THANKS TO MR. Algie Skiles of our town, we've had another look at a Vol. 1, No. 1 newspaper, the Scranton Reporter published on Friday, March 3, 1911. It is a 5-column newspaper and printing was very good. It contains four pages. The lead article tells "Some Facts About Scranton." And these facts are very interesting. Those days, Scranton was one of the region's principal trading centers with a number of dry goods stores, grocery and hardware stores, blacksmith shop, telephone exchange, hotel, two churches and "the best preparatory school in West Texas." The school referred to was the Scranton Academy. It was organized in the summer of 1903 by a group of citizens got together and raised \$1,600 for that purpose. Prof. O. C. Britton and his assistants opened the school the next year. The school was closed from time to time, and in 1911 it had 185 students. The paper called attention to the fact that Scranton was growing "with not a vacant house or building in town."

Business in the paper were run by: T. Gattis & Son, groceries; D. Steel, hardware; W. F. Dodson, studio; W. P. Gattis, general merchandise; F. P. Shackelford Putnam, hardware; John T. Gattis, groceries; C. A. Gattis, drug store; R. L. Ray, dry goods; W. Ledbetter, barber shop; H. R. H. W. Sprawls, real estate; J. H. Richardson, tailor shop.

One ad reads as follows: "As we have sold Putnam Exchange, please ask operator rates before buying." — H. R. Sprawls. It was most interesting to look through the old paper.

## Outcome Of Two West Cisco Oil Tests Due This Weekend

### E. C. Mosley Is Victim Of Auto And Truck Mishap

Cisco's record of more than three years without a traffic fatality ended when a 70 year old local resident died at 7:15 a. m. Friday as the result of injuries received in an automobile accident at the south edge of town at noon Thursday.

Dead was Ennis Clifford Mosley, Base Line Road, who received multiple injuries when the 1937 model Ford Tudor he was driving was in collision with a 1946 Dodge dump truck driven and owned by Bill Forman who lives on the Romney route out of Cisco.

According to investigating officers, Mr. Mosley was headed east on the Base Line Road and crossing Avenue D when his car collided with the truck driven by Forman. Neither the car nor the truck was overturned by the impact. The car came to a stop about 50 feet east of the intersection and 30 feet from the Rock Service Station. The truck stopped about 75 feet east of the intersection and 50 feet south of the station.

Mr. Forman was thrown from his truck to the pavement and received minor injuries. Mr. Mosley was removed from the wreckage of his car and rushed to the hospital by Thomas ambulance.

Mr. Mosley had lived in Cisco for the past five years, coming here from Jal, New Mexico. He was born on November 17, 1881, in Madison County and was married to Miss Nellie Isbell in Pleasant Grove on June 25, 1905. He was a member of the East Cisco Baptist Church.

Funeral services will be conducted at Thomas Chapel at 11 a. m. Saturday by Rev. W. C. Ivie and the Rev. F. C. Bradley, minister of the East Cisco Baptist Church. Following the services here the body will be taken overland by Thomas Coach to Shiro, Texas, where a second service will be held at 1 p. m. Sunday at the Shiro Baptist Church. Services there will be conducted by the Rev. Paul Stephens, pastor of the Baytown Baptist Church and former pastor of the East Cisco Church.

Survivors are his wife; three sons, Marvin of Turnersville, N. M., F. A. of Jal, N. M., and Ida of Farmington, N. M.; five daughters, Mrs. A. O. Campbell, Mrs. Merl Brown, Mrs. Velma Harmon and Mrs. Ethel Campbell, all of Houston and Mrs. Marie Rocker of Seagraves; 33 grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

### Locations Made For 2 New Tests

The outcome of two West Cisco oil tests is expected to be known this weekend, according to a survey of area drilling operations today. Other tests were in various stages of drilling.

Deepest of the tests was the Johnston and Johnston No. 1 Davis-Edwards, located near the area discovery well at the west edge of the city limits. It was drilling in Caddo lime at 3,400 feet — about 100 feet above the Lake sand level in the nearby producer.

The other test, the L. A. Warren et al No. 2 Mrs. Maurine Royall, was drilling at 3,380 feet. This test is located near the Base Line road on the Royall tract.

One and a half miles southwest of Cisco, the Connally-Jackson No. 1 Walker Estate was still above 3,000 feet. Operations were shut down for a time this week for equipment repairs. It should reach possible pay horizons early next week. Location is in the northeast quarter of Section 87, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

Three-fourths of a mile of town, the Hickok & Reynolds No. 1 Della Wallace was drilling at 2,100 feet. Surface pipe was set Sunday night, and drilling was begun Monday. The well is located in the Lake Bernie area in Section 15, BBB&C Survey, where the company has extensive lease holdings.

Two new locations for the West Cisco Lake Pool area were announced today as the C. A. Spears et al No. 1 May Kleiner et al and the Spears No. 1 W. D. Brechen et al.

Location of the Kleiner well was given as 741 feet from the north and 190 feet west of the southeast corner of Section 86, Block 4, H&TC Survey. The Brechen well was spotted 292 feet west and 118 feet south of the northeast corner of Subdivision 2, City Block 101, Brechen addition to Cisco, in Section 86, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Both tests called for 4,200 feet with rotary equipment.

That's the estimate of heir-hunting expert Theodore Roth of New York City, who thinks that there are as many as one million Americans who have money coming to them but don't know it, reveals People Today in an arresting article in the current issue. The total amount of money is estimated at approximately \$10 billion, ranging from legacies of one cent to a \$4 million dollar fortune.

Roth, who has been tracking lost heirs for 16 years, has already located about 1,000 of them who have received hundreds of thousands of dollars they were not expecting. His fee comes from the lucky heirs and usually ranges from 25 to 50% depending
