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

WEEKEND OF FOOTBALL BEGINS WITH 'B' TEAM GAME TONIGHT

Cisco athletic teams will open their weekend of football at Chesley Field at 7:30 p. m. Thursday (tonight) when the Lobo "B' team meets the Dublin High "B" eleven. Friday night, the Cisco High Loboes entertain the Brady High Bulldogs at the local field, and on Saturday night the Cisco Junior College Wranglers go to Stephenville to meet Tarleton State College.

Some 25 members of the "B' team are expected to see action in tonight's game. The starting Lobo eleven will look something like last year's Midget team with nine former Junior High players on the team scheduled to start. The Loboes will start a backfield composed of Tommy Reynolds, John Carlisle, Buck Whitehead and Bobby Bennie. Reynolds will call signals. The forward wall will be composed of Ronny Qualls, center; Joe Wayne Farrow and Leonard Simmons guards; Kenneth Penn and Edward Bernie, tackles; and, Bill Miller and Biddy Echols, ends. Coaches Jack Everett and Jay Williams took their Loboes to a high school classroom Wednesday afternoon when a rain storm struck shortly after practice started. The afternoon was devoted to black board study of plays and a general discussion of football.

The Wranglers of Cisco Junior College also moved inside from the practice field after the rain came. They went to the community gym for a "skull" practice and a discussion of their plans for the game with Tarleton State

Strikes Children

West Lake Field **Gets New Project**

Two new wildcat oil tests were announced today for the Cisco area as a renewal of activities that have been virtually at a standstill for several weeks. One of the tests is a mile and a half southwest of Cisco, and the other is a mile northeast of Dothan. Near Cisco, Connally-Jackson,

Abilene, staked their No. 2 Theresa Weddington as a Cisco West Lake Sand Field project. Location was given as 330 feet from the north and west lines of Section 86, Block 3, H&TC Survey. The site is in the northwest corner of the Weddington property, near the point where the Nimrod road joins Highway 80.

Surface pipe for the 4,000-foot test was being set today. Connally and Jackson will sink the test with their own equipment. The location is about a fourth mile southwest of the recently completed E. P. Crawford et al Lake Sand well.

Connally and Jackson recently drilled their No. 1 Weddington near the middle of the lease as a dry hole.

F. Kirk Johnson will drill the well near Dothan as his No. 1 A. J. Pippen. Location for this test was given as 600 feet from the east line of the southwest quarter of Seciton 3182, TE&L Survey. Permit calls for 3,800 feet with rotary equipment.

The Fred Pool Company has the drilling contract and is scheduled to move in about Monday. The location is about midway between the recently completed Ellenberger well on the Pippen land and the Intex Company's Lake Sand gasser. The gas well, which made between four and five barrels of oil per day with heavy gas flow, has been shut-in due to no outlet for the gas.
