AN OPEN LETTER

DEAR VOTER

I take this opportunity to answer a vicious, scandalous and false newspaper article calculated to injure and defame my personal character and integrity. This attack is a last minute attempt to mislead and prejudice the people of Eastland County in order to obtain the office of District Judge by a distortion of the truth.

THE FACTS ARE THESE: The Commissioners Court of Eastland County made a contract with Horace Walker to collect delinquent taxes, which contract was approved by the Attorney General and Comptroller of the State of Texas. I, as an attorney at Law, was employed by Mr. Walker to examine abstracts of title in connection with this contract; I performed those duties. I had no authority whatsoever over the tax monies collected, or the prosecution of tax suits, nor have I done anything in connection with this tax matter, which seems to have been made a political football, which has been in the least dishonorable.

In connection with the cases against Mr. Walker, I will say this: if Mr. Walker is guilty he should be punished to the fullest extent of the law. I have had no part or parcel in these cases, except that I have been subpoenaed as a witness for the State of Texas.

With reference to the property in Limestone County: My opponent evidently is unaware that it is quite customary and usual for real estate men and Attorneys to purchase and handle property for their clients, and this was done by me in several instances. There is absolutely nothing wrong in that.

It strikes me as very strange indeed that inasmuch as investigations have been going on for several years that I have not been attacked until this late hour in a political campaign with the imputation of a wrongful act.

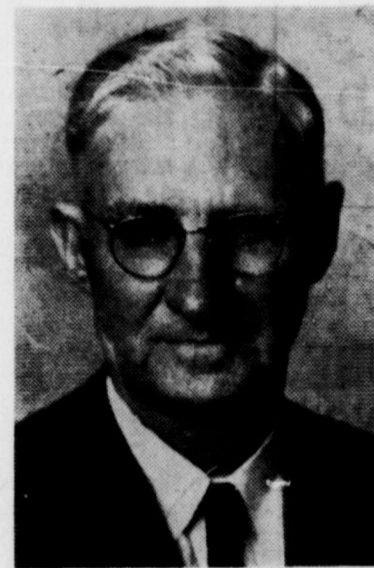

IT BEING IMPOSSIBLE to meet and talk with each voter in this three-county district, I take this method of giving you my views on certain public issues that will come before the 53rd session of the Legislature to convene next January, 1953. In addition to former statements made upon announcing my candidacy which appeared in each newspaper in the district, I wish to make this further statement:

1. There is so much confusion regarding the teachers' certificate law that a new certificate law should be written. I shall favor a law written in such plain language that the teachers and the people as well, can make certain of its meaning.
2. I favor continued support of our Junior College program and adequate salaries for the teaching profession, especially the class room teachers.
3. I shall oppose the movement to abolish the 21-member State Board of Education which is now elected by the people, same to be substituted by an appointive board with main office in Austin.
4. The Federal Government has recently passed legislation adding an extra \$5.00 per person for the needy aged and the Blind and \$3.00 each for Dependent Children. I shall favor necessary legislation to match same with State Funds. Federal Funds will be available October First.
5. The New matter in the election code (House Bill 6) should be amended. The proponents and sponsors of this measure stated that the Bill would purify Texas politics and put the government back in the hands of the people, yet, it has developed that the results of the first election held under this new code, has developed into a State-wide and National scandal.
6. Briefly repeating my former statement: I shall favor the out-right repeal of the "Car Inspection Law." It is an added, unjust burden on the people.
7. I favor the repeal of the "Car Insurance Law," or radically changing its provisions by amendment so as to make it fair and just to all car owners alike.
8. I favor retaining our present Rural Road Program and that our local roads and local road fund be kept under county control.
9. I shall oppose any effort to set aside the "Road Bond Assumption Act," which has meant so much to each county of the District and area.
10. I shall oppose a State Bond Issue for any purpose. I am opposed to any new tax levies or increasing present rates as I am fully convinced that the present levies of around two million dollars daily will more than meet expenses, make necessary improvements for State Agencies, and lay up an emergency balance.

These are My Principles—I shall steadfastly follow same, as is known by my past official record. On this I solicit your vote and help in this campaign.
