J. E. (Ed) McCanlies won the nomination for Commissioner of Precinct Four in Saturday's Second Primary election, unseating Incumbent Arch Bint by a vote of 786 to 625 in complete unofficial returns from all boxes in the precinct.

A total of 1,326 Ciscoans went to the polls to chalk up a near record second primary vote total. This was compared with 1,653 votes cast here in the first primary. The first primary vote in the commissioner's race was: Bint 675, McCanlies 590 and Robert Tucker 449.




