## PLAYGROUND PROGRAM STUDIED BY LIONS AT LUNCHEON MEET

Cisco has all of the basic requirements for a first class playground and recreation program and organization, work and finances can easily provide it, Coach Jack Everett of Cisco High School told the Lions Club in a talk Wednesday.

Coach Everett spoke in connection with the showing of the film, "Playtown, USA," which is being made available to all local civic clubs and groups this month by the ABC Club. Lion Charles Clark was in charge of the program.

Some 90 per cent of the students of local schools, who wrote essays in a recent Community Clinic program, pointed to a need and desire for better playground and recreation programs, Coach Everett noted. He defined recreation as "anything we enjoy doing."

Coach Everett suggested that the best approach to providing adequate facilities for this area would be to employ a director to organize a program for all age groups. "We should first know where we are going and then organize ourselves to get there," he said.

## FEDERAL AID CHECKS AMOUNT TO OVER \$20,000 FOR MONTH

Checks for insurance payments under Federal social security went to 706 aged persons, children and their widowed mothers in Eastland county for December, 1951. These payments amounted to \$20,690.00 in the county for that month.

In releasing these figures today, Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene social security office, also said that these monthly payments under the old-age and survivors insurance system amounted to \$130,831 for the 16-county area served by the Abilene office, and went to 4,670 persons. "Without these payments earned by workers under this contributory system, the ability of many people to pay for necessities would have been drastically curtailed or entirely ended," he said.

## FARMERS URGED TO TRY CASTOR BEANS AS ANOTHER MONEY CROP

Peanut farmers whose acreage allotments have been cut might consider castor beans as a new and profitable crop, Secretary E. E. Powell of the Eastland County Production and Marketing Agency has suggested.

Castor beans can be grown on land that will grow corn, cotton or peanuts, he said. The beans should be planted on well drained soils and, as they have deep tap roots, shallow or hard pan soils should be avoided. The beans should be planted about the same date as cotton or peanuts.

Producers have found that peanut planting equipment works very well in planting the beans, Mr. Powell said. It will be necessary to stop up some of the holes in the peanut plate. Castor beans should be fertilized about the same as for cotton or peanuts.

Harvesting is done mostly by hand, Mr. Powell said. The first crop matures 110 days after planting. Then, there is another harvesting usually after frost. Producers who have grown the beans do not think there is much trouble in hand harvesting, which is easier and faster than picking cotton.

Hulling plants are now located in Brownwood and Stephenville. If this county has enough acreage, it is possible to locate a plant in the area. Hulling plants charge a half cent a pound.

Seeds are available through the Commodity Credit Corporation at the County PMA office for 15 cents per pound. It takes about 10 pounds to plant an acre. Commodity Credit guarantees to buy all the beans harvested at 10 cents per pound or the market price, which ever is higher.

The highest yield last year in the county was about 600 pounds per acre. Oil and chemicals obtained from the beans are used extensively by manufacturers.

Eastland County harvested 33,000 pounds of seed last year, proving to be a better money crop than peanuts, due to the dry weather in 1951, Mr. Powell said.

## Ranger Is Ready For Golf Tourney Late This Month

RANGER, May 15. — Earl Pittman, general chairman of the 17th Annual Ranger Invitational Golf Tournament, has announced that details for the tournament are complete, and that another good field is expected this year at Ranger. Date of the tourney is May 30 and 31, and June 1.

Invitations have been mailed out by Pittman to golfers at the country clubs over Texas. Jack Cameron of Wichita Falls is the defending champion, having defeated Bobby Adair of Breckenridge for the crown. Cameron is expected to return to Ranger to defend his title.

In 1951, 125 were entered, and as many or more are expected to compete this year for the \$1,000 in prizes.

Qualifying scores must be in by 6:00 p. m. Friday, May 30, prior to the barbecue and calcutta pool scheduled for 7. Match play starts Saturday morning and the finals will be Sunday.

## Heart Diseases To Take 30,000 In Texas This Year

AUSTIN, May 15. — State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox has forecast the death this year of some 30,000 Texans due to heart and blood vessel diseases. Twenty thousand will be men, and at least half the total figure — both men and women — will be less than 70 years old.

The problem of worn-out hearts, thickened blood vessels, and kidney disorders is an old one, he asserted, but said the longer length of average life isn't the whole reason for the great numbers of heart disease deaths.

To prove that point he quoted these figures: Of the 30,000 Texans that cardiovascular (heart and blood vessel) diseases will kill in 1952, about 15,000 will be less than 70 years old, 700 will be in their 30's, 2,000 will be in their 40's, 4,500 in their 50's, and at least 7,000 in their 60's.

Since 1941, the male death rate has exceeded the female rate by something like 70 per cent, the health officer said. For those 75 and over the risk of death from heart disease is a fourth again as great for men as it is for women.

These ever increasing deaths to heart, kidney, and blood vessel disorders have been observed for the last 30 or 40 years.

"If a statewide heart program is to develop," he declared, "it will be necessary that there be provided a professional coordinating committee that will council on program procedures and give necessary directions on essential medical services."

He credited the American Heart Association with "successfully influencing" fund appropriations, and for formulating a heart control program for the nation.

## Negro Preacher In Jail After Shooting Scrape

A 60 year old Cisco Negro was in a serious condition in a local hospital Thursday morning suffering from a gunshot wound, and a 46 year old Cisco Negro preacher was in the Eastland County jail in lieu of \$1,500 bond under charges of assault and attempted murder as the result of a shooting fracas at the Greater St. Mark's Baptist Church about 8:30 p. m. Wednesday.

Pat Patterson, a deacon in the church, was hit in the left shoulder, neck and jaw with a load of No. 7 shot from a 12 gauge shotgun allegedly fired by the Rev. T. T. Gee, minister of the church.

According to Eastland County Sheriff Frank Tucker, the shooting was the result of church trouble which had been brewing for some time. Patterson and other members of the church were conducting a business meeting without the consent of the minister, it was reported. Rev. Gee entered the building and announced that the meeting was over. After a few words the shooting occurred.

Sheriff Tucker, who was in Cisco at the time of the shooting, was aided by local officers in making the investigation.

At the Romney services Clack will speak at the services at 11 a. m. Sunday and Pelfrey will bring the message at 7:45 p. m. Everyone was invited to attend.

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## HOW TO SAVE \$10,000,000.000

The Committee for Economic Development has made a searching study of the President's proposed budget. It finds that the \$10,400,000,000 cash deficit which is indicated can be eliminated without raising taxes or damaging the security programs in any way.

First, the Committee says in its report, actual expenditures for military functions of the Defense Department and for foreign military aid will lag at least \$3,500,000,000 behind the President's estimate of \$58,000,000,000, "even

cy in the military programs. Third, it recommends that about \$2,800,000,000 be cut from the \$26,700,000,000 proposed for other than military and foreign aid expenditures.

A number of other studies of the budget have been made by authoritative groups and organizations. It is significant that almost all of them, even though they differ over some details, indicate that the budget can be cut in the neighborhood of \$10,000,000,000 without harming the

national security. And they argue that this must be done, lest a new wave of inflation which would really undermine our security be started.

Waste in military spending is every bit as bad as any other waste. The taxpayers are entitled to a dollar's worth of goods and services for each dollar spent — whether that dollar goes through the hands of the Defense Department or the Post Office. Rigid economy is in itself a powerful weapon of defense.

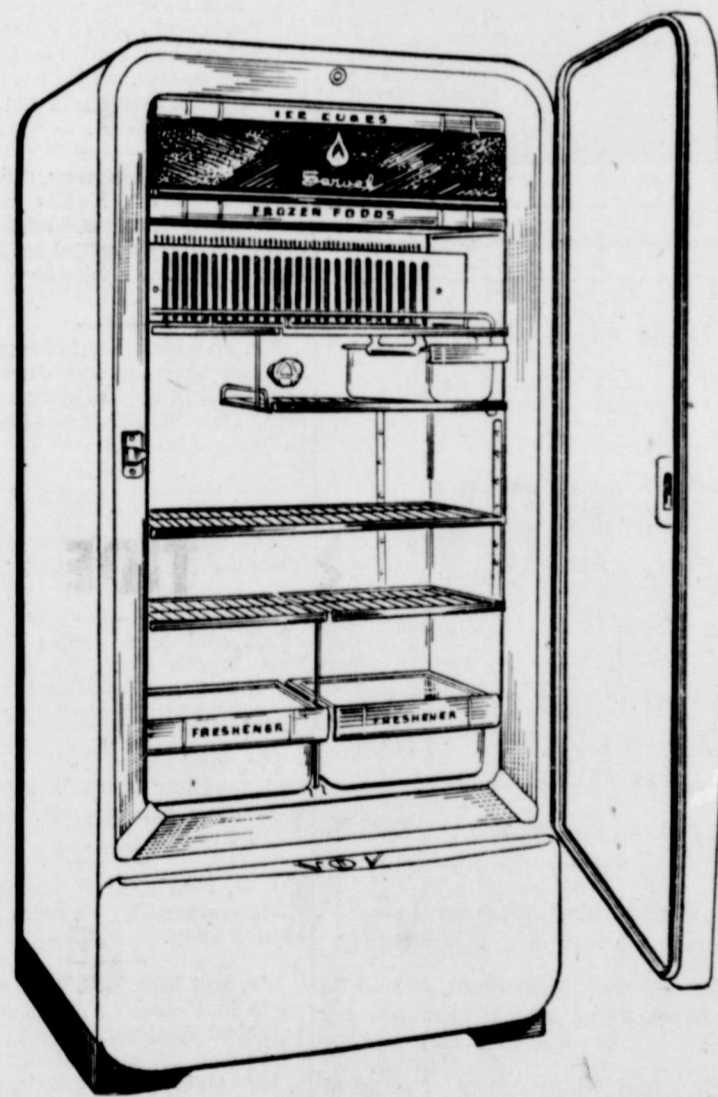

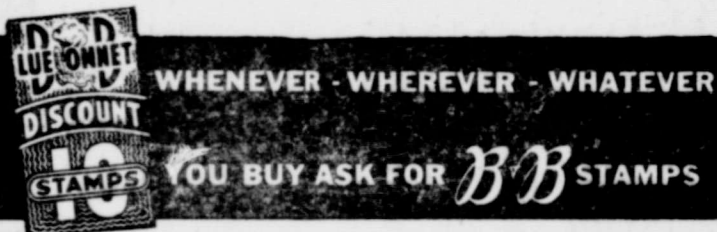

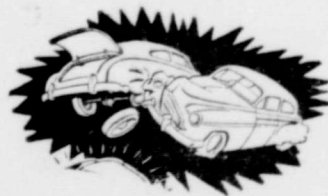

**HEALTH TALKS**

The liver manufactures bile from the ingredients of the bloodstream and the digestive tract. This bile is stored in the gall-bladder until needed and is then sent back to the small intestine through the hepatic duct.

This bile is a very bitter, salty fluid that ranges from chartreuse to golden-brown in color. When the liver is not functioning properly, one of the first signals is a yellowish tinge to parts of the body, the skin or the eyeballs or some other part. This usually signifies that the bile is not being emptied properly into the first part of the small intestine, the duodenum. The yellowish tinge is called jaundice.

In the small intestine the bile, which is actually made up of many ingredients, goes to work on fats. It breaks the fats down into a soapy lather so that they can be digested and absorbed properly into the body.

In addition to aiding in the digestion of fats, bile also acts as an astringent for the intestines, keeping the walls from getting flabby. It serves to tighten them so that they can push the mush of the intestines along from one scallop to another in peristaltic waves.

The liver is called an organ because it is made up of many different kinds of cells, bound together. It also is called a gland because it manufactures a chemical, bile, which is secreted and distributed to other parts of the body. There are two kinds of glands in the body, the kind like the liver that sends its secretion through a tube to other parts of the body, and the kind that has no tube, the ductless glands, that release their secretions right into the bloodstream that flows through them.

**IT'S THE LAW**  
in Texas  
A public service feature of the State Bar of Texas

There are only two ways to get a thing done. You do it yourself or get someone to do it for you. When you get someone to act for you he is your agent. This right to represent you may be given orally or in writing.

It is best to have the agency relationship carefully defined and written down. When written, the document often takes the form of a "Power of Attorney."

Any person legally competent to act for himself may give to another power of attorney to act in his place. With the growth and expansion of business it is difficult for one man to handle the variety of complex tasks that come his way. It is more expedient to delegate power and responsibility to others, thus giving such persons authority to make binding contracts in his name.

The person who delegates the power is called the principal, and the person to whom the authority is given is the agent. Third persons can deal with a properly authorized agent with the knowledge that the law will enforce the obligation against the principal.

The law sets up two broad classes of agents — special and general. Most agents are special

agents — that is, they have specific authority to do only certain things. When a person is named in a power of attorney as a general agent, he is authorized to act in all proper cases as if the principal were acting in person.

For example: A citizen-soldier leaves home to go to war. He needs someone to represent him while he is away. He names such a person — usually a parent, wife, or trusted friend — in a power of attorney, giving this person specific powers or a general power to act in his behalf. If the soldier wants to sell his home while overseas, he can give such agent the power to sell the home, and may limit the agent's authority to this one matter. When this agent begins negotiations for the sale, the prospective buyer can, by an examination of the power of attorney, know exactly what authority the agent has.

If the person is given a general power of attorney, he can transact all the serviceman's business as though the soldier were home to act for himself. Suppose the soldier owns a store and wants someone to run it while he is away. He may authorize this person through a power of attorney to buy, sell, extend credit, collect bills, deposit and withdraw money from the bank, and, in short, do business on the same basis as the serviceman could if he were present to run the store himself.
