## Cancer Society Units Will Meet On Control Work

GRAHAM, Oct. 10. — Representatives of twenty-one North Texas county units of the American Cancer Society will meet in Graham October 28 for the third annual meeting of the state Society's District 13. The annual meeting will stress the need for evaluating county cancer control programs and is aimed at strengthening these local organizations for better public cancer education and service. The meeting will be held at the Graham Memorial Auditorium and will feature talks by county district and state leaders of the Society. The ACS directors for District 13 are Floyd Randel of Wichita Falls, Mrs. L. E. Dudley of Abilene, and Dr. Porter Brown of Fort Worth.

Two cancer films will be shown, including the recently released "Man Alive," which has been hailed as an outstanding color cartoon-film for presenting cancer information to men. The election of the District's lay directors will be held during the luncheon program while the afternoon lay session will consist of a discussion of long-term plans for more effective cancer control by ACS county units.

## FARM BUREAU TEAMS IN MANY TEXAS COUNTIES OPEN DRIVE

Texas Farm Bureau membership teams in some 180 organized counties will begin an intensive farm-to-farm membership drive Friday, according to J. Walter Hammond, president of the state farm organization.

The state-wide campaign is expected to increase the membership of the Texas Farm Bureau by some 25,000 over last year, Hammond stated. This year's goal is 75,000 as compared with a membership of about 50,000 at the end of last year's annual Fall membership roundup.

More than 12,000 farmers and ranchers and their wives are planning to take the day off Friday to make this drive a success. The canvassing will continue until Oct. 17 when county membership chairmen will telegraph the results to the state headquarters in Waco.

Young Mize was instantly killed at about 1:15 p. m. Tuesday when the truck in which he was riding was in collision with a Texas and Pacific passenger train at the Lem Switch crossing some six miles east of Cisco. Mize, who lived at 600 West 12th Street, was born December 14, 1929, in Cisco, and had lived here and near here all his life. He was married two years ago to Miss Ailene Marsh. Mrs. Mize and two sons, Sammy and Ronnie, survive him.

Seattle in celebrating the centennial of her founding and many interesting events were arranged for the convention visitors.

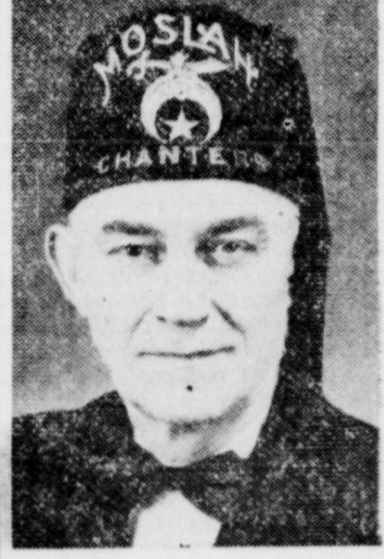
The return trip was made by way of the Pacific Coast, with stops at San Francisco, Los Angeles and the Grand Canyon in Arizona.

The Lobo eleven will enter tonight's non-conference game considerably below full strength due to several key players being out with injuries. The probably starting lineup as announced by Assistant Coach Jay Williams listed several new names and indicated a change of position for another player.

Due to start at the end positions are Jimmy Webb, a regular, and Monte Ingram, a newcomer. Ingram takes the regular spot of Bill Smith, who was prevented from practicing all week by back injuries. Regulars Daniel Gray and Sherwood Gaines will be at tackles, and Jim Reynolds and Mack McCauley will start at guards, with Bobby Qualls at center.

The backfield will be composed of two regulars and two new men. Boy Gallagher will be the field general, and Bobby Black will be at halfback as usual. Max Poyner, 120 pounds, will start at the other halfback, and Sonny McCrea, a reformed guard, will be at fullback. Two regulars, Irv Brunkenhoefer and Bob Lloyd, are not due to see action due to injuries.

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THE POLLING SEASON

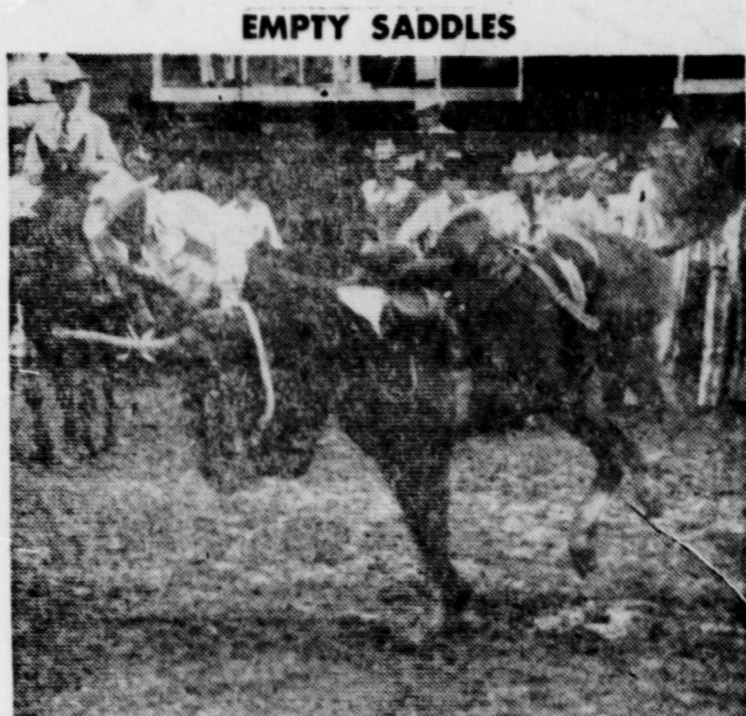
The poll is an entrenched American institution. It is used in an attempt to cast light on almost every conceivable public preference and prejudice—from whom we want for President to what kind of toothpaste we most favor. In the realm of politics, the carefully-conducted polls have had a very excellent record of accuracy, despite the universal failure of any of them to predict Mr. Truman's election in 1948. According to Dr. Gallup, dean of the pollsters, who missed the boat along with all the others, this was primarily due to a considerable percentage of the voters remaining undecided until the last minute and then deciding almost en bloc that Mr. Truman was a better bet than Governor Dewey. In any event, another polling season is now in full bloom and, of course, most attention is being given to the Eisenhower-Stevenson race. Early Gallup polls indicate that it's a neck-and-neck affair so far, though the General seems to have been picking up ground. There are more than enough on-the-fence voters at this stage of the game to swing the decision either way. A different kind of poll, and a very interesting one, was conducted by The Publishers' Auxiliary. This was a grass root poll, sent to weekly papers and to dailies with circulations of less than 25,000. Answers were received from 3,062 of the weeklies and 449 dailies. The Auxiliary recently tabulated and made public the results. Three questions were asked: "I think people of my community favor?" "My personal choice at this time is?" "My paper will support editorially?" To the first question, 64.3 per cent of the weeklies and 65.3 per cent of the dailies named Eisenhower; 25.9 per cent of the weeklies and 23.2 per cent of the dailies named Stevenson; 9.8 per cent of the weeklies and 11.5 per cent

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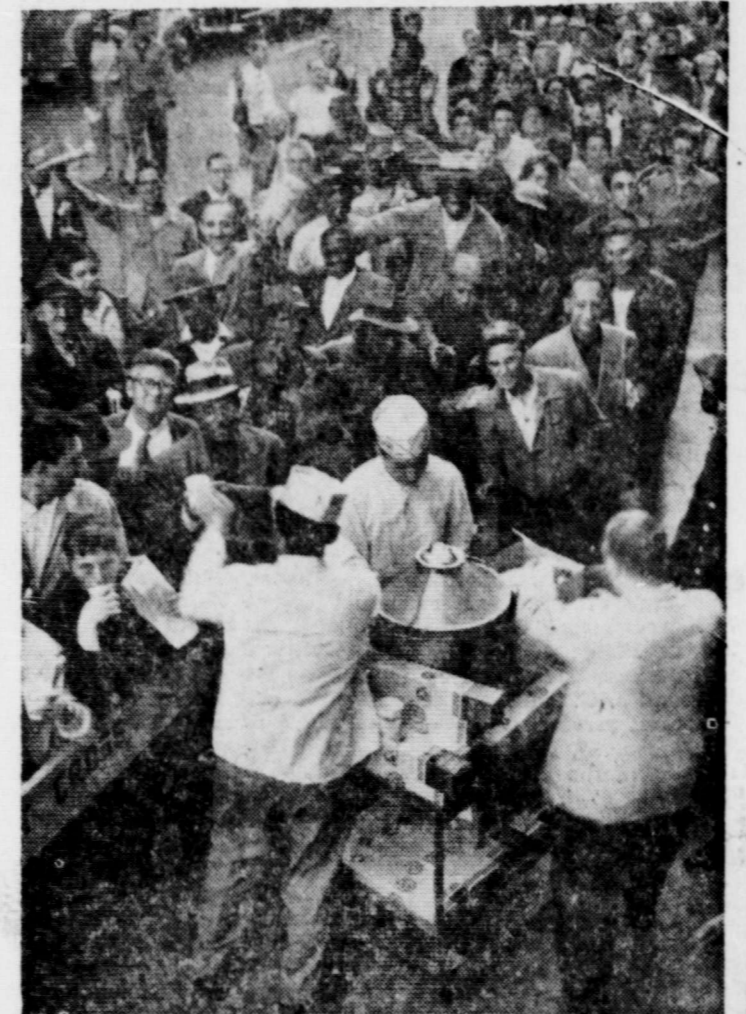
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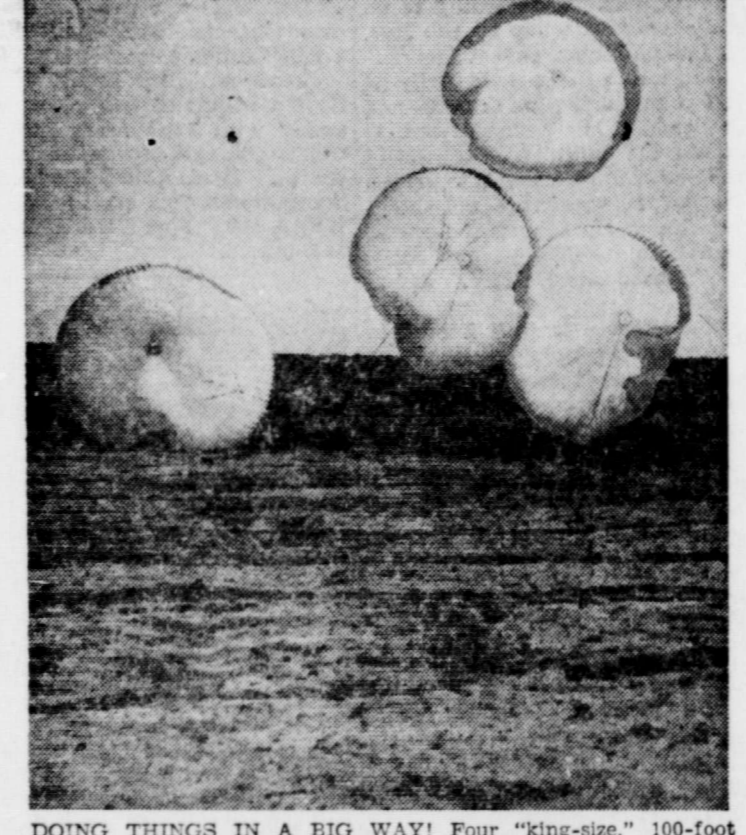

Save Summer Tubers and Bulbs to Plant Next Year. Substantial savings can be made by the amateur gardener who digs his gladiolus bulbs, dahlias tubers, cannas, tuberous rooted begonias, and other summer flowering tubers and stores them safe from frost to replant next year. Not all bulbs and tubers require storage in a cool place. Tuberous rooted begonias will keep well in a warm basement if they are kept dry and covered with dry peat moss. Wait until the first killing frost before lifting bulbs. Dahlias and gladioli may be left in the ground for a week or two after the tops have been lifted. When the bulbs have been lifted, let them dry in the garage, or any frost-proof place until the soil shakes off freely. Then clean them, remove the dried stems, and inspect them carefully. Discard all showing injury or signs of mold, decay, or disease. Take especial care in lifting dahlia tubers because they are brittle. Cut the stems back to 3 inches of the tuber, and remove fine roots and depleted roots, saving the healthy, sound ones. Cut away all unsound portions of the tubers, and dust them with sul-

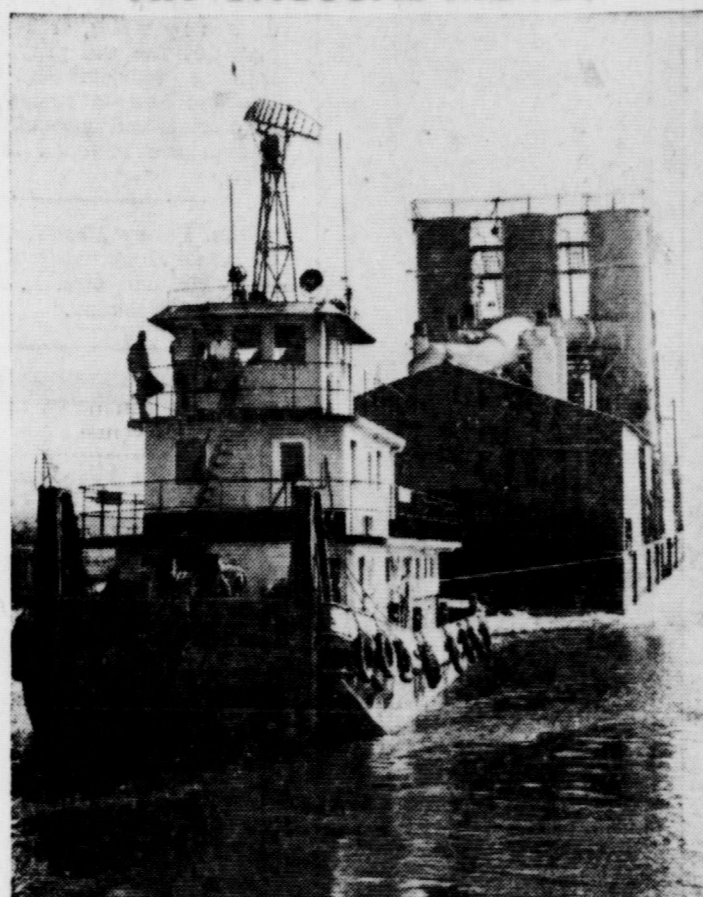

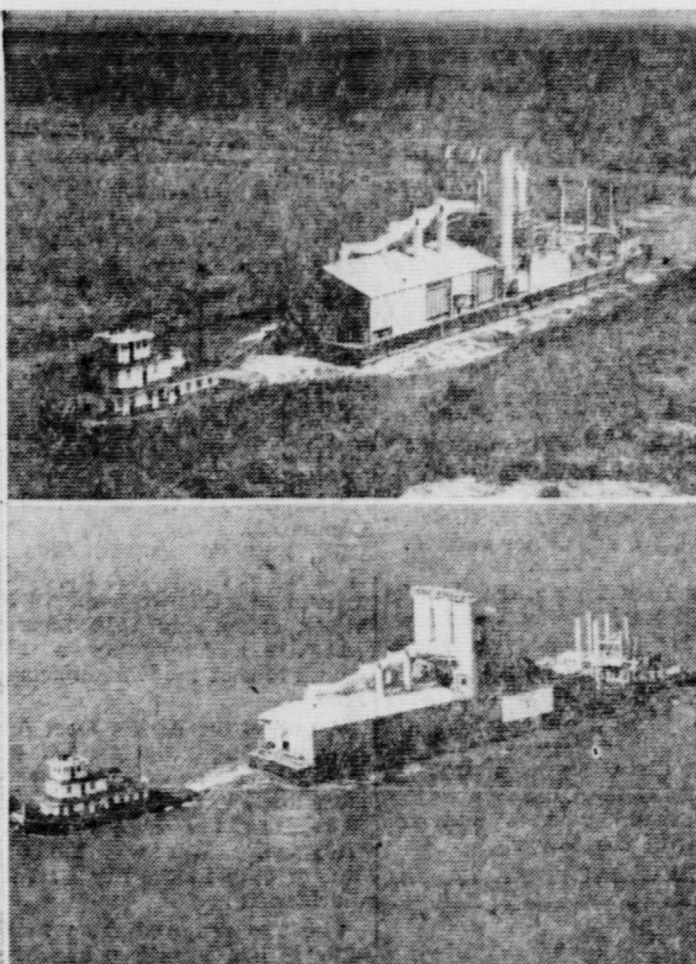

## AN UNUSUAL MOVE



**FLOATING GIANT**—American industry reached a new milestone with the moving of the world's only floating sulphur mining plant 65 miles to its mine site at Bay Ste. Elaine in the Louisiana bayou country. The unusual plant, shown setting out, was built by Freeport Sulphur Company to solve the engineering problem of extracting sulphur from a marshland where



building costs of a permanent plant were prohibitive. The 65-mile trip from Grand Ecaille, where the plant was assembled, to Bay Ste. Elaine was in itself an outstanding engineering feat which required split-second timing. Top photo shows the plant being towed through a bayou and, below, the towing tug is just entering Timberlier Bay, near the Gulf of Mexico.
