EVERY EDITOR'S mail these days is full of inside dope on the political situation — from the horse races to the presidential campaign. For example, we have just received a letter from a man who works in the Granite Trust Building, Quincy, Massachusetts, who reports with a certainty that General Eisenhower is going to be the next president. Forty per cent of the voters are Democratic, 32% Republican, and 28% Independent. Thus, with a voting population of 55 million, the Democrats control about 22 million votes. Our correspondent says the Independents will elect the president this year, and that Eisenhower can get the Independent vote.

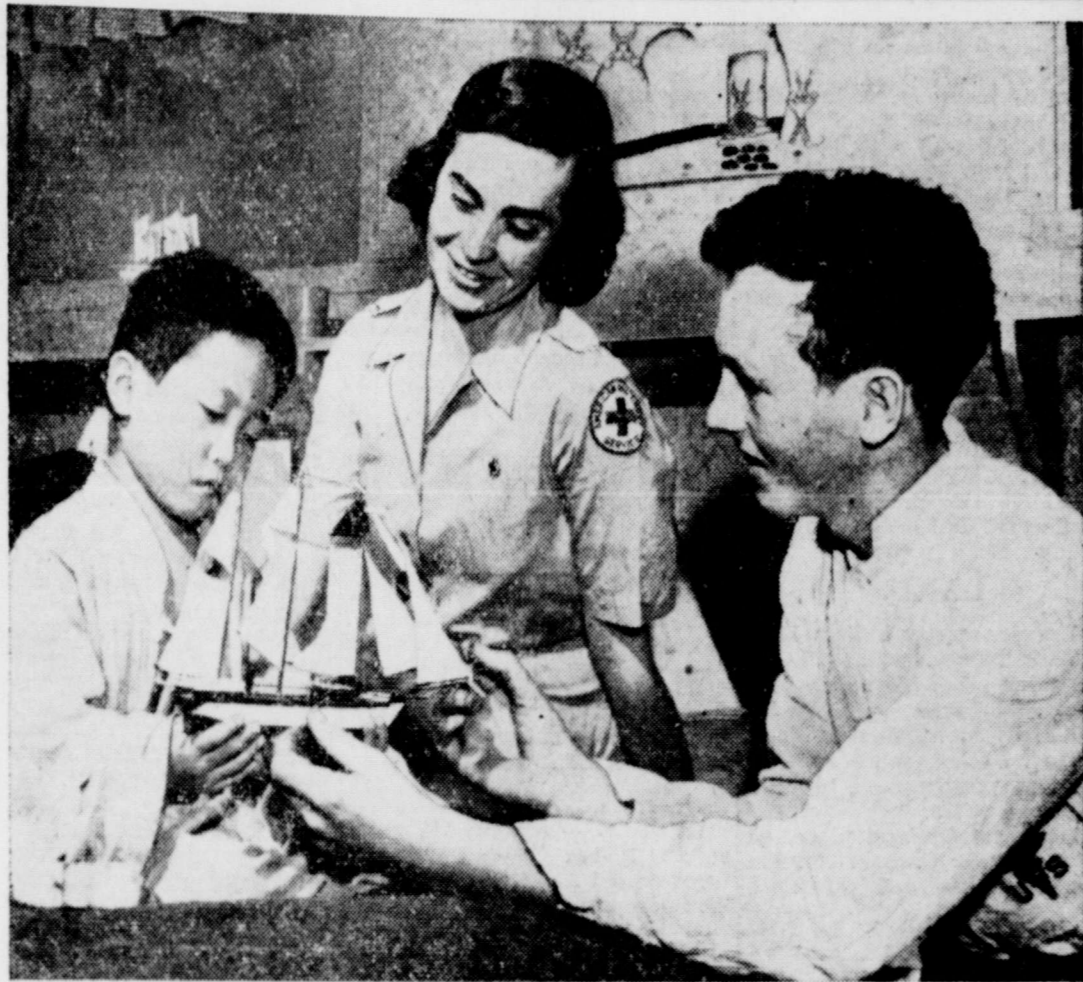
Mrs. Charlie Cofer, wife of the president, donated a new flag to the club. And it's flying high winds these days.

Shorthorn Sale Will Offer Top Quality Cattle

Cattlemen of the Southwest will be interested in the Central Texas Shorthorn sale at Stephenville on May 21.

Seventeen of Texas' best known breeders have consigned 21 bulls and 40 females. The females include 14 mature cows, 17 bred heifers and nine open heifers. They represent some of the best breeding lines.

A. H. Caraway, De Leon, secretary of the Comanche County Shorthorn Breeders' association, is sale manager. Tom W. Bridges, Henderson, will judge cattle, and C. D. Swaffar, Tulsa, Okla., will auction.

Highest sale for the breed ever held in the Southwest was recently recorded at the Seofield Ranch, Austin, Texas. The average of \$2,332 was the highest average for any sale of Shorthorns in the country this year. The price of \$5,000 for the top-selling female and the average of \$2,074 for females were the highest in modern times.

Events of the past year have indicated a great increase of interest in Shorthorns in the Southwest, according to Allan C. Atkinson, secretary of the American Shorthorn Breeders' association.

Civil Service To Hold Job Exams

The United States Civil Service Commission today announced new examinations for Chemist, Physicist, Metallurgist, Mathematician, and Electronic Scientist, and for Coal Mine Inspector.

Coal mine inspector positions are in the bureau of Mines, U. S. Department of the Interior, located in the various coal mining sections of the United States. The salaries range from \$5,060 to \$7,040 a year. No written test is required. To qualify, applicants must have had progressive coal mining experience. Part of the experience must have been in a position of at least the responsibility of a mine superintendent, mine foreman, mining engineer, or safety inspector or engineer and must have involved the responsibility for providing modern coal mine safety and health programs. Successful completion of college courses in engineering may be substituted for part of the experience. Applicants must be able to drive an automobile. The maximum age limit is 48 years.

Full information and application forms may be obtained from the Commission's local secretary, Sam King, at the Cisco post office.

Ralph Butler Rites Are Still Pending

The time of the funeral services for Ralph Butler, 46 year old Boss Manufacturing Company employee who died suddenly Thursday following a heart attack, was still uncertain Friday awaiting word from a son in Korea. The services will be held at the East Cisco Baptist Church and will be conducted by the Rev. F. C. Bradley but the time had not been set late Friday. Burial will be in Oakwood.

Sgt. Prickett Is Home From Korea After 10 Months

Sgt. Bobbie Joe Prickett, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Prickett of Cisco, arrived here Wednesday afternoon after spending 10 months on the Korean front with the United Nations forces.

Sgt. Prickett is on 30 day leave before reporting to Fort Sill, Oklahoma, for reassignment. He served with the 2nd Infantry Division, 38th Field Artillery. He entered the services in January, 1951, and is supposed to be discharged from the service in October.

He was raised in and near Cisco but did not attend school here. While in the fighting in central and eastern Korea and saw action in the Bloodynose Ridge and Heartbreak Hill battles. He was awarded the Purple Heart medal, the Bronze Star and a unit citation medal. The Purple Heart award was given for wounds in action. Sgt. Prickett received a shrapnel wound in the hand and spent some time in the hospital.

He was to leave Friday for a few days in Laredo to be with his parents who are staying there temporarily while Mr. Prickett is at work on government construction. He will return to Cisco for a few days before reporting to Fort Sill for duty.

Eastland Digs New Water Well

The City of Eastland has completed the first of ten water wells planned in the vicinity of Lake Eastland in a move to provide that city with adequate water for the coming summer, it was reported here today.

Well No. 1 was completed as a 40,000 gallon per day producer at 25 feet. The second well was to have been started today. The wells are planned near the south spillway. The water will be pumped into the city lake and into the water mains.

The city hopes the ten wells will be good for 400,000 gallons per day during the summer.

A steering committee composed of M. D. Conger, Jack Everett, G. C. Rosenthal, Alpha Elder, Rev. Grady James, B. A. Butler, Arlin Birt and Joe Comingore was named by Mr. Farrow to map out a program for this summer.

In keeping with a suggestion that a hobby shop project be undertaken, Mr. Farrow named Rev. D. M. Duke, Arlin Birt and James Starr on a committee to investigate the possibilities of using the school's wood working shop during the summer.

Equipment Moving In To Sink Two New Oil Tests Near City



UP IN FLAMES—Crowds gathered to watch more than 100 firemen battle a five-alarm fire in lower Manhattan. Fifteen persons, 12 of them firemen, were injured in the half-million-dollar blaze that filled the sky over the area with heavy smoke. Although 33 pieces of equipment were used to combat the fire, it took three hours to bring the flames under control.

Two Wildcats To Be Drilled Soon

Drilling machinery was being moved in today for two deep oil tests just west of Cisco. One of the wells will be near the West Cisco Lake Pool discovery well, and the other is to be a wildcat one and a half miles southwest of town.

Johnston and Johnston of Longview was moving in to drill their No. 1 Davis-Edwards as an offset to the L. A. Warren et al No. 1 Mrs. Maurine Royall, the discovery well. Location is 1,637 feet from the north and 395 feet from the west lines of the southeast quarter of Section 86, Block 4, H&TC Survey. Permit calls for 4,000 feet.

A mile and a half southwest of town, Connally-Jackson, Abilene, was moving in to drill their No. 1 Walker Estate. Location for the 4,000 foot test is 330 feet from the south and east lines of the northeast quarter of Section 87, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

Drilling is due to begin in the next few days in both wells. Another new location for the discovery well area west of town is expected to be announced in the next week.

Two wildcat locations were staked Thursday elsewhere in the Cisco area. Hack Drilling Company of Abilene plans to drill their No. 1 Hines, O'Conner, et al, as a 4,200 foot rotary test seven and a half miles south of Cisco. Location is 990 feet from the north and 2,310 feet from the east lines of the south half of the SP Survey.

The other project is the A&P Development Co. No. 1 Schaefer, a 3,900 foot test four and a half miles northeast of Pioneer. Location is 2,837 feet from the north and 1,460 feet from the west lines of the northeast corner of Section 13, Block 6, ET Survey.

Malco Refineries, Inc., of Roswell, New Mexico, has completed their No. 1 A. N. Prince in the L. Lomance Survey as a Caddo lime gas well, it was reported here. The well is three and a half miles south of Nimrod. Completion test showed 90,000 cubic feet of gas daily from open hole at 2,709-23 feet.

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THE DIFFERENCE!

Wilfred May, executive editor of the Commercial & Financial Chronicle of New York, recently went to Russia to report on the Moscow Economic Conference. He is one of the few Americans who have had the chance to see what life is now like in the communist capital.

On his return, Mr. May was interviewed at length by the editors of the U. S. News & World Report. One part of the interview dealt with the living standards of the masses of the Russian people — as distinct from the ruling class, which enjoys great luxury. A question was, "Is there much stuff on the shelves in the stores?" Mr. May answered, "There is nothing but queuing up at the stores all day long. They are all government stores and they cut off and on the tap of consumer goods. So people are queuing up for everything from theater tickets to a bottle of milk. . . . There is queuing to the nth degree from 9 in the morning to 9 at night."

The kind of supplies and services a people can buy at the retail level provides a pretty accurate measure of a nation's life. In a free enterprise economy, such as ours, consumer demands and likes and dislikes determine what the factories and the stores stock. Except in time of war or some other very grave emergency, everything is offered in abundance, and the most finicky shopper can find what he wants. The price is held by competition to the lowest figure consistent with the economic conditions of the day.

In a socialized or government-controlled economy, on the other hand, officials of the state decide what goods the people shall have, in what quantity they shall have them, and what price they shall pay. The inevitable result is poor goods, excessively-expensive goods — and standing for hours in queues in an effort to buy the necessities of life no less than a modest luxury or two.

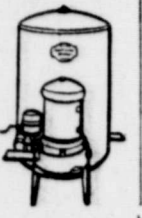

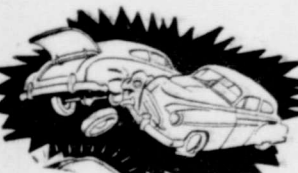

The liver has many functions besides the manufacture of bile. In medical language, the manufacture of some substance in the body that is sent on to other organs to be used is known as secretion. The manufacture of some substance which is released as waste is known as excretion. The liver does both. Bile is a bitter, greenish-gold fluid which the liver secretes. Glucose is a sticky, sweet syrup

which the liver secretes. Hemoglobin which the liver secretes. Fibrogen and plasma proteins are the "plastering" ingredients in the bloodstream which the liver secretes. Prothrombin is the "wiring" that needs other ingredients to make it into a screen to help in blood coagulation—It also is secreted by the liver. And it is thought that the liver also secretes a substance called heparin, which serves as a regulator against too much coagulation of the blood.

Some of those secretions of the liver go into the bloodstream and some go into the digestive tract. Some of the excretions of the liver go both ways, too.

Bile pigments, the coloring matter of the bile, are considered an

excretion of the liver, as are such substances as cholesterol, urea and uric acid. Urea goes from the liver to the bloodstream to the kidneys.

All these ingredients manufactured in the liver have far-reaching effects, being distributed for definite purposes to all parts of the body. The liver takes materials from the intestines and the blood and manufactures these substances and sends them out on the right tract. If the liver can't get the raw material from

the digestive tract or bloodstream, it can't manufacture the necessary ingredients. And if the outgoing tracts don't function, the liver can't get the new products to where they are supposed to be.
