Changes Planned In THDA District Setup At Meeting

KINGSVILLE, August 15.—A major item on the agenda of the Texas Home Demonstration Association's convention in Kingsville this month will be reduction of the organization's 14 districts in the state to 12.

Mrs. G. W. Ferguson of Temple, information director and editor of the THDA official organ, "The Messenger," said today the change in administrative districts is being made to conform to the new districts set up by the Extension Service of Texas A. and M. College at Bryan.

Cuts in appropriations for the extension service which through its county agents co-operates closely with the HD club program have made the curtailment of field service necessary, Mrs. Ferguson explained.

The convention will open formally at Jones auditorium at A. and I. College at 8 o'clock Tuesday morning, August 26, and will last through Thursday noon, August 28.

Last week, Mrs. R. M. Almanrode of Munday, THDA president, announced that a feature of the convention will be a mass chest x-ray to be conducted by the Texas Tuberculosis Association as a part of its TB control program.

Approximately 1000 delegates representing 43,000 HD club members throughout Texas are expected for the annual meeting, Mrs. Almanrode said.

Rooms will be provided for the delegates in college dormitories and meals in the cafeteria, the THDA president announced.

Oil Test Spotted In Carbon Area

A wildcat oil test for the Cisco area will be the Woodson Oil Company No. 1 Riley Van Hill, two miles southwest of Carbon, according to an announcement today.

The 3,750 foot project will be drilled 330 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west lines of the southwest quarter of Section 37, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

Appliance Service Supervisor Named By Gas Company

Appointment of Robert W. McKinney as West Texas division appliance service supervisor for the Lone Star Gas Company has been announced by R. H. Gray of Abilene, division superintendent.

Mr. McKinney will be in charge of employee training on installing and servicing all types of gas burning equipment, Mr. Gray said, working with Lone Star personnel in the more than 90 towns comprising the company's West Texas distribution territory. He will have headquarters in Abilene.

Mr. McKinney joined Lone Star in 1949 as an industrial engineer at Abilene after receiving a degree in mechanical engineering from Texas Technological College. Early in 1951 he was transferred to Wichita Falls in similar capacity and remained there until his division service supervisor assignment which became effective August 1. During World War II he served 5½ years with the Army Air Force and was discharged in December, 1945 with a captain's commission.

A native of Sioux City, Iowa, Mr. McKinney is married to the former Miss Mary Lillian Harville of Baird. The McKinney children are Barbara Ann, age seven, and Sylvia Kay, age five years. He is a member of the Episcopal Church.

Evangelist Talks At Rotary Club's Luncheon Meeting

"Strengthening Our Spiritual Lives" was the theme of the talk by the Rev. Dick Crews before members of the Cisco Rotary Club at their regular meeting at the Hotel Victor Thursday.

Rotarian John W. Speir was in charge of the program and called on the Rev. Sidney Spain, pastor of the First Christian Church, to introduce the speaker, who is conducting a meeting at the church. Rev. Crews is a former pastor for the local church.

Rev. Crews pointed out three ways to strengthen spiritual life. First, he said, "We should build a chapel in our souls. We should build a chapel within us where we can commune with God through prayer."

"Second," he said, "we should build an altar in our homes. We should return to old family altar where we gather at least one time a day for Bible reading and family prayer."

The third way to strengthen spiritual lives, he said, was to build a church around the world, "where everyone can have the opportunity of hearing and serving God."

SCAT RUSSELL RESIGNS AS CJC GRID COACH FOR HEREFORD JOB

Cisco Junior College was looking for a new football coach today after L. B. (Scat) Russell, head coach for the past two years, announced his resignation to accept a position as head football coach at Hereford high school, in the Texas Panhandle.

With the opening of the football practice season only two weeks away, Cisco Junior College will have little shopping time for a new coach. It was understood that several candidates had applied for or expressed interest in the post today, including one junior college coach.

For Coach Russell the Hereford position will be a homecoming. He lettered in football, basketball and baseball for four years

at Hereford High School before going to Paris Junior College and to Hardin-Simmons University. Russell made an outstanding high school coaching record at Baird High School before accepting the Cisco Junior College post two years ago. He had been elected as head coach at the college for another year.

In Cisco today, Russell said the Hereford post was offered him on short notice. He has been living in Baird, his wife's home town, and working on a master's degree at Hardin-Simmons University this summer. He attended a coaching school in Fort Worth last week.

A veteran of World War II, Russell spent five years with the Army's 7th infantry regiment. He entered as a private and was discharged as a captain.

"I am leaving a good town with a lot of good people," Russell said. "We appreciate the fine reception accorded us in Cisco and it is with considerable regrets that we leave." The Russells plan to move to Hereford next week to be ready for the opening of football practice on September 1.

Today's Parade Will Open Show

Everything was in readiness today for the first annual Cisco Roundup, a working horse rodeo, at the Moran Highway arena Friday and Saturday nights, and large crowds of visitors are expected for the two performances.

A parade in the downtown area at 6 p. m. today will formally open the Roundup. The night performances are scheduled to begin at 8 p. m. Tickets, selling for 90 and 30 cents, are on sale at the Chamber of Commerce offices as well as at the arena grounds.

Horsemen and contestants began arriving at noon today and by parade time one of the most colorful groups of horses ever seen in this city was expected. Riding clubs from throughout the area, including several noted groups, will be on hand. Some 200 horsemen and horsewomen are expected to ride in the parade and grand entry.

The Cisco Roundup Club, sponsors of the working horse show which they plan to hold as an annual event, was ready for the opening performance. Substantial improvements have been made at the arena. Arrangements were ready to accommodate large crowds without inconvenience at the gates or parking areas.

The show program will feature most of the states top cutting horses, many outstanding calf ropers, girl barrel racers, and other events. The program will be long and the competition will be keen due to the large number of contestants.

Twenty-five horse trailers were to bring some 40 horses here from Abilene. The Abilene Range Riders, a noted and colorful outfit, will present their famous square dance drill on horseback. The horses will be kept at the Pressler Ranch near Cisco Friday night to be here for Saturday night's final performance.

Gay Copeland of Sonora, president of the National Cutting Horse Association, planned to be here both days. He telephoned early Friday for hotel reservations. The NCHA has given the Cisco show its official sanction, which means that points scored in the cutting horse events here will count toward the world championship.

Roundup club officials have made arrangements for the arena area to be sprayed for mosquitoes and watered to prevent dust. Thomas Funeral Home has erected a tent for the rodeo secretary's office. Trophies, including two fine saddles and silver belt buckles, will be on display at the tent during the two days.

Club officers said that "we have arranged for a good show, and we sincerely hope that large crowds take the opportunity to see some of the state's top horses and performers."

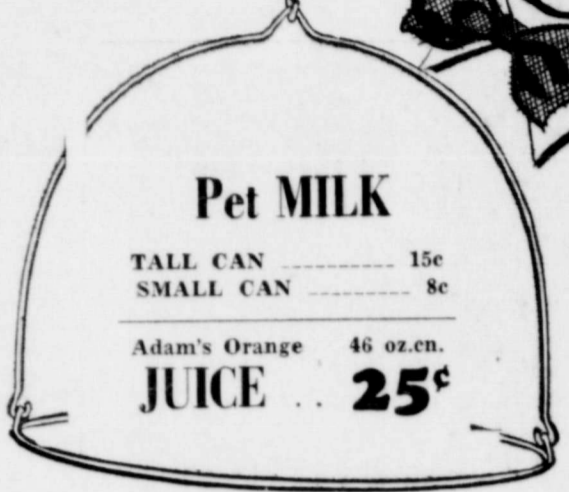

When the real estate sales contract provides that the seller is to furnish to the buyer an Abstract of Title, then it is up to the latter to employ an attorney who will examine the abstract.

In addition, the attorney usually advises on important matters not revealed by an abstract. He will ascertain whether any delinquent taxes exist against the property. He will check on the possibility of some third party being in possession, claiming the property as his own.

If the contract of sale provides that the seller is to furnish the buyer a Title Insurance Policy, then the latter should employ an attorney to examine the policy offered and advise him on other details in closing the transaction.

A title insurance policy is similar in principle to a fire insurance policy. Just as you insure against damage caused by fire, so you can insure yourself against damage caused by failure of title.

Insurance companies, in order to stay in business, cannot afford to accept too great a risk in proportion to the premium charged.

Duck Hunters Due Longer Hunting Season This Week

AUSTIN, August 15.—The Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission has returned from conferences in Washington with word that a more liberal waterfowl season is in prospect for Texas.

He said that the details will not be available until the United States Fish and Wildlife Service assembles data and makes the formal announcement.

The Executive Secretary expressed pessimism over the likelihood of having Texas zoned for waterfowl, but he foresaw compensation allowances.

The Game and Fish Commission, in making its annual recommendations, asked that Texas be zoned for waterfowl and that if zoning were not allowed, that a state-wide season open on October 31. The theory then was that a season longer than the 50-day 1951 shoot was in prospect.

The Executive Secretary said he obtained the impression in Washington that any liberalizing in the waterfowl regulations would be in a longer season. He said this could be the outgrowth of increasing influence which the Council of Flyways has been conceded by the Fish and Wildlife Service.

The Executive Secretary, who represented the Central Flyway at the Council meeting, said the Council petitioned the Washington authorities to assign a Federal coordinator to each flyway to work with the states' game administrators and technicians.

This would be a key part of an entirely new approach to the regulatory problems within the Flyways. It would provide greater sensitivity to the needs of the waterfowl, to the problems of agricultural interests along the Flyways and in the winter feeding areas, and to the rights of the hunter.

"We are heartened by the reception our plan received," he said. "We are confident that a large states' part in the waterfowl decisions will provide for better conservation and for a more equitable harvesting of the annual crop of waterfowl."

The Executive Secretary predicted that Texas hunters generally will be satisfied with the 1952 regulations, contents of which he is not yet privileged to reveal. He said he was assured by Federal authorities and by representatives of the northern waterfowl breeding states that the waterfowl will be available in substantial numbers this fall.

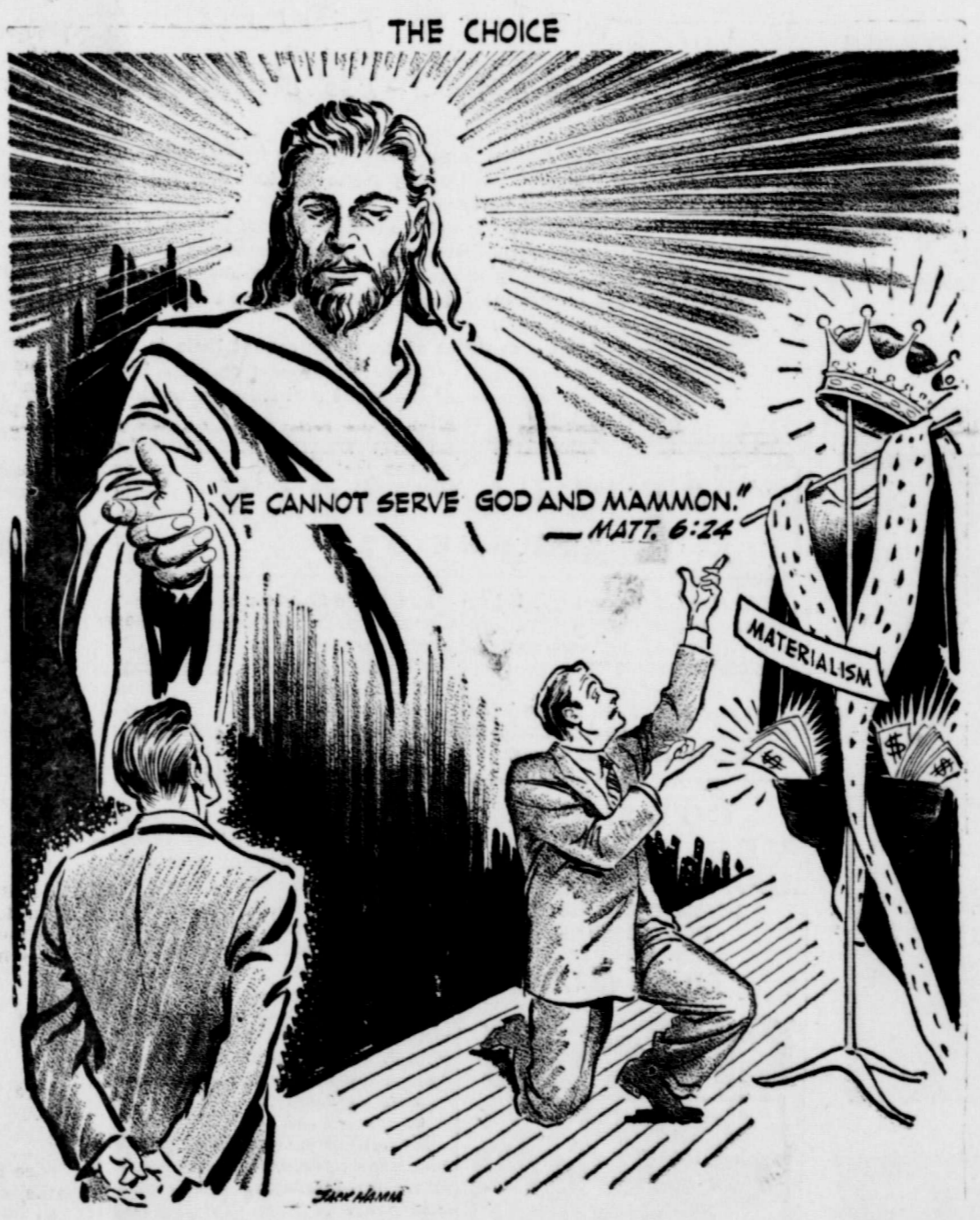
