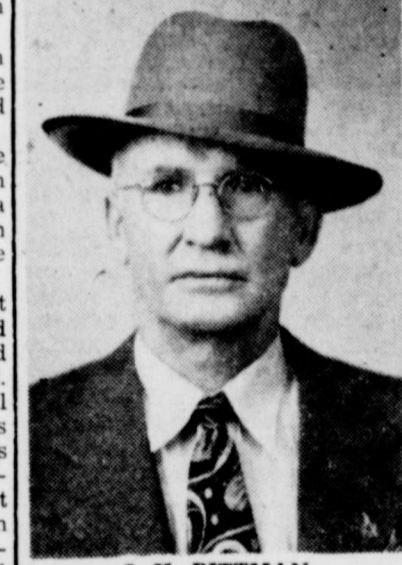
Pittman Makes Statement To County Voters

I have many friends throughout the county and it will be my purpose to see every citizen and voter of the county before election, but if I should fail to do so, please take this statement as a personal solicitation of your vote and influence.

Realizing the fact that this is your business, and you alone have the power, with your vote, to hire one for this important position, I wish to state now that if you so select me, I shall at all times recognize that the office belongs to you and invite you to visit the office frequently. You will at all times receive friendly,

31% Of Animals Get High Rating

Dan Jobe, Scranton 4-H Club boy, exhibited the grand champion female at the annual Eastland County Dairy Show at Fireman's Field in Eastland, on Wednesday with his 3-year old Jersey cow in competition with 50 other animals entered in the show.

A total of 31% of the animals scored high enough to win a blue ribbon in the classification show. The state average for animals at county dairy shows is only 26%, said R. E. Burleson, dairy specialist of the A & M College Extension Service, who served as judge of the show. Burleson also talked on the importance of silage and roughage in feeding dairy animals.

In a classification show each animal judged won on its own merits instead of against each other.

Winners in the junior judging contest composed of 4-H Club and FFA boys were Bennie Cate, Gorman; Jimmy Arendale, Ranger; Larry Powell, Eastland; Adell Gilmore, Gorman; Bob Love, Gorman; George Warren, Gorman; J. W. Akers, Cisco; Neal Tankersley, Eastland; Alonzo Stephens, Ranger; Danny Donaldson, Carbon and G. L. Whitley of Gorman.

In the adult judging contest open to any adult farmer or rancher the first place winner was a G I School student; Weldon Isenhower, of Moran. Others included: J. P. Shipp and Aubrey Lack of Owens in Brown County; O. V. Warren, De Leon; J. E. Watkins, Rising Star; R. D. Bills, Rising Star; David Stuteville, Cisco; Marshal Berry, Carbon; Lloyd Freeman, Pioneer and Howard Ingram of Nimrod.

Aviation Cadets Sought By Navy

Single men between 18 and 27 who have completed at least two years of college are needed immediately to apply for the Navy's Flight Training Program, it was announced today by Captain H. R. Nieman, Jr., USN, Commanding Officer of the U. S. Naval Air Station at Dallas.

After having been closed for nearly a year, the Naval Aviation Cadet Program is again "wide open." Captain Nieman's command in Dallas is charged with the responsibility of enlisting Naval Aviation Cadets, or "NavCads", as they are termed, from the State of Texas.

Captain Nieman said that a continuing need exists to interest college students, particularly graduating seniors, in Naval Aviation. For those who expect to have Selective Service obligations to fulfill, Navy flight training offers an alternative to ordinary enlisted service.

Pre-flight and basic training is conducted at the "Annapolis of the Air," Pensacola, Florida. Advanced training is carried out at Corpus Christi, Texas. NavCads who successfully complete the 18-month period of training are designated Naval Aviators, and commissioned Ensigns, U. S. Naval Reserve, or 2nd Lieutenants, U. S. Marine Corps Reserve.

NavCads are paid \$105.00 per month, plus food, quarters and uniforms. Pay and allowances upon commissioning amounts to \$355.75 per month without dependents, or \$430.75 with dependents.

Men desiring further information on the program should write: NAVCAD, U. S. Naval Air Station, Dallas, Texas. Transportation costs are paid for applicants who wish to take the qualifying physical and mental examinations.

Rabies Reported In Rural Areas

AUSTIN, May 9. — Serious flare-ups of rabies in rural areas in several sections of the country were reported this week by officials of the American Foundation for Animal Health.

Farmers in other areas were alerted by the Foundation, and urged to be particularly suspicious of strange actions by cattle, horses and other farm animals, and to report questionable cases promptly so proper safety steps may be taken.

Two of the worst flare-ups involving deaths of farm animals have been reported in Georgia and Pennsylvania. Chief spreaders of the disease in these areas are said to be dogs, foxes and other wild animals.

"In Georgia alone, authorities report that more than 500 head of rabid cattle have died," the Foundation says. "In Pennsylvania, nearly 100 cattle were stricken and Governor Fine states that 'the incidence of rabies has reached a point where it constitutes a serious menace to the health of the people.' Latest reports from Iowa veterinarians shows that in non-urban areas, rabies kills more cows than any other type of domestic animals.

So susceptible are cattle to rabies, that about half of all cattle bitten by rabid animals will die.




