Dan Jobe, Scranton 4-H Club boy, exhibited the grand champion female at the annual Eastland County Dairy Show at Fireman's Field in Eastland, on Wednesday with his 3-year old Jersey cow in competition with 50 other animals entered in the show.

A total of 31% of the animals scored high enough to win a blue ribbon in the classification show. The state average for animals at county dairy shows is only 26%, said R. E. Burleson, dairy specialst of the A & M College Extension Service, who served as judge of the show. Burleson also talked on the importance of silage and roughage in feeding dairy animals.

In a classification show each animal judged won on its own merits instead of against each ther.






