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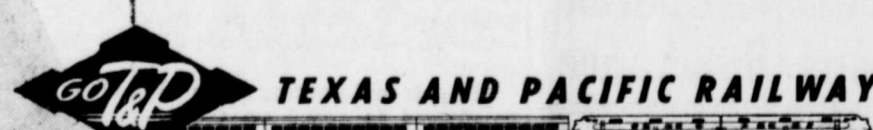

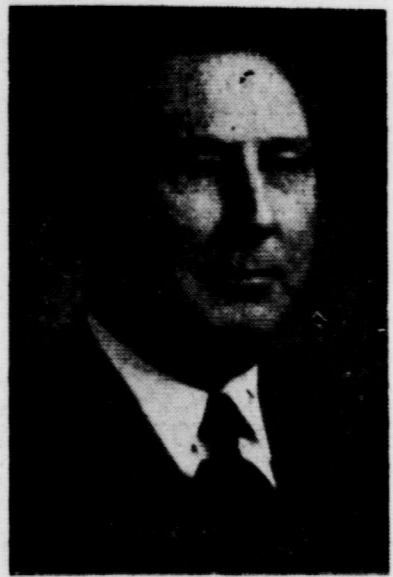

Nerve and bone specialists have worked together to add to the knowledge of the often dramatic relief which treatment of ruptured intervertebral disk can bring. These tiny "bearings" of the spinal column, pushing against nerve roots, can create symptoms which may be mistaken for anything from heart trouble to chronic rheumatism.

While the discovery of the actual cause of the symptoms is fairly recent, the treatment for the back pains which ruptured disks may cause often follows the oldtime routine before the cause was known. Bed rest and aspirin is nearly always the first

method of treatment for a ruptured disk.

Since the pressure of the spinal column in the upright position leads to more pressure on the point at which the bearing has slipped out of pocket, lying down and taking the pressure off the spine often relieves the pain, aided by aspirin. Sometimes two or three weeks of bed rest will give the spine enough rest so that when the upright position is again assumed, the disk will return to its normal position.

Gentle massage, exercises and sometimes braces, in addition to bed rest and aspirin form other old-time methods of treating these back injuries, methods which often suffice.

Traction is one of the newer methods, used when the more common methods fail to help or when the pain is severe enough to require more immediate relief. Traction, usually done in

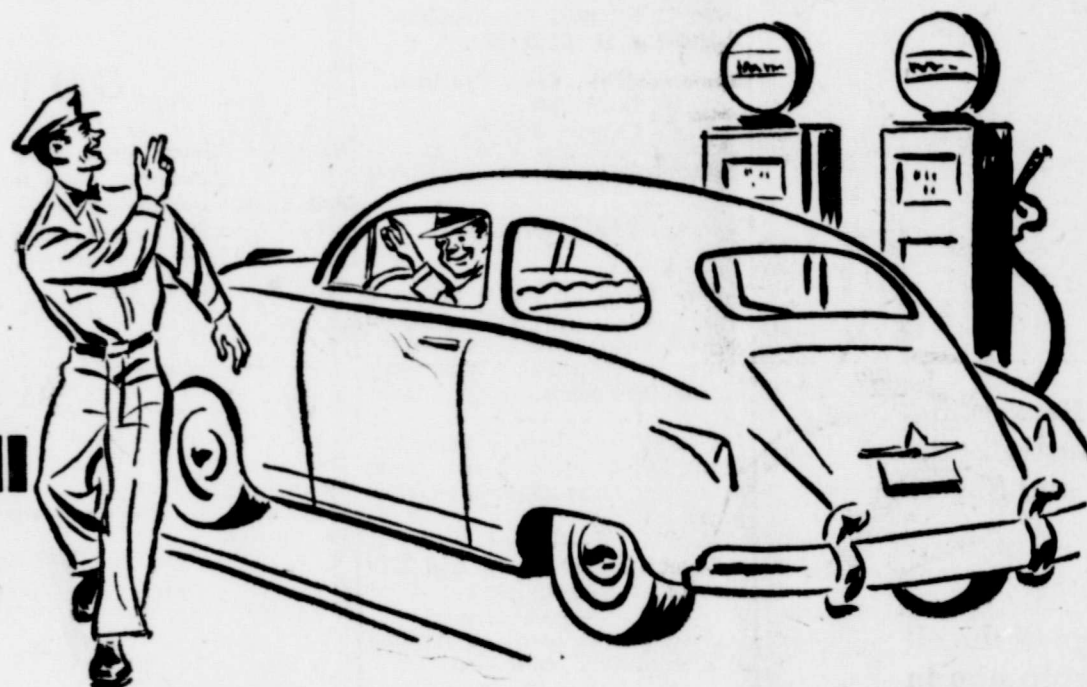

Wyoming Invites Texans To Hunt Antelope There

AUSTIN, July 25. — Wyoming needs outside help to reduce an over-population of prong-horned antelope, reports Lester Bagley, Wyoming Game and Fish Commissioner, in a letter to the Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

Bagley writes that Wyoming is faced with the problem of reducing its antelope herd by approximately 40,000 head, and adds: "We are soliciting your cooperation in sending as many of our (Texas) hunters as you can to hunt antelope in Wyoming."

The Wyoming request coincided with the Texas Game and Fish Commission's decision to close the season on Texas antelope this year because of severe herd losses from drought.

The Wyoming season varies in different areas. The earliest opening is September 3; latest closing date is October 14. The

season limit is one antelope in all except the Northeastern Area where two may be taken with two permits. Out-of-state permits cost \$25 each. Further information may be secured by writing the Wyoming Game and Fish Commission, Box 335, Cheyenne, Wyoming.

If the letter is to serve as an application for a permit, the \$25 fee should be enclosed. The applicant also should give his age, physical description and designate the area in which he wishes to hunt. Permits are issued only for one of the 16 specified areas.

Season dates in most areas are either September 3-15, Sept. 15-22, or September 3 to October 3. However, the season in the big Northeastern Area, where permits for two antelopes may be secured, is from September 20 to October 14.

Deer also may be taken in the Northeastern Area where the seasons partially overlap. Deer permits are \$20 each.

ONE VOTE IS IMPORTANT

"Our forefathers fought for the right to vote — but do we care much for that right today?" wrote Hugh Foster, Chairman, Civic Committee, Lancaster, Pennsylvania. "Apparently we don't!"

Mr. Foster then cited some facts which should make America ashamed of itself. In a recent election, 99 per cent of Belgium's eligible voters went to the polls. Almost as many eligible Italian voters cast ballots in the election that rebuffed Communism, and 82 per cent voted in the last British election. Other nations have comparable records. But only 51 per cent of eligible Americans voted in the Presidential election of 1948.

It's an easy alibi to say that just one vote doesn't matter, so why take the trouble to visit the polls. The fact is that one vote can be overwhelmingly important. Mr. Foster described cases where a very small number of votes made history. As an example, in 1884 James Blaine lost New York State by much less than one vote per precinct. Had he carried New York he would have defeated Cleveland and become President.

Older Workers Active In Labor Force Of Nation

Participation of older workers in the labor force is much more frequent than is popularly believed, the statisticians of a life insurance company said today, on the basis of unpublished data made available by the Bureau of the Census.

In the 65-69 age group, 56 per cent of all men are still working, and another 3 percent are looking for work. Even at ages 70-74 about 40 percent are still gainfully employed, and not until

past 75 does the proportion drop below 20 percent.

The proportion of men employed in old age varies according to occupation. Nonagricultural workers begin dropping out of the labor market in appreciable numbers not long after age 60, while the proportion engaged

in agriculture does not lessen until age 65. The self-employed also tend to stay active to later ages, and in jobs requiring experience and craftsmanship the proportion of older men remains high.

On the other hand, older men rapidly drop out of hazardous occupations and those requiring strenuous physical exertion, but many find employment in lighter work, either on a full-time or part-time basis.
