

Over Two Inches Of Rain Falls In City, Lake Area

More than two inches of rain fell Monday in the Cisco area, raising the water level of Lake Cisco more than a foot and brightening the outlook for fall crops and winter pastures and cover crops. It was the best rain in the

area since May 25, 1950. The city hall rain gauge recorded 2.4 inches of rain for the entire day, with most of the rain falling during the early morning. A rain gauge at Lake Cisco Tourist Courts showed 2.1 inches, and another at the Albert Hanson Ranch just west of Lake Cisco registered 3.5 inches.

The creek west of Lake Cisco, which runs through the Hanson property, flowed bank full for more than two hours, pouring into Lake Cisco. Creeks to the north carried considerable water, but the rainfall was believed to have been lighter in that area.

Lake Custodian Ray Judia said he placed a yard stick in the edge of the water at both Lake Cisco and Lake Birnie. The yard sticks showed that 11 inches came into Lake Cisco and 22.5 inches flowed into Lake Bernie.

City Water Superintendent John Rodden, who measures the water level at the Lake Cisco dam every Monday for regular reports, reported that the water level was up 19 inches from the week before, indicating that a rain of about an inch during last week also contributed to the city water supply. He estimated that the 19 inches represented at least three months supply of water for

Lake Bernie gained about three feet during the week despite daily withdrawals of around 100,-000 gallons for the City of East-



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
