



The Friona school board met in regular session Monday, August 16. New board trustee Tracy Bunker was sworn in and seated on the board.

Alan Monroe addressed the board with a request to use the junior high athletic fields for youth football games. Tentative approval was granted with school officials and youth football officials to meet in the near future to work out final details. In other business, the board received certified tax values for 2004. Chief Tax Appraiser Curby Brantley reported 2004 certified taxable values at \$216,607,306.

Donna West, CPA, of Hereford, was given a letter of engagement to provide audit services to complete the annual audit. Adjustments to teacher stipends and salary adjustments were approved. The board approved the annual teacher appraisal calendar and list of certified appraisers.



BACK TO SCHOOL: MAKING COLLEGE WORK

August is back to school time for children across Texas. Chairs are dusted off, books are opened and pencils, pads and backpacks are purchased for the big first day. And while students from 1st to 12th grade are required to check-in on day one, what happens after graduation is up to them. More and more students are making the decision to attend a technical school, college or university. Unfortunately, as the importance of a college degree continues to rise, so does the price of tuition. In fact, the average cost of attending a public college or university in Texas is roughly \$14,732 per year.

Whether you, your child, or grandchild is college-bound, these increasing costs may seem nearly impossible to fathom. I believe every child who wants to work hard to pursue a college education should have the opportunity to do so. Both federal and state governments have taken major steps over the years to open doors for students who want to take their education to the next level.

The entire college process, from applications to financial aid and scholarships, can be overwhelming. A great help in navigating the maze can be admissions advisors, counselors and teachers. And there is financial help, particularly loans, readily available. Last year more than \$3 billion was awarded to students attending college in Texas. Seventy-five to 80 percent was from the federal government and 20-25 percent was from the state, institutions or private sources. Let's take a look at how to find some of these available resources.

Financial Aid

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), is used to decide student eligibility for federal Pell Grants, Stafford Loans, and most state aid. Colleges use the data to compare the eligibility requirements of their assistance programs. Aid comes in many forms, such as grants, scholarships, college work-study programs, or loans. For a FAFSA application and deadline information, visit www.fafsa.com. To contact the Texas Financial Aid Information Center, call 1-888-311-8881.

Scholarships

The best place to start finding scholarships is at the chosen institution. Each school has unique courses of study, and groups of alumni or contributors who have set up scholarships for future students. Most financial aid offices can provide a list of available awards that will help students narrow down the process. Of course, another fantastic resource is the Internet. Over the past decade, Fastweb.com has expanded its database from 180,000 awards to more than 600,000. The total worth of the awards listed: \$1 billion.


Survivors include two sons, both of Amarillo; one sister, rillo.







Look Out For That Zebra!

I started my Friday night football career when I was a school district employee in the 1980's. I would attend the pep rallies on Friday afternoon and be so revved up that attending the football game just came naturally.

Of course, back then I didn't have a son on the field so I would cheer for the kids I had in class every day. I met lots of nice people and learned a little about football. Let me stress "a little".

Gradually working my way up to going to games on Thursday, Friday and occasionally a W.T. game on Saturday. I had become a football junkie and by Tuesday I was either revved up for the next week or totally burned out. But come Thursday I was back and ready to go.

As a mom, I sat in the stands for a while when my sons were younger and played in junior high. They often said when we got home that I made way too much noise, but it never stopped me.

If you know what a run thru is, my friend Verna Patton and I are experts in painting them. We did it because we loved our sons and the ultimate embarrassment for a budding teenager is for his mom to crawl around on the floor or driveway painting something that will be destroyed by his teammates.

I did pick up a few tidbits while sitting in those stands:

If you don't use a receiver, the young man playing that position is a decoy. They do not throw the ball, they pass it. The receiver does not catch the ball and a catcher is not on the field. (That is baseball.) The quarterback does the lead man job and he is basically the main sprocket in a sometimes well oiled machine. The team does kick the ball but they also punt, return, and the only time they kick is when they are going for the point after. When the players are running at full speed and hit someone illegally it is not an oops and cannot be forgiven.


NUMBER ONE RULE: When your kid is down on the field and hurt, you cannot run onto the field to take care of your baby. The coaches, officials and especially your baby frown on it. In fact there are lots of things moms are used to doing that are frowned upon.

Last year I went from sitting in the stands to standing on the sidelines and taking pictures for the paper. It is a totally different world than in the stands:

Parents are loud and in some cases yell at the wrong times. The boys are very considerate when a female is among them, but they do slip occasionally. They found out that it doesn't phase

Throughout the season most cotton discussions have been shaped by the fact that 2004 was shaping up to be a record year for cotton around the globe.

Thursday's August Crop Production report from the National Agricultural Statistics Service did nothing to dispel that sentiment.

Projecting a strong U.S. Upland cotton crop of 19.48 million bales, the NASS report was perhaps a little above the general range of expectations for the first measure of the 2004 crop. On the other hand the reaction by the market and among industry observers, certainly showed that the number is not out of the realm of possibility.

Texas numbers released by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service illustrate clearly the excellent shape the crop was in during the late July survey period. Overall Texas is forecast to produce a record 6.3 million Upland cotton bales from 5.5 million harvested acres and set a new yield record of 550 pounds per harvested acre.

Closer to home, the estimated production for the High Plains Contact your local TDA office, or region was set at a record 3.89 million bales for crop reporting districts 1-N and 1-S. Projected yields for 1-N and 1-S were 742

> To some these numbers seem a little high when considering the wide range of maturity that comprises the 2004 crop. With cotton ranging from the very early to the very late, the calendar and the September/October temperature pattern become the primary factors driving what may or may not happen.

> In order to capture the tremendous yield potential that exists in this area another warm, open Fall is the must have ingredient. As is so often the case, whether or not the High Plains crop breaks records or hearts in 2004 will depend on the weather pattern that dominates over the next 6-8 weeks.

> Warm temperatures and clear, sunny days are the key to breaking fecords in 2004. Anything less could begin to slowly

Looking at the LTA, crops in this region are either running slightly ahead of schedule for acreage planted May 1 or slightly behind if they were planted by May 15. Amarillo area growers should normally expect to receive only about 680 more heat units through October 31. That number has certainly not been the norm the past few seasons, especially in the Amarillo area.

Most everyone agrees that the crop projected by Texas and Advance Foods, a value-added Agricultural Statistics Service is probably in the field today. What they also need to acknowledge is that regardless of everything that has gone into getting the crop to this point, the final outcome could still leave many shaking their heads and wondering - "What If?"

THINK ABOUT THIS **Lessons Jesus Learned at Home**



The main problem wasn't the aliens or the predators. The few instances when the beasts actually went head to head were interrupted by uninteresting, and often annoying human characters.





Common Costly Misconceptions About Carpet Cleaning Part 2 of a series

#3: One method of carpet cleaning is as good as another.

No. The dry cleaning methods - which are dry foam, dry chem and dry compound do not rinse your carpet in any way. Instead they leave a residue. You might say they clean your carpet only half way. The most effective cleaning method is hot water extraction.

Hot water extraction means a hot water cleaning solution, under high pressure, is forced into your carpet and then extracted out of your carpet. Shaw industries, the world's largest carpet manufacturer, recommends hot water extraction as the primary method of cleaning carpets.
