MAYOR URGES CONSERVATION OF WATER; NEW PUMP IN SERVICE

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported today that the new pumping setup at Lake Cisco was being placed into service as a means of improving the city water's taste. The new pumps were being hooked up to increase the water flow into the filtration plant. Mr. Rosenthal again called on citizens of the city to conserve water. "Although we have water in the lake, we don't know how long the drought will last," he said. "Our lake's water level is at an all-time low mark, and we must take every means of conserving our supply." Mr. Rosenthal pointed out that the city has not ordered a rationing program but has insisted that all citizens cooperate in a voluntary conservation program. He suggested that those who use evaporative air-conditioners without circulating pumps equip their conditioners with the little pumps to help conserve water. "Water is a valuable commodity in this part of the country," Mr. Rosenthal said. "Let's do everything we can to conserve our supply." Area stockmen and others are hauling water from Lake Birnie, which is not used by the city for drinking purposes.

Lewis Appointed To Vacant Post

Leslie (Red) Lewis, head coach at Decatur Baptist College, was elected at a special meeting of the school board Tuesday to fill the head coaching position at Cisco Junior College, created last week by the resignation of Scat Russell who accepted the position of coach of the Hereford High School teams.

Coach Lewis and his wife and daughter will move to Cisco next week after five years in Decatur where he was football, basketball and track coach.

Lewis is a graduate of Decatur Baptist College, Hardin-Simmons University and has done graduate work at North Texas. He played center and guard during his high school years and while at Decatur and Hardin-Simmons.

During World War II, Lewis served five years with the Air Force. He was discharged as a major and holds a major's rank in the Air Force Reserve.

Lewis will serve as head coach, in football, basketball, baseball and track at Cisco Junior College. Present plans call for the using of Paul Mosley as assistant coach. Mosley, a graduate of Cisco High School, Cisco Junior College and McMurry College, was a back and will aid in the coaching of backfield men and the kickers.

College President O. L. Stamey expressed regret at losing the services of Coach Russell but said that the school felt fortunate in securing the services of Coach Lewis.

Russell left the school after two years as coach to accept the coaching assignment in his home town. He graduated from Hereford High School and was a four year letterman in football and basketball. Coach and Mrs. Russell and three children left this week for their new home.

In other business at the Monday meeting the board authorized the beginning of the annual audit of the books as of the close of business on August 31 and awarded the auditing contract to the A. M. Higgs Accounting Service of Dallas.

Former Minister Here Is Buried

Funeral services were held Monday morning in Comanche for the Rev. Arthur Johnson, former pastor of the First Baptist Church in Cisco and pastor of the Comanche church at the time of his death. Rev. Johnson died Saturday afternoon of a heart attack attributed to over exertion and excessive heat. The Rev. Johnson, who was 51 years of age, had gone fishing with a friend. When their car became stuck in the mud, Rev. Johnson helped push it out. The heart attack followed.

In Comanche five years, Rev. Johnson formerly was public relations director at Howard Payne College, Brownwood. Previously he held pastorates in Cisco and Dublin. He recently was a speaker for home-coming services at the local church.

A HORSE RACE LOOMS

Political strategists of both parties have blandly announced that it's all over but the counting of the votes—that their presidential candidates are dead mortal cinches. That is the traditional attitude of the professionals at this stage of the game and no one with any knowledge of American politics believes for a moment in its sincerity. For, as Senator Lodge, a top Eisenhower man, has frankly said, the Eisenhower-Stevenson contest is strictly a horse race. Both parties will conduct what is known as "scared campaigns" — that is, campaigns in which they know the issue is very much in doubt, and it is necessary to painstakingly seek every possible vote.

It was inevitable that the first task undertaken by each candidate was to attempt to heal the deep party schisms that were created at Chicago. General Eisenhower has consulted at length with leading Taft backers, and seems to have won their willing support. Governor Stevenson has done the same thing with the embittered supporters of Kefauver, Russell and Harriman. The top men know that, in both cases, a very high degree of party unity is the number 1 requirement.

It is universally believed that the two candidates will personally conduct high-level and very dignified campaigns, as political

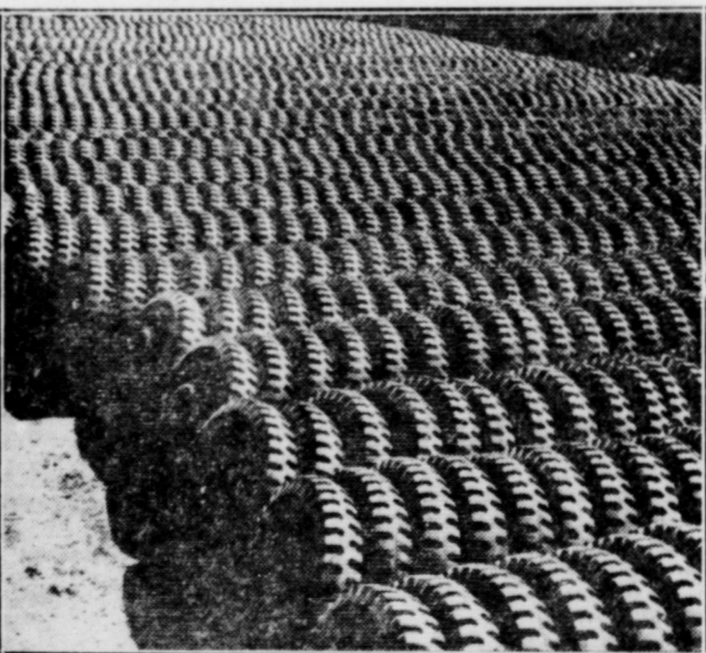

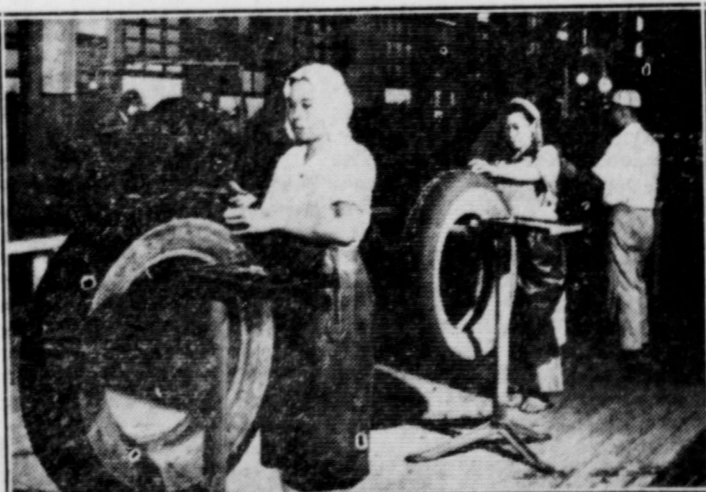

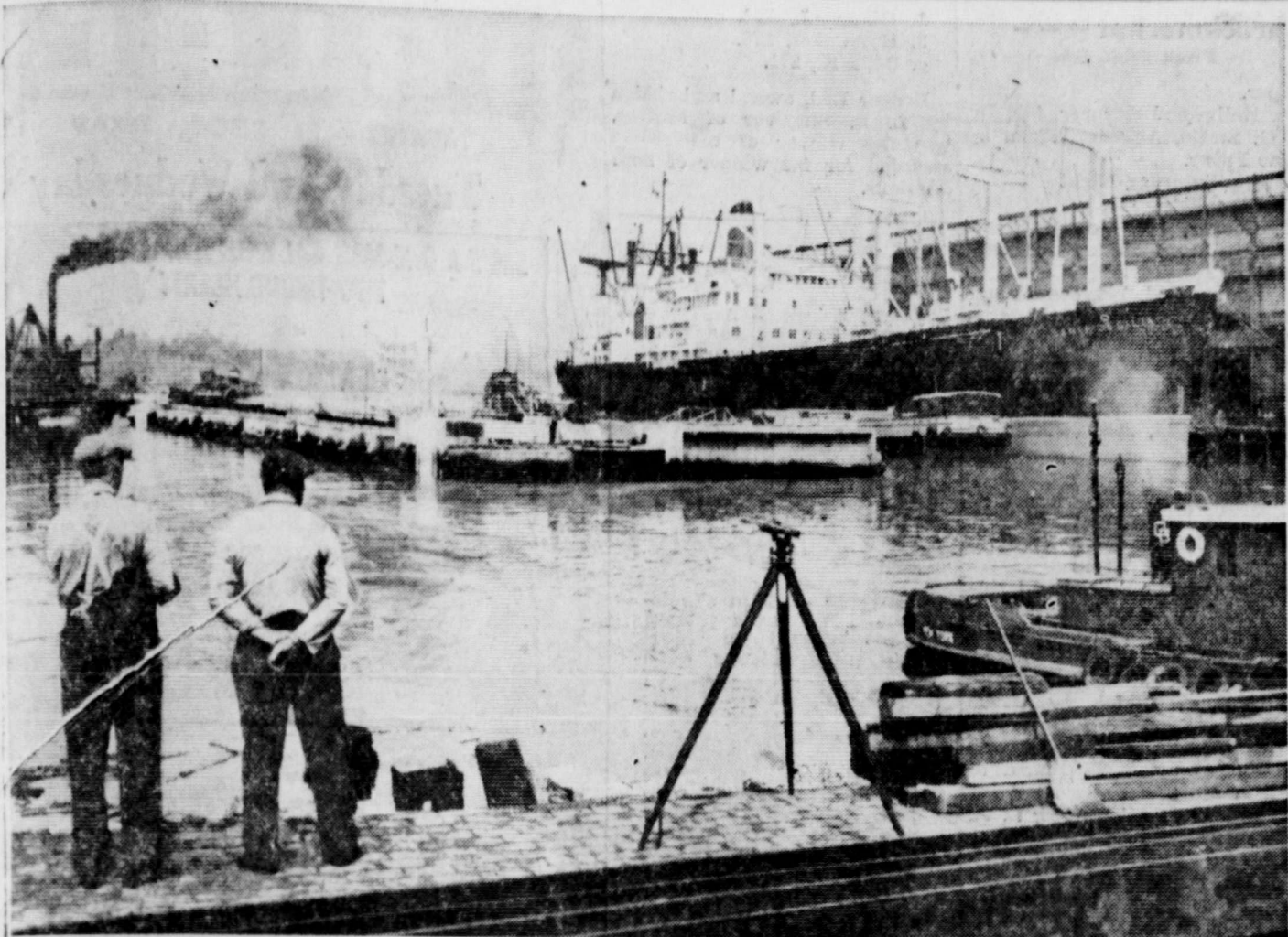

HEALTH TALKS

Even if your vacation is over in August, summer weather drags on and calls for taking life easy. Picnics are fine to get out of a hot house and pick up finicky appetites. There's such a thing, however, as the right place for an outing.

By choosing a site which has been cleared of weeds and undergrowth, such as a park, picnickers are sure to miss such plants as poison ivy, poison oak, and sumac which lead to dermatitis venenata; this two-bit word simply means a redness and swelling of the skin, possibly with pain and heat, caused by its sensitivity to something which touches it. One doctor has listed fifty-five weeds which he considers important in producing "contact dermatitis." Protection against poison ivy by injection of extracts before the season starts or taking them by mouth each year is only 50 per cent effective.

Cosmetics are another possible source of irritation in dermatitis venenata. Still others are sun-tan oils and lotions to which certain persons might be sensitive.

Household agents, like soaps or antiseptics, can be trouble makers. The young housewife who has to treat little Johnny's banged-up knee or bathe him more often during summer may notice on herself a type of skin condition called "vesicular eruption of the hands"; this means blister-like sores on the hands and can be disabling.

Sensitivity to oil and grease, sometimes seen among filling station attendants and others working with oil products, is a job hazard. The clothing becomes soaked with the material which causes the trouble, and the additional fact that the air is cut off doesn't help at all. Bathing and changing clothes twice daily or as often as possible usually is advised. In certain instances it is necessary to change jobs to avoid the specific irritant.

Getting to the bottom of a skin condition in which a person is supersensitive to an unknown substance is not always easy. Often it is necessary for a dermatologist, a doctor skilled in the diagnosis and treatment of skin diseases, to find out what's causing the trouble.

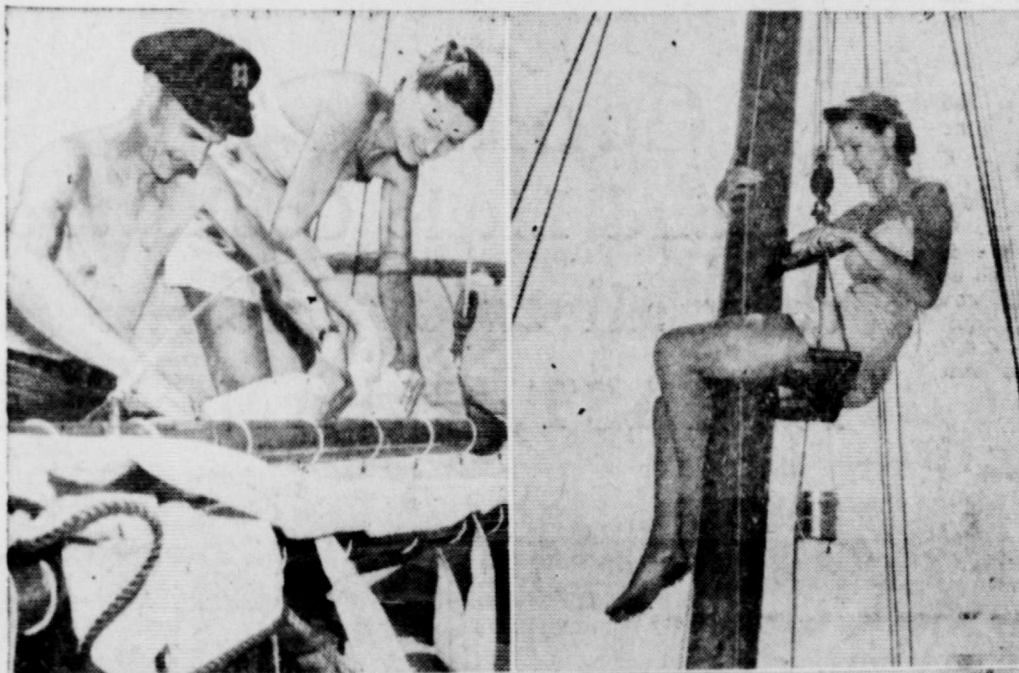
