Pipe Shortages Halt Extension Of Lone Star Lines

Pipe shortages directly attributable to the recent steel strike have forced Lone Star Gas Company to delay laying more than 130 miles of major transmission and gathering lines especially designed to meet increased customer demands anticipated this winter.

This condition was reported Saturday by Lone Star President D. A. Hulcy of Dallas, who said that the two pipe line construction projects represented in the 130 miles had been set for completion in September and October. He added that numerous other transmission and transmission and distribution lines replacement and extension projects throughout the company's operating area also have been set back.

Meanwhile, a Lone Star representative is to confer in Washington with PAD officials to determine the possibility of revising pipe line delivery schedules in view of the steel strike settlement.

Mr. Hulcy pointed out that Lone Star is equipped with the greatest gas supply and reserves in its 43-year history.

"But," the Lone Star executive said, "we cannot enlarge our gas delivery facilities to meet increasing customer demands if we are unable to procure steel pipe."

Sharpe Sent To Leader's School

CAMP CHAFFEE, Ark., July 26. — After completing sixteen weeks basic training with the 5th Armored Division, Pvt. Stanley D. Sharpe of 813 W. 5th St., Cisco, has been selected to attend the Leaders Course here.

Under the watchful eye of combat experienced instructors, he will receive leadership instruction and learn the poise required of a combat leader.

In one phase of the course, students remain in the field 24 hours, with limited food and water, each leading his men through a series of simulated combat problems.

Private Sharpe will also spend three weeks applying his acquired knowledge serving as an instructor in a training company here.

He attended high school in Cisco and North Texas State college in Denton, before entering the service.

Private Sharpe is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd S. Sharpe of Cisco.

Shivers Appears Victor Saturday

Governor Allan Shivers apparently was re-elected Saturday without a runoff as returns at midnight from 168 of the 254 counties, including 20 complete, gave him some 60 per cent of the total vote. This figure was 259,290 for Shivers as compared with 135,104 for Ralph Yarborough and 10,105 for Mrs. Allene Traylor.

Ben Ramsey received 308,000 to 65,000 for his opponent in the race for lieutenant governor. In the U. S. Senate race, Price Daniel had a commanding lead, with 291,000 to 92,000 for Lindley Beekworth and 24,000 for E. W. Napier.

Majorities appeared certain for Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, for Land Commissioner Bascom Giles, Railroad Commissioner Olin Culbertson, and John Ben Shepperd, running for attorney general.

Martin Dies, a former congressman, had 51 per cent of the total vote counted at midnight.

Grid Coach Named At Cross Plains

Hubert L. Keumpel of Pflugerville has been elected coach of football in Cross Plains Junior High School and the ward school, it was announced by Superintendent Paul L. Whitton.

Mr. Whitton also announced that James Alexander, Cross Plains High School principal, had been named assistant high school coach.

It marks the first time in the history of the school that there will be three coaches handling the teams.

Mr. Keumpel will also teach in addition to his coaching duties. He is a recent graduate of the University of Texas and was an outstanding athlete in both high school and college.

Grand Jury To Meet Again Next Thursday

An Eastland County grand jury which returned eight indictments after deliberations last week, will reconvene on Thursday, July 31, to complete its summer work, according to reports at the courthouse Saturday.

A list of the indictments was not released. Identity of those indicted is usually kept secret until arrests are made.

BURLESON AND COX RUNNING IN CLOSE RACE FOR CONGRESS POST

Congressman Omar Burleson and State Representative Jack Cox were running a close race for the 17th District Congress seat as poll counting closed in most of the 12 counties of the district at 2 a. m. Sunday. At that time, Cox had a slight lead. The count was: Cox 28,858; Burleson 28,537.

Six of the 12 counties were complete. Returns were incomplete for Comanche, Shackelford, Taylor, Jones, Fisher and Eastland Counties. It was understood that some 3,000 votes remained to be counted in Taylor County.

Burkett Leads In State Rep. Race; Over 7,000 Vote

More than 7,190 Eastland County voters went to the polls Saturday and cast ballots in the First Primary Election. In Cisco, a total of 1,653 ballots were cast.

Turner M. Collie appeared to be the nominee for district judge and County Judge John Hart held a substantial lead for re-election with only one box out at 3 a. m. The lone box was the Eastland No. 1 box with 928 votes cast, and the outcome of these votes were awaited in some races. The box workers still needed to count 300 votes at 3:30 a. m. to complete the job, and they called it a night. They expected to return at 8 a. m. Sunday.

Collie had 3,566 votes to 2,355 for Earl Conner, Jr. Judge Hart received 3,559 votes to 2,449 for C. S. Eldridge.

The Eastland box could possibly cause a runoff in the sheriff's race. Sheriff J. F. Tucker had 2,966 votes as compared with 2,089 for W. W. Tackett and 675 for W. E. Solomon. The sheriff had a bare majority and observers said the Eastland box could force a runoff in this race.

A runoff was apparent in the county clerk's race. George A. Fox, Jr., was leading the ticket on the incomplete return with 2,702 votes. Next was Johnson Smith with 2,214 votes, followed by A. J. Blevins, Sr., with 1,034.

District Clerk Roy L. Lane won a majority over two opponents. The returns showed Lane 3,886, John C. Nicholas 1,199 and L. T. Everton 878.

A runoff appeared certain in the race for State Representative of the 76th District, but the opponents probably will be determined by the Eastland box that was still out. Omar Burkett of Cisco led the county ticket with 2,618 votes. Next was L. R. Pearson of Ranger with 2,140 votes. John Wood of Albany had 907 votes, and C. H. Dawson had 331.

Burkett's total incomplete vote in the three counties was 3,849; Pearson, 2,599; Wood, 2,872; and Dawson, 1,111. Pearson was expected to pickup enough votes at Eastland to go into the runoff with Burkett.

The Eastland box might also have bearing on a runoff for the post of county treasurer. The incomplete report showed Richard C. Cox 2,003, E. C. Fisher 1,813, Hoover Pittman 1,125 and Hugh H. Hardeman 968.

In addition to the Eastland box, the above returns did not include 262 absentee ballots. The Press will carry a box score for each voting place in the Tuesday edition.

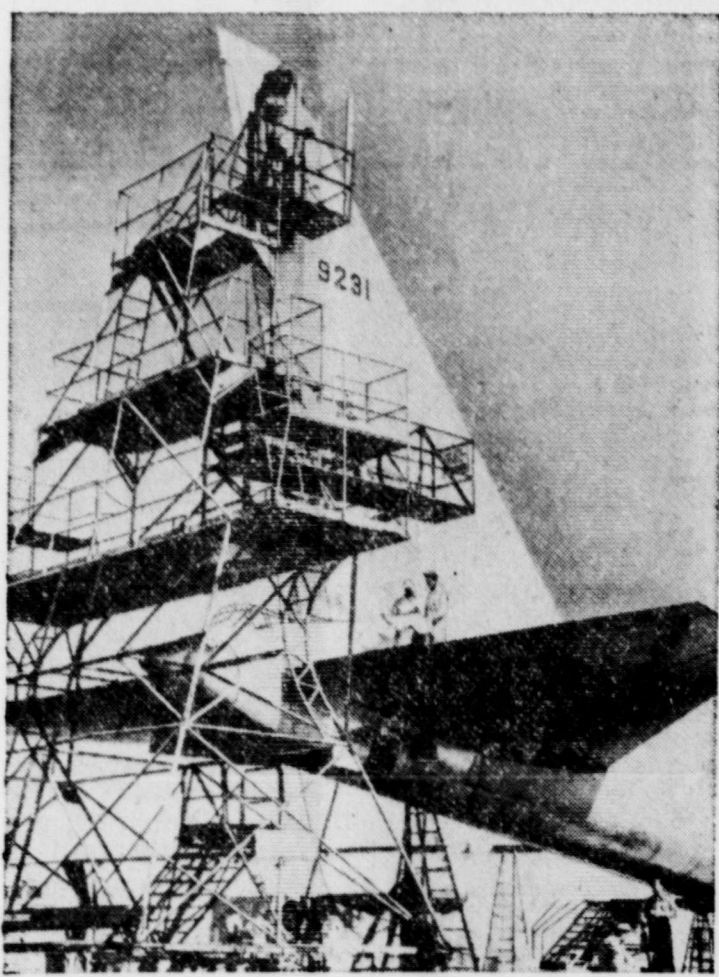

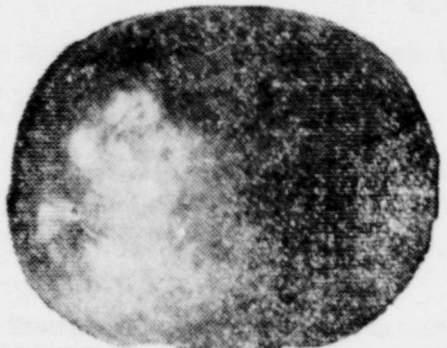
