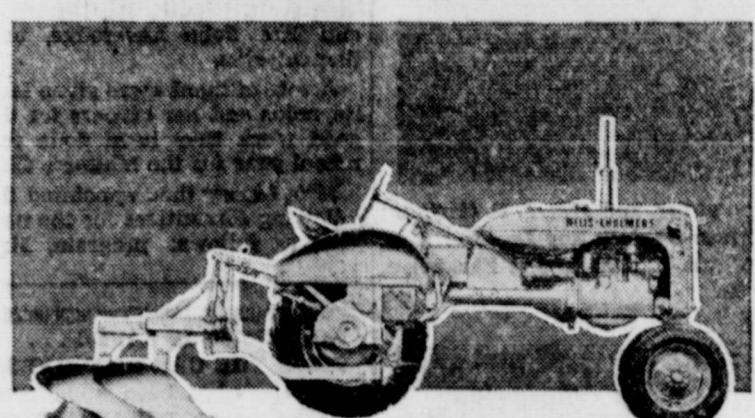

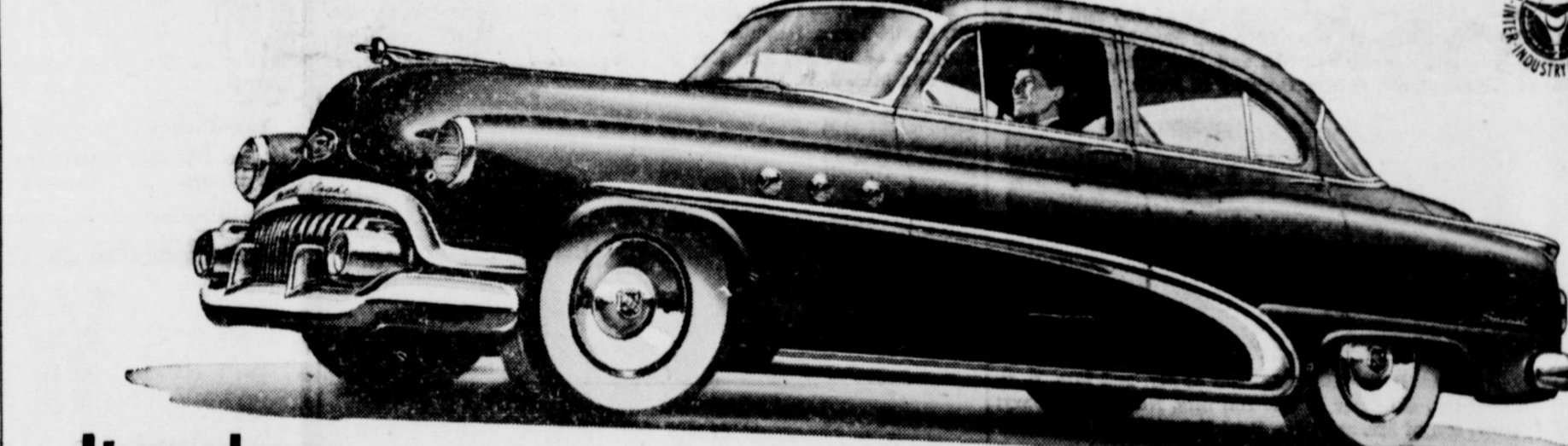

4-H Club Girls Set New Record In Sewing Work

The 4-H Club girls, most of whom live on farms and in villages, have set a new record in clothing work at home that doubtless will amaze their city cousins.

Notwithstanding that many of the girls help cook, launder, do housework and other chores, as well as attend school, 650,000 of them taking part in the National 4-H Clothing Achievement program made or repaired 2 1/4 million garments for themselves and their families last year!

In a closely related activity, the National 4-H Dress Revue program, more than 220,000 girls modeled garments — ranging from school outfits to formal gowns — they had made as being the most becoming to their type and most expressive of their personality.

Both the 4-H Clothing Achievement and Dress Revue programs are being conducted in this and every other State for 1952, under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service. In the programs, girls learn to plan, make and care for garments suitable for work, school and social occasions, as well as to dress appropriately, becomingly and healthfully in keeping with a well-planned family budget. In Clothing Achievement special emphasis is given to techniques of clothing construction, tailoring and fitting. Through Dress Revues, members develop grace, poise, good posture and habits of good grooming by modeling garments of their own creation.

County winners in each program will be rewarded with medals of honor, and State champions will receive an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago next November, provided by the respective donors. In Clothing Achievement, Spool Cotton Co. also provides a national award of a \$300 college scholarship to each of 12 winners selected from State champions. Simplicity Pattern Co. also presents each State winner in 4-H Dress Revue with a national award of a leathercased scissors set.

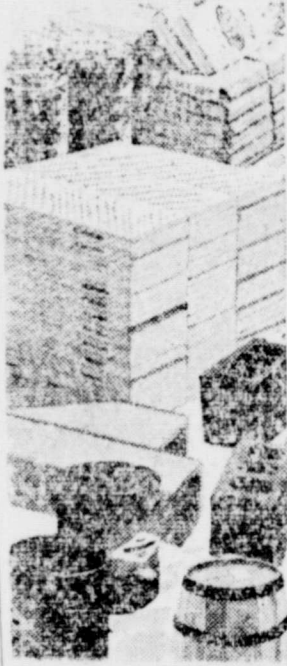
