## H-SU To Conduct 2 Summer Terms

ABILENE, May 13. — Two summer school terms have been announced for Hardin-Simmons University by Dean Robert A. Collins, director of summer school.

The first term will begin June 4 and the second six-weeks session will start July 13. For the first time in several years, the third term of three weeks will not be offered. The summer session will provide for 12 weeks of residence work.

Fifty-nine instructors will teach a total of 210 courses in 18 fields for the two terms. Courses include art and penmanship, Bible, biology, business administration, chemistry, economics, education and psychology, English, French, government, history, journalism, mathematics, music, physics, physical education, sociology, Spanish and speech.

Special workshops and seminars in curriculum, public school art, public music, social studies, elementary school administration, guidance in elementary school, and school buildings will be offered during the summer, according to Dean Collins. English workshop will include discussion of current trends in English, curriculum, and methods.

A two-weeks music, recreation and band encampment, the 13th annual band school, will be conducted by the university July 21 through August 1. Courses in all phases of band and orchestra will be given. The annual choir school will be conducted July 13-19 by Dr. John Finley Williamson of the Westminster Choir College. Dormitories will be open for students from June 4 through August 25. A schedule giving information on the courses, time offered and instructors is now available.

## Native Grasses Win Again



Native grasses have won again in their eternal struggle to keep a cover over hills and valleys, dominate other vegetation, take everything our Texas climate could offer, and still produce a good amount of quality forage for livestock. Leonard Garner, two and a half miles southwest of Dublin, has 239 acres of native pasture that is now in good and excellent range condition. Twenty-five ewes and fifteen yearling cattle were carried on this pasture all winter. The sheep were not fed anything and they were in good flesh all of the time. The cattle were only fed cake a few times during this winter. Garner, pictured above started cooperating with the Upper Leon Conservation District in 1944. He made a thorough study of his land, vegetation and needed treatment and worked up a plan of operation to apply the soil and water conservation practices that were consistent with the capability and need treatment. Improving this 239 acres of native pasture was part of this plan. In 1948, Garner dozed the brush and ran goats (from 100 to 150 head) to control sprouts until 1950. Under the fallen brush the grasses were protected from grazing and able to make good seed crops. Grazing was deferred during the summer and fall season in 1950 and during the summer of 1951. The principal native grasses that increased to make good pasture were Little bluestem, Side-oats grama, Indiangrass, and Texas wintergrass.

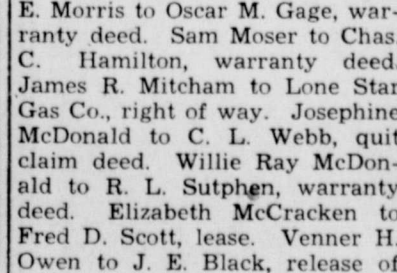

## County Rejects Settlement Proposal For Horace Walker

### CLEANUP CAMPAIGN BEGINS IN CITY; CITIZENS ASKED TO HELP

City and National Guard trucks began hauling off trash and debris for residents of Cisco Monday in the annual spring cleanup campaign, and the drive will be continued throughout the week. Mayor G. C. Rosenthal today called on citizens to join wholeheartedly into the campaign. He noted that some residents were slow to collect and put out their debris. "We can't haul off your trash unless you put it out for us," Mr. Rosenthal said. "We would appreciate more cooperation on the matter of cleaning up vacant lots and property." The trucks will make every street in town and probably will make calls back at many places in the all-out effort to do a thorough job in the cleanup campaign. Civic clubs and others are cooperating with the city in the project.

Special attention was being urged to eliminate possible mosquito breeding places. Those who know of old wells, cisterns, unused storm cellars or other possible breeding places were asked to call the city hall and report the locations.

"The success of the cleanup campaign can be anything we want it to be," Mr. Rosenthal said. "It can be a big success or it can accomplish little — depending on what our people want and how well they cooperate." He stressed the fact that the hauling is being done without charges.

### L. T. Everton Is Seeking Election As District Clerk

L. T. (Lois) Everton, has requested this paper to announce to the voters in Eastland County that he is a candidate for the office of District Clerk. Mr. Everton announced for this office eight years ago, but as he was engaged in defense work at that time, he later withdrew, and did not make the race. He has never held office. He has spent a major portion of his life in the Kokomo community. For the past several years, however, he has made his home in Eastland.

He is a former Eastland county school teacher. Mr. Everton says he will make the race on his own merits and not the demerits of his opponents. If elected, he feels he is qualified to fill the office in a manner that will prove satisfactory to all. His candidacy will be subject to the action of the Democratic primaries.

The deadline for dog owners to have their dogs vaccinated and obtain a tag at the city hall has been postponed for one week — until Saturday, May 17, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported today. Dog owners were asked to cooperate in the anti-rabies measure. Mr. Rosenthal said that city police would begin picking up all dogs without tags next week.

### Action Of Court Is Told By Hart

A proposed settlement of the \$107,356.70 civil suit brought by the State of Texas and Eastland County against Horace Walker, former special delinquent tax collector, was unanimously rejected Monday by the Eastland County Commissioners' Court, it was announced by County Judge John S. Hart.

The proposal, presented by attorneys for Walker, would have permitted Walker to pay a total of 15 per cent of the total amount asked in the civil suit, which the state and county alleges Walker collected on delinquent taxes and withheld from the Eastland County tax collector during the term of his contract with the county. In return, the state and county would have dropped the civil suit, and, it was understood, the six criminal cases which are pending as a result of the collection contract.

Walker has been named in seven Eastland County indictments. Five, charging embezzlement, were sent to the 90th District Court in Breckenridge on a charge of venue.

He was tried on one of these cases last November and found not guilty. The remaining cases were called for trial late in April but were passed by agreement of state and defense attorneys. Walker also faces federal charges of using the mails to defraud and his trial was to come before a federal court in Abilene on April 22. At that time the U. S. District Court in Abilene passed the case until the October term.

At the conference held in Eastland recently to discuss the proposed settlement, representatives of Walker and the attorney general, J. M. Neusse, Frank Sparka and members of the county commissioners' court were present. No action was taken at that time. Judge Hart reported that the commissioners decided in executive session Monday against the settlement on the ground that if Walker was guilty of wrongfully withholding delinquent tax money due the county and state, he should be prosecuted, and if not guilty he should be cleared of all charges and claims.

The action leaves the way clear for the continued prosecution of the cases.

### White Bass Like Hooks Of Women

AUSTIN, May 13. — An in-dolent white bass, with a penchant for being caught by women anglers, has spiced the Lake Texoma research program.

According to Aquatic Biologist Ed Bonn, stationed at Denison, the fish was netted and tagged December 20 last year. It was caught by Mrs. Howard Shires of Pottsboro on March 18 in precisely the same spot it had been released.

Mrs. Shires, after recording the tag data for a report to Biologist Bonn, turned the fish loose. On April 17, it was caught again at the same place, this time by Mrs. J. F. Roberts of Pottsboro, who also threw the specimen back after making notes on its tag number, location of the catch and so forth.

Another cooperative white bass was caught the same day it was tagged and released — on February 20. It had made no change in location.

All of the three fish were caught on minnows. Most of the 13 tagged fish caught to date showed little movement but one, Number 1099, which was tagged and released January 24 and caught March 15 had covered twelve miles.

Bonn attributes lack of movement to the fact that about 90 per cent of the marked fish are yearlings and do not have the size or the urge to spawn.

One fisherman, Howard Jones, caught two tagged fish. Others were reported by Tony Miller of Valley View; Mrs. T. O. Teddlie of Sherman; R. A. Stator of Denison; and Jim Howell of Ardmore.

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TEXANS MUST SPEND MORE FOR EDUCATION, TSTA PREXY SAYS

AUSTIN, May 13. — Texans must spend more of their state tax dollars on public schools or see their children handicapped by receiving inferior education.

That blunt warning was issued here today by Miss Ruth Hillyer, president of the Texas State Teachers Association, who urged Texans to realize the seriousness of the situation.

Heavy annual increased enrollment in elementary and high schools, which is expected to continue at least through 1959-60, plus many antiquated educational plants now in use are the main reasons for the need of more funds.

The increased attendance makes necessary a minimum of 1,000 more teachers each year, and the same number of additional classrooms, Miss Hillyer said.

That, plus the need to make it more attractive for teachers to keep them from going to better paying positions, makes it imperative that the next legislature provide additional funds, Miss Hillyer declared.

Local school districts cannot raise even half of the millions of dollars needed, she said.

The increase in the number of scholastic-age children in Texas is increasing by 50,000 annually and it is expected to continue to do so for several years. Of that number, at least 75 percent will enter the public schools through each year until 1959-60.

"That means that even with teachers having classes of 30 pupils (the ideal proportion is 24 to one teacher), than an average of 1,000 additional teachers, and, of course, that many new classrooms, must be added each year," Miss Hillyer pointed out.

"Too, more adequate pay for teachers to keep them from leaving the profession and to attract new ones is a necessity.

"Texas teachers are 6 percent below the average of all employed persons in the United States and there is already a heavy exodus of instructors.

"Retirement, death and the lure of more pay in other professions takes 3,500 teachers an-

nually out of our schools. In addition, we annually need those 1,000 additional teachers."

Texas must soon build more than a half billion dollars worth of classrooms to keep pace with the increasing enrollment, Miss Hillyer stated.

"Unless we do so, huge numbers of our children will be attending school half time, in double shifts," Miss Hillyer said. "More than 17,500 are doing so this year and that number will triple next year."

Miss Hillyer explains the need for more of the state tax dollar for schools by quoting a recent survey made by the Teachers Association. It disclosed that even if local districts increased assessed valuations and bonded themselves to the limit that they could raise only \$259,383,889.

That is less than half enough to provide adequate classrooms, let alone aid in increasing teacher remuneration, Miss Hillyer declared.

Miss Hillyer also pointed out that schools now cost less than 2 cents more of every tax dollar than they did in 1939-40, the last year before World War II dissipated usual conditions.

Out of each tax dollar, 32.15 cents goes for public education now, whereas 30.31 cents was spent for this purpose in 1939-40.

"When we consider the enormous increase in attendance and the additional teachers required for this increase, the cost of public school education has not kept pace with other governmental costs," Miss Hillyer asserted.

"Texans realize the value of good education to the individual and to the state. I believe if the people are acquainted with the seriousness of the problem, they will insist that the proper support is provided."

I was co-sponsor of the Cisco Junior College and of the bill that gave to our state junior colleges their first per capita appropriation for maintenance. I assure you my all-out support, looking to adequately providing for their maintenance.

"In conclusion, let me say that I am humbly grateful to the voters of the District for the support you have given me in the past and I appeal to you with confidence that my past record justifies your support at this time. I won't let you down in any manner.

Driver Education Course Planned

Daniel Baker College in Brownwood has been designated by the Texas Education Agency and the Texas Department of Public Safety as one of the schools throughout the state qualified to train teachers of Driver Education.

The initial course in this program will be held beginning at 8 a. m. Monday, May 26, and will end 5 p. m. Friday, May 30. The entire course will be taught by instructors approved by both agencies. The course will carry two semester hours credit at the Junior level and is transferable to all institutions in the State recognizing this as a course at the college level.

Such institutions now include schools like The University of Texas and Baylor University. The course is open to all holders of a valid standard Texas teaching certificate and will qualify the person who successfully completes it to teach Driver Education in public schools of Texas. This initial class at Daniel Baker College in Brownwood is limited to 25 enrollees. The total cost for tuition and laboratory fees will be \$25.00. Registration can be completed by mail through the office of the Registrar, Daniel Baker College, Brownwood Texas.

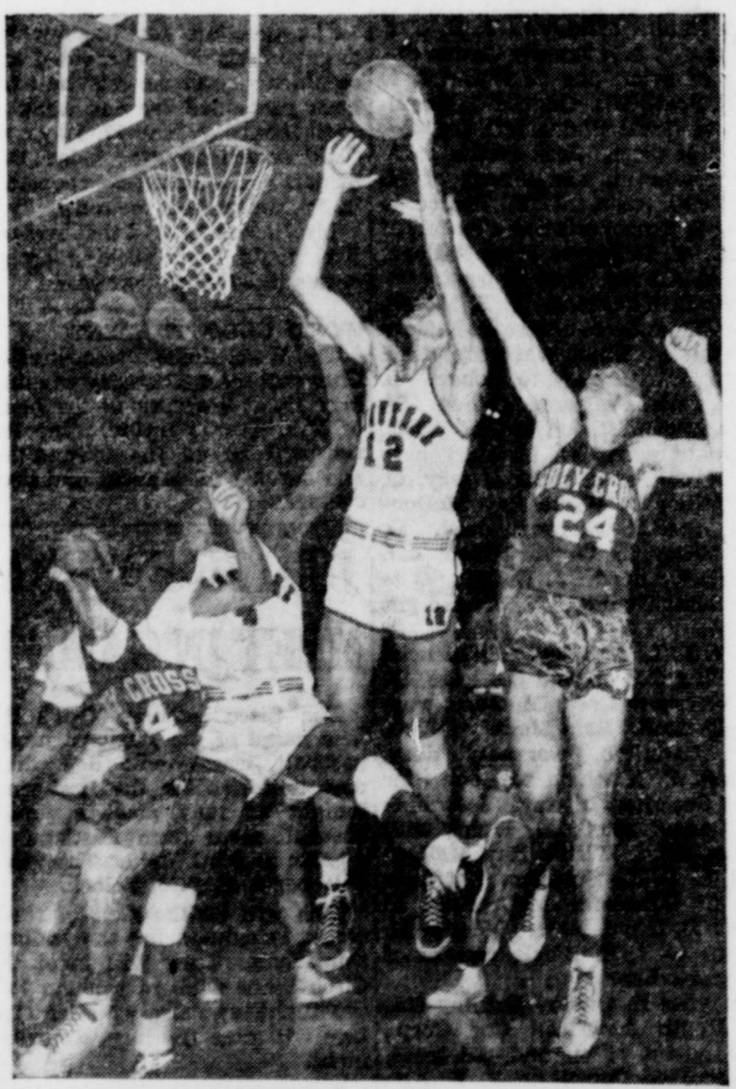

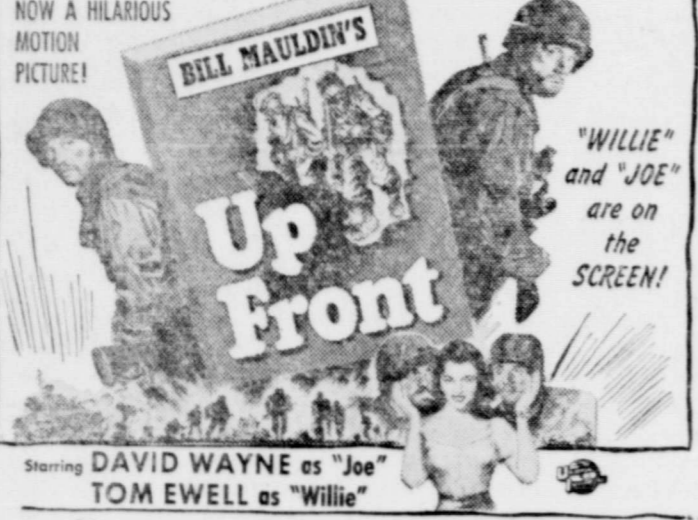
