George A. Fox, Jr., of Eastland as issued a formal statement in his campaign for election to the office of County Clerk of Eastland County. The statement follows:

"I was born and reared in Eastland County at Olden. In 1940, I mobilized with the Texas National Guard into the Army of the United States. The Company I mobilized with was Co. 'I", 142nd Infantry Regiment,

The right side of my chest was also blown out, plus other wounds. "After staying in various hos-

pitals for about one year, I was discharged and immediately went to work for the government in Austin. After working there for about two years I came back to Eastland County, where my friends persuaded me to run for County Treasurer. I won the office by a large majority. I held the office for two years, but due to my failing health I did not run for re-election. 7,500 Voters Of **County Expected** At Saturday Poll

Some 35 district, county and precinct candidates for public office, plus about 50 aspirants for state offices, will make their final appeals for support among Eastland County's some 7,500 eligible voters during the coming week

The state's Democratic First Primary election will be held at some 25 voting boxes in the county, as well as all counties of the state, next Saturday, July 26. And the contests will be over in a majority of the races, leaving a few to be settled in second primary runoffs in August.

Ciscoans probably will see much of candidates for office during the week as this city's some 2,000 block of votes is the largest of any city or community n the county.

Interest in the coming election was mounting at the week's end. County Clerk Virgil Love reported that a little over 100 persons have cast absentee ballots at his office. Absentee voting for the first primary will end on July 22.

Ciscoans have probably heard more about the congress race than any of the county campaigns. Congressman Omar Burleson of Anson is opposed by State Representative Jack Cox of Breckenridge. The two men are scheduled to appear on the same political rally program for 15-minute talks in Abilene on Thursday night. Both have been very active during the past 10 days.

At the courthouse, Democratic party officials were getting everything ready for next Saturday Ballot boxes were being dusted off. Judges for the various boxes were being lined up, and the elecin machinery generally was be ing set in motion. The ballots have been printed and are ready for the big day. In connection with the cases against Mr. Walker, I will say this: if Mr. Walker is guilty he should be punished to the fullest extent of the law. I have had no part or parcel in these cases, except that I have been subpoenaed as a witness for the State of Texas.

With reference to the property in Limestone County: My opponent evidently is unaware that it is quite customary and usual for real estate men and Attorneys to purchase and handle property for their clients, and this was done by me in several instances. There is absolutely nothing wrong in that.

It strikes me as very strange indeed that inasmuch as investigations have been going on for several years that I have not been attacked until this late hour in a political campaign with the imputation of a wrongful act.





- 6. Briefly repeating my former statement: I shall favor the out-right repeal of the "Car Inspection Law." It is an added, unjust burden on the people.
- 7. I favor the repeal of the "Car Insurance Law," or ra dically changing its provisions by amendment so as to make It fair and just to all car owners alike.
- 8 I favor retaining our present Rural Road Program and that our local roads and local road fund be kept under county control.
- 9. I shall oppose any effort to set aside the "Road Bond A ssumption Act," which has meant so much to each county of the District and area.
- 10. I shall oppose a State Bond Issue for any purpose. I am opposed to any new tax levies or increasing present rates as I am fully convinced that the present levies of around two million dollars daily will more than meet expenses, make necessary improvements for State Agencies, and lay up an emergency balance.

These are My Principles-I shall steadfastly follow same, as is known by my past official record. On this I solicit your vote and help in this campaign.
